

Talking Book Services

Patrons of the Talking Book Program are eligible to subscribe, free of charge, to magazines on digital cartridges. Choose from about 50 national magazines, including Good Housekeeping, National Geographic, Money, People, Martha Stewart Living, Seventeen, Cricket, and Bon Appetit. Many magazines are also available via digital download from Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD).

The program also provides free subscriptions to several North Dakota magazines, including North Dakota Living, North Dakota Outdoors, North Dakota History, and North Dakota Horizons. Magazines from the Talking Book Program contain the text of articles; advertisements are not included.

Administered by the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, the Talking Book program offers an array of services for North Dakota residents who are unable to read standard print materials due to a visual, physical, or reading disability.

Book Review

"The Book of Happy Endings: True Stories About Finding Love" by Elise Valmorbida



This book contains true stories, but it's written more like fiction since Valmorbida explains, "I have faithfully quoted the words of others, but I have liberally used my own."

There's one story that is sprinkled throughout the book, so watch for the chapter headings that indicate that. That story is told by letters written between the main characters. There are stories of love despite 20 year age differences and love after divorce.

I felt the book got better as it continued, but aside from the one story that continues, you could skip around if you'd like. This attractive little book also has a variety of black and white photographs, not of the couples, but of things like a field of flowers and fireworks.
