Book Review "Fried Walleye and Cherry Pie: Midwestern Writers on Food" Edited by Peggy Wolff Reviewed by Stacey Goldade

"The best way to keep recipes alive is to give them away" is a quote from this book that I wholeheartedly agree with. If you're from the Midwest or are trying to understand the food that Midwesterners enjoy, this book will inform you about a variety of foods and the customs around the food.

There are essays about pork tenderloin sandwiches, sweet corn, and rhubarb kuchen (a recipe for this is included!). All your favorites, like German potato salad, rømmegrøt, fried food from the state fair, grits, apple cider, and many more foods, are included in this book, including lutefisk! You'll learn about what it's like to run a restaurant and who invented the Bundt cake pan. If you've ever attended a church dinner in the basement, watched your relatives come in for lunch after working in the fields all morning, or want to learn what circus peanut candy



has in common with Lucky Charms cereal, you should read this book.

I was especially glad to see lines like this one describing how we use food to comfort people and show appreciation to others, "...if I think about the home-cooked food that they were constantly making and distributing, it awes me. It was a network. A network of food that bound people together." This book is like sitting down to your favorite comfort food, and more than one chapter will likely leave you with a strong food craving, so you may find yourself recalling the best cherry pie you've ever had or calling your grandmother to get a trusted family recipe.
