# Who is Eligible?


Any adult or child who cannot read conventional printed matter, hold a book, or turn its pages because of blindness, visual, physical, or a reading impairment may apply for free talking book service. The impairment may be permanent or temporary.

# How to Apply?

Request an application from the North Dakota State Library Disability Services by calling 1-800-843-9948. Complete the application and have it signed by a certifying authority. All students with learning/reading disabilities must have their application signed by a medical doctor.

#### **Textbooks On Tape**

Many talking book patrons are interested in getting textbooks on tape for educational or individual needs. The North Dakota State Library Disability Service does not record textbooks, but they are available through **Recordings for the Blind & Dyslexic (RFB & D)**, in Princeton, New Jersey. RFB & D provides textbooks on tape for an annual fee and provides service to individu-



als and institutions. The cost to obtain textbooks on tape for individuals is \$75.00 the first year and \$25.00 each year after that. Institutions may choose from several payment plans, which depends on how many students they will be serving.

Applications for this service can be acquired directly through RFB & D, or by calling the State Library Disability Service and requesting an application form. RFB & D is a private organization which loans textbooks on tape from the fourth grade level through post-graduate college level. They have an excellent collection of volunteer recorded textbooks, hundreds of classic titles, and a collection of electronic books (e-books) available to their patrons.

In North Dakota, public school districts are required to accommodate every student with equal opportunity to education under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. This means that school districts are required to make their programs and activities accessible to all individuals with disabilities. Talking books and textbooks on tape are one way for schools to make sure that students reading needs are being met.

Both of these programs use cassette tapes that contain four-tracks, and require a tape player that will play these specially formatted cassettes. These players are available at no charge to all eligible talking book users who have completed the application and stay active with the State Library Talking Book Service. Patrons must check out at least one talking book or cassette magazine per year to stay active. If you are only interested in using textbooks through RFB & D, you will be required to purchase your own four-track player.

## **Improvements Made**

For your convenience we have made a couple of changes to the mailing card that goes out with the talking books. On the return side of the mailing card, you will notice two boxes on the top left hand side of the card. If you have a problem with a talking book, you should check the box on the top left of the mailing card labeled **Defective Book**. This will let us know that you had a problem with this book so we can repair or replace the cassette.

We would also appreciate it if you would mark the defective cassette(s) with a rubber band to help us find the defective tape. If you would like the book returned to you after we have corrected the problem, please place a check mark in the second box labeled **Defective/Send Another Copy**. These changes will help alleviate the need for notes sent in the inside of the box. Sending hand-written notes is against postal regulations for free matter material. We do not automatically send another copy of a defective book unless you request another copy.

We have also added our toll-free number in bold print at the bottom of each card, so you will have quick access to our phone number if you need to get in touch with us. The loan period for all talking books and magazines is 6 weeks. If you wish to keep them longer than this, please contact us to renew your book or magazine.
