It is also helpful if you use the term "Book Request" or "Book Order" in the subject line of your e-mail so the reader advisors know this e-mail needs their immediate attention!

# Company Seeking Blind/Legally Blind Persons for Career Opportunities

Envision seeks blind or low vision individuals who want a rewarding career in manufacturing or retail operations. Envision is a private based company that provides jobs, job training, and rehabilitation services for people who are blind or have low vision. Good stable jobs may be available in Pittsburg, PA; Kansas City, KS; Grand Forks, ND; or in one of 15 military base service stores across the Midwest and western U.S.

Applicants must have documentation completed by an ophthalmologist stating they are legally blind. A letter from the ophthalmologist or a form provided by Envision must state the applicant's vision is 20/200 or less.

#### Having Trouble Receiving Reader's Digest or Newsweek?

Sometimes we receive calls from our patrons saying they are no longer receiving their Reader's Digest or Newsweek magazines and don't know why.

One reason you may have stopped getting your magazine(s) is because once a year, the American Printing House for the Blind (APH) mails every patron who is receiving Reader's Digest or Newsweek a letter asking for a donation. This letter includes a post card that <u>must</u> be sent back in order for your subscription to remain active.

Although you can make a donation to APH for providing this wonderful service, this donation is not required in order to receive these magazines. Please remember to mail this post card back annually to APH whether or not you are making a donation, or your subscription will be cancelled.

Another possible reason for disruption in your magazine service is an unreported address or name change. Please contact Disability Services at 1-800-843-9948 with any changes that could result in disruption of service. If you are having problems with this or another magazine subscription, call us at 1-800-843-9948 so we can resolve these issues.

#### Recordings for the Blind and Dyslexic Changes Fees

The annual fee for Recordings for the Blind and Dyslexic (RFB & D) is now \$35 per year with an initial registration fee of \$65. The cost for renewal is \$35 annually. Institutional memberships are also available through RFB & D.

Recordings for the Blind and Dyslexic, RFB & D, provides access to more than 98,000 titles, unlimited access to RFB & D's reference librarian service, and the ability to request the recording of books not in the RFB & D collection.
