Digital Talking Book Player and Cartridge

The National Library Service will begin distributing new digital talking book machines and

books on flash memory cartridges in 2008.

Here are some features of the new digital talking book machine:

- 24-hour battery life, with capacity to recharge in two hours.
- One-third the size and one-half the weight of the current C1 machine.
- Turns off after 30 minutes of non-play.
- Sleep mode available.
- No moving parts.
- Built in audio prompts make it easy to learn how to operate the machine.
- Significantly better audio quality than the C1.
- Large, well-spaced, color-coded control keys that are easier to press.
- · Full range remote control.
- Remembers where you left off (if you are reading more than one book).

Features of the new digital talking books:

- 95 percent of the titles will fit on one cartridge.
- Slightly smaller than cassettes but easy to insert with an audible signal when inserted.
- Large print labeling with Braille.
- The cartridge needs no rewinding.

The players will not be available for distribution until spring of 2008. Not all patrons will receive the new player the first year; therefore, circulation of audiocassette books and cassette players will continue for some time after 2008. The C-1 cassette machines will be around until at least 2014.

OVERDUE BOOKS

We will now be sending overdue letters every three months to notify patrons of items that are past due. In order to fill all of our patrons' requests in a timely manner, we ask that when you are finished with a book, please return it to the State Library as soon as possible so it will be available for the next patron. Books and magazines have a checkout period of six weeks. If a longer period is needed, they may be renewed for an additional six weeks. A FEW WORDS ABOUT EXCLUSIONS

COMMERCIALLY RECORDED BOOKS

Service is purchasing more commercially recorded audio books in order to get books to patrons faster. In the past, it has sometimes taken as long as one year after a book is published until it is recorded and ready for distribution to Talking Book patrons. NLS changes the commercial tape speed to 15/16 ips, adds a four-track format, and inserts side announcements before distributing these tapes to libraries. Many of the books may also have background music.

SPEED CONTROLS

If your tape is running too fast and sounds like Donald Duck, check to be sure that your speed selector switch is still set at 15/16. The speed selector switch is directly above the side selector switch on the right side of the machine. Another trick is to take the tape out and tap it firmly on a hard surface, which quite often will solve the problem.

An exclusion is a term used by the Talking Book library to describe the subject matter and other characteristics of a book that patrons do not wish to receive. For instance, if a customer does not want to receive books with strong language, then an exclusion is added to his/her reading preferences so that he or she doesn't receive any books containing strong language. The majority of exclusions on customer accounts are for books with strong language, violence, and/or sexually explicit material. The problem with these exclusions is that they sometimes keep patrons from receiving books by their favorite authors. For example, Danielle Steel, who writes widely popular romance novels, has 76 titles recorded, and only 16 are without strong language, violence, or sexually explicit material. The same holds true for Nora Roberts; of her 90 titles, none are without strong language, violence, and/or sexually explicit material. The exclusions don't just pertain to authors of romance novels. For instance, the mystery author Sue Grafton has 20 titles, and only three are without exclusions. If you've requested books by a favorite author and haven't been receiving very many, it could be because your exclusions are preventing you from getting them.

Please call us at (701) 328-1408 or toll-free at 1-800-843-9948 if you would like to reassess your reading preferences. Just think, many of our bedtime stories, like Goldie Locks and the Three Bears, would qualify as a violent exclusion in our catalog.



KEEPING UP WITH YOUR ACCOUNT!

We appreciate it when patrons contact us with any changes to account information such as: name, address, phone number, e-mail address, contact person. and person authorized to act on your behalf. It is important to keep this information current at all times. If you move temporarily within the state or to another state (such as winter in Arizona), we can send materials to your temporary address. Please notify us of these changes even if you do not care to receive books at your temporary address.

IMPROVING YOUR SERVICE

There are several things that you can do to help make books available as quickly as possible to you and all of our patrons. Each cassette book is opened and examined when it is returned. The books are checked for completeness, for damage, and to see if all tapes have been rewound. You can play an important role in maintaining good quality service by rewinding every cassette when you have finished reading it. If you have listened to all four sides of a cassette, then the tape is already perfectly rewound. If not, place the cassette Braille side up into your machine, and push the rewind button. Rewinding and correct placement can prevent damage to the tapes while in transit. Also, please be sure that the correct tapes are in the container before returning the book. It helps to open only one book at a time and to finish that book before opening another container. If a book contains a bad tape, please put a rubber band or string around the defective tape so we can identify it. Your help in caring for the cassettes is a valuable asset and is greatly appreciated. Remember that you can always call us for help, and quite often we can talk you through various problems on the phone.
