Music Lessons Available

There are high-quality music courses available through the National Library Service (NLS) music collection. These music courses are available on cassette and are designed to provide quality music instruction to the visually impaired.

The courses are taught in a detailed step-by-step process that uses no written materials or visual references. The *Intro to the Guitar for Visually Impaired* will help you learn how to hold a guitar, tune a guitar, common rhythm patterns, names, notes, and several songs on your guitar.





The Intro to the Piano for the Visually Impaired is a beginning piano or keyboard course that talks you through the basics of playing the piano. You will learn how to sit at the piano, learn names of the notes, and how to play a popular piano piece. These are also available for purchase for \$39.00 each by calling (229) 249-0628.

The NLS music services includes a circulating collection of Braille, large print, and recorded instructional materials in Braille, on cassette, and in large print. To receive the music services you may contact NLS Music Section directly at 1-800-424-8567. Musical recordings intended solely for entertainment are not part of this music collection.
