"Mudbound" by Hillary Jordan

It is 1946, and city-bred Laura McAllan is trying to raise her children on her husband's Mississippi Delta farm--a place she finds foreign and frightening. In the midst of the family's struggles, two young men return from the war to work the land. Jamie McAllan, Laura's brother-in-law, is everything her husband is not--charming, handsome, and haunted by his memories of combat. Ronsel Jackson, eldest son of the black sharecroppers who live on the McAllan farm, has come home with the

shine of a war hero. But no matter his bravery in defense of his country, he is still considered less than a man in the Jim Crow South. It is the unlikely friendship of these brothers-in-arms that drives this powerful novel to its inexorable conclusion. The men and women of each family relate their versions of events and we are drawn into their lives as they become players in a tragedy on the grandest scale.

"Spare" by Prince Harry

It was one of the most searing images of the twentieth century: two young boys, two princes, walking behind their mother's coffin as the world watched in sorrow—and horror. As Diana, Princess of Wales, was laid to rest, billions wondered what the princes must be thinking and feeling—and how their lives would play out from that point on. For Harry, this is that story at last. With its raw, unflinching honesty, Spare is a landmark publication full of insight, revelation, self-examination, and hard-won wisdom about the eternal power of love over grief.



What We Leave Behind

"What We Leave Behind" by Barb Solberg

Martin and Asta came to America in 1913 to homestead and create a better life for themselves and a hoped-for family. Nineteen years later during the difficult years of the Great Plains Dust Bowl, they intend to improve the lives of three of their nine children by sending their eighteen-year-old daughter with her two younger sisters to Norway to live with relatives for two years. But things do not go according to plan. The oldest sister falls in love with and marries a young Norwegian man leaving the two younger sisters with no one to take them

home. By 1940, when Germany invades Norway, the two younger sisters were living with the family relative who in the meantime married a Quisling, a member of the Norwegian Nazi Party. The two sisters miss the last US evacuee ship out of Petsamo, Finland, and soon German soldiers take one sister to Grini, a concentration camp north of Oslo. Eventually she and her older sister both marry men active in the Norwegian Resistance Movement of WWII. Will the entire family ever reconnect?

"Windfall: The Prairie Woman Who Lost Her Way and the Great-Granddaughter Who Found Her" by Erika Bolstad

Author Erika Bolstad was shocked to learn she had inherited mineral rights in North Dakota in the throes of an oil bonanza. Determined to unearth the story behind her unexpected inheritance, she followed the trail to her great-grandmother, Anna, who her family had painted to be a courageous homesteader who paved her way in the unforgiving American West. But, Bolstad discovers a darker truth about Anna than her family had ever shared. With journalistic rigor, she unearths a history








"Blood Song" by Anthony Ryan Reviewed by Trevor Martinson

Anthony Ryan's debut fantasy novel "Blood Song" is riveting. It's reminiscent of "The "Name of the Wind" and "Game of Thrones," with some elements of history thrown in (such as Rome and Sparta). I was reminded of Steven Pressfield's superb "Gates of Fire." There is also a touch of the Crusades, but in this case, it's those who are essentially atheists (ironically called the "faithful") against the heathen god-worshipers.



Is this to say the story isn't original? Absolutely not! The story is told through the eyes of Vaelin Al Sorna, the Hope Killer. In the beginning, he is perceived to be a defeated warlord who has decided to share his story with a scholar.

At the age of 10, his father, the Battle Lord (think the king's top general), unexpectedly dumps him on the doorstep of the Sixth Order, a religious group that trains and beats children into elite warriors. They're taught to forget their past. The Brotherhood is their only family now. They dedicate their lives to the Faith and the sword, and war is coming.

At first, there is a lot going on behind the scenes. As Vaelin is sheltered for many years within the Order, we learn along with him. We get snippets of the rich and complex world, and the politics swirling around. Eventually, Vaelin "graduates" and becomes more directly involved.

Although it's fantasy, there are only small hints of magic, but Ryan makes it work. The pace is slow, as it encompasses many years, but it's a magnificent tale that keeps the pages turning and makes you eager for the next installment.
