Eligibility Requirements:

- Persons who are totally or legally blind
- · Persons with visual disabilities who are unable to read standard print clearly and comfortably for a reasonable length of time
- Persons with physical disabilities who cannot hold a book, turn pages, or focus on printed material due to muscle or nerve deterioration, paralysis, or some other disabling condition




Book Review "Spark" by John Twelve Hawks

Once in a great while, I get the itch to read a book outside of my comfort zone. In this case, I took something that was marketed as a "science fiction suspense thriller." While it was set in a present-day dystopia, I have to say that I didn't find much that I would consider suspenseful.

Jacob Underwood is a trained assassin who has Cotard's Syndrome—a real disease that results in the affected person believing that they are dead. Since Underwood believes that he is nothing more than a Shell (his body) with a Spark (his mind), he does not understand or experience fear, pain, emotions, or guilt. These qualities make him the perfect



"Spark" is deeply reminiscent of George Orwell's "1984," and will greatly appeal to anyone interested in a surveillance state and the gradual move towards living amongst and with computers (not just using computers). Underwood's narration is consistent with his diagnosis—clear and unyielding, and while I expected this novel to be an escape into an unfamiliar world, it, instead, made me look at my surroundings a little bit differently as it plunged into the discussions of what truly makes us human amongst a world of machines.
