Talking Books Service

One of the services that is provided by the North Dakota State Library in partnership with the National Library Service, which is a division of the Library of Congress, is the Talking Books program. All North Dakota residents that are unable to read standard print materials because of a visual, physical, or reading disability are eligible for the program which provides audiobooks and players as well as audio magazines and large print books to patrons free of charge. Eligible patrons can also access a large array of digital books that can be downloaded to a computer, tablet or phone.
