If we are choosing your books and you do not like what we are sending, please contact us so we can change the subject area we are selecting books from.

## **Magazine Changes**

Beginning in January of 1999, the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS) will offer readers twelve magazines on cassette instead of flexible disc.

These magazines continue a transition to the new cassette format for all audio magazines. NLS plans to continue the change in 2000 with an additional ten or eleven titles moving onto cassette and conclude in 2001 when all NLS recorded magazines will be available on cassette.

The magazines included in the January 1999 change are: Civilization (bimonthly), Computer Life (monthly), Consumer Reports (monthly), Eating Well (bimonthly), Ebony (monthly), Good Housekeeping (monthly), Money (monthly), The New York Times Book Review (weekly), People (weekly), Stereo Review (monthly), Travel Holiday (monthly), Working Woman (monthly).

The improvement to the magazines is based on the recommendation of an advisory committee composed of program users and librarians.

My host family in Germany was the greatest family anyone could stay with. The student, Carina, and I have been penpals for about 2 years, so the coordinator placed me with her family.

Birgit, the mother, worked in the home and took care of Angelina, Carina's sister. She was so kind to Mom and me. Really the whole family was. Birgit was the greatest cooks I have ever met. The food we had was out of this world.

Wilfried, the father, was very generous. He and I would have long conversations in German, so I could practice my

German. It was easier to talk with him than talk in a classroom because in a classroom you are constantly being corrected, but with native speakers they only correct you on big mistakes.

Carina, my host student, is fifteen years old and in the ninth class at Gymnasium Herkenrath. She was very fun. She was the one who told me about every step and curb in my path. Her friends were also nice. On the last day, Sebastian, her boyfriend,

gave me a CD as a good-bye present. They all were so accepting of me and talked freely with me in German.

Angelina, the little girl, is two years old and a stinker. She got into everything. A couple of times, she wanted me to read to her, but wouldn't even sit still to listen to the whole book.

While we were there, we met Carina's extended family. We met her grandparents, Ruth and Heinz, her aunts and uncles, Sabina, Uwe, Marita and Karl-Heinsz. When we went to Opa and Oma's (The German words for Grandpa and Grandma) we all sat down together and had cake and coffee.

I think that when you travel abroad it's better to stay with a family and experience the culture from living in it.
