



HIGH VOLUME MACHINE AND HEADPHONES

The National Library Service (NLS) has developed a high-volume version of the digital talking book machine (DTBM) for use by patrons who are hearing impaired. The high-volume machine, which is paired with a headset, is available as a standard or advanced model that has been programmed to have an amplified volume up to 120 dB. It can be issued only by NLS and will bear a warning label. The high-volume feature only works with the set of stereo headphones that NLS provides.

To receive a high-volume machine and headset, a patron must provide a certification of hearing impairment by a physician or audiologist. An agency may assist an eligible patron with obtaining a high – volume machine and headset by downloading a high-volume player application from www.loc.gov/nls/pdf/hvp.pdf and returning the patron's completed and fully signed application to the North Dakota State Library Talking Books Department via email at tbooks@nd.gov or fax at (701) 328-2040. Patrons will need to return their current machine upon receiving the high-volume machine and headset. A return mail card will be included with the high – volume machine.

CHANGES IN BARD

BARD Express: The Bard Express will drastically improve the user experience of patrons using BARD on their home PCs. It will remember your BARD password and log you in automatically each time you use the system. It will have the ability to download multiple books at a time, unzip them automatically, and transfer them to your storage device. The BARD Express should be available for patrons in the next few months.

New Search Engine: The long awaited new search engine for BARD will be more modern and will produce more relevant results for patrons based on the NLS catalog.

Success of Commercial Titles: By including commercial titles in the NLS collection, patrons now have access to over 1000 more books per year than they did before. NLS has the ability to add these commercial titles to BARD within weeks of their initial release, lessening the wait time for new releases. These books are still unrated though, so patrons should keep that in mind when ordering commercial audio books.

WINTER READING PROGRAM SUCCESS

The “I Cannot Live without Books” reading program was well received. 92 patrons participated and 34 patrons completed the challenge of reading 10 books in the required amount of time. Those 34 patrons qualified for a drawing, and Pat Crary was the winner. The prize was an Amazon Kindle Fire. Now Pat can download books from BARD at any time, without using a computer or Talking Books machine!! Congratulations Pat!

WHEN DO NEW TITLES COME IN?

Many of our patrons often ask when some of the newer titles will be available on Talking Books. The National Library Service records approximately 4,000 titles each year. This is adult through children’s books, fiction and non-fiction. Most of the books in our collection come from the National Library Service and are recorded elsewhere, so it makes it very difficult for us to know exactly what titles we will receive or when we will have them available. Occasionally, you may also hear at the end of a story “other titles by this author”. This refers to other titles in print, but it does not necessarily mean those other titles have been recorded for Talking Books. However, we can add any title to your wish list and we will add the requested title to your record and notify you if it becomes available. Please remember that it takes time for a new book to get recorded and distributed to the Talking Book Libraries. Books are sent out to patrons in the order that requests are taken.

MORE MAGAZINES AVAILABLE

The National Library Service has added several new audio magazines to its magazine program. Call the library to order a free subscription to any of these. Audio magazines come on digital cartridges and are on loan for a month. Please read and return magazine cartridges as soon as possible; having 2 or more overdue magazines will prevent you from receiving more issues.

The new magazines are: AARP Bulletin and AARP The Magazine (packaged together), Audubon, Humpty Dumpty Magazine (for ages 3-5), Missouri Conservationist, National Geographic Traveler, O, the Oprah Magazine, Oklahoma Today, Playboy, Rolling Stone, Seventeen, Smithsonian, Southern Living, Vital Speeches of the Day.

MORE BOOKS FOR YOU

The National Library Service (NLS) has an agreement with 5 major book publishers to convert their unabridged commercial audiobook titles into Talking Books. The publishers are Hachette, MacMillan, Penguin Random House, Scholastic, and Audible. This means you have faster access to more titles, while reducing costs for NLS.

For example; NLS records 2000 titles a year. The average book takes approximately 3-5 months to produce, while a typical commercial audiobook takes only weeks to convert. In addition to the books NLS will record this year, there will be over 1500 additional titles available courtesy of these 5 publishers.

The only drawback is we don't know whether or not the books recorded by the publishers contain sex, violence, or bad language. Some may be perfectly fine, while others may contain a little or a lot of material some readers find objectionable. We can mark your account so that we do not select unrated books for you, but keep in mind this may also eliminate books that do not contain such material. If we run low on the types of books you like, we may start sending you unrated books. If you get a book you don't care for, just return it and we'll send you another.

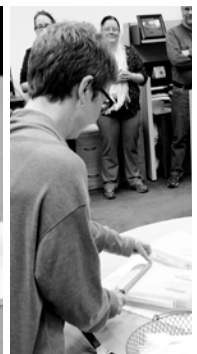
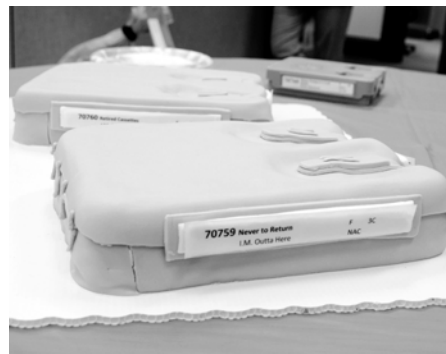
STAYING ACTIVE WITH TALKING BOOKS

Has it been a while since you logged into BARD and downloaded a book? Last month NLS examined all existing BARD download accounts and any account that showed no activity in the past year was suspended. If you cannot log in and you DO want to continue to use BARD, call ND Talking Books and we will reactivate your account. Just keep in mind that you must download at least one book a year to keep that account active. Call us if you have forgotten your password and we can send you a new temporary one that can be changed to the password of your choice. Having a suspended BARD account will not affect your account with Talking Books; we will still continue to mail audio books to you. However, to remain active, a patron must borrow one book or subscribe to one magazine per year.

There are a number of things that can affect your service so that you are not receiving talking books; it could be you have had overdue books, you asked us to hold your service and never asked us to restart it, or if you have not requested any books. It could also be because you moved and we were not notified of your new address. If in doubt, call us. We want you to enjoy reading Talking Books, so we need to know if you have any problem affecting your service.

A FINAL FAREWELL

The North Dakota State Library officially sent off the last bag of Recorded Cassettes! To celebrate the end of the seven-year changeover, Liz, a reader advisor on staff, made cakes in the shape and color of the cassette mailing containers. They even had book tiles on them "Never to Return by I.M. Outtahere" and "Retired Cassessttes by I.M. Gone."



NETFLIX TO ENHANCE ACCESS FOR BLIND CUSTOMERS

In a first-of-its-kind settlement, advocates for people who are blind have reached an agreement with Netflix to make accessible the movies and videos offered through the Netflix video streaming and DVD rental subscriptions. The settlement means that Netflix will make its video content accessible by adding a new technology called “audio description” as a feature that blind customers can activate so they can more fully understand and enjoy the movie and video experience.

Netflix provides one of the nation’s most popular online streaming and DVD rental services, offering convenient and affordable video entertainment, including original content, to millions of Americans.

Under the agreement, Netflix will provide audio description for many popular titles in its streaming and disc rental libraries. Audio description technology lets blind people know what is happening in scenes without dialogue or scenes with significant visual elements via an audio description track that contains narration of the visual elements that is synchronized with the show or movie. Television and movie studios will create the audio description tracks and provide them to Netflix. Without audio description, blind individuals do not know what is happening in scenes without dialogue and can misinterpret the meaning of other scenes. Under the settlement, Netflix will also provide audio description for the “Netflix Original” shows that Netflix has begun distributing such as “House of Cards” and “Orange is the New Black.”

Under the agreement, Netflix will also make its website and mobile applications accessible to individuals who are blind and use screen-reading software to navigate websites and apps. Screen-reading software is an interface between people who are blind or low vision and computers and/or mobile applications. The software creates an audio version of text and images that appear on a screen that it reads aloud to a user. The user then controls the computer or mobile device by pressing keys or tapping on a mobile application. With the changes Netflix is making, users who are blind or low vision will be able to independently use the Netflix website and mobile applications.

This agreement is the first-of-its-kind to provide screen-reader and audio access to users who are blind or low vision. These improvements will provide people who are blind or low vision with unparalleled access to online video entertainment services currently enjoyed by millions of Americans.

WANT BOOKS FOR THE WEEKEND?

The Talking Book Library is closed on Saturday and Sunday, but do you know the best way to ensure you have enough reading material for the weekend? It's simple: call the library no later than Tuesday by 3:00 pm and we will be happy to help.

TALKING BOOK DELIVERY SERVICE:

One of the main concerns we hear from our patrons is the length of time it takes to receive their talking books. It is important to remember that it may take several days for your books to reach us once you put them in the mail. The day we receive your books they are checked in, then this alerts the computer to run mail cards so new books go out to you the next working day. Once again you must remember to allow enough time for the mail service to get your books to you. Due to circumstances beyond our control, it sometimes takes more time than we anticipate. The only time books may not go out to you the day after your books are checked in is if the next day is a holiday, a weekend or if we do not have enough book requests for you.

Requests/Reserves for Talking Books

It is important for our patrons to know that the Talking Book Library operates like a print library. The Talking Book Library often has a couple of copies of the most popular books on our shelves, however other titles may only have one copy on the shelf. The talking books are sent out in the order in which the requests are taken. When the title comes back to our library, the book goes out to the next patron on the waiting list. This process continues until all patrons requesting this title have received it. Therefore, if it is a popular title, it may take some time for all the patrons who have requested it to receive a copy.
