
Book Review

The Willoughbys by Lois Lowry Reviewed by Shari Mosser

The Willoughbys by Lois Lowry. Houghton Mifflin Company, New York. ©2008.

"I'm your father, and that sweet woman that you insulted with your rude birth is Mother. If you need love, I beg you, find it elsewhere."

We found *The Willoughbys* after the movie debuted on Netflix in late April of this year. The movie is zany and held the attention of my kids quite well. However, I then found out it is based on a book "nefariously written and ignominiously illustrated" by the Newbery-winning Lois Lowry. The children and I started reading it, but only my 6-year-old daughter and I kept going. This book is vastly different from her more serious historical fiction and dystopian literature. The bio



from the book jacket illustrates this quite well as it states Lowry was "influenced in her childhood by a mother who insisted on surrounding her with books instead of roller skates and jump ropes. Lois Lowry grew up lacking fresh air and exercise but with a keen understanding of plot, character, and setting. Every morning she opened the front door hoping to find an orphaned infant in a wicker basket. Alas, her hopes were always dashed and her dreams thwarted. She compensates by writing books."

Perhaps her keen understanding of plot, character, and setting influences the parodies of many familiar childhood tropes. These old-fashioned children are actively trying to become orphans. Meanwhile, their parents are openly trying to ditch their children. The novel almost becomes a competition to see which group will outlast the other and achieve their own happy ending. *Spoiler alert – they both win!

The Willoughbys also has a great deal of long/advanced vocabulary words, such as Fortuitous, Irascible, Obsequious, et cetera. Lowry's explanation of Odious versus Odoriferous was delightful, even if I had to explain it many times to the child. In my estimation, this book is definitely better than the movie, and it was a joy to share.
