ORDERING BOOKS FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Patrons may find that book delivery is slower during the holiday season due to the increased volume of mail the postal service handles this time of year. We encourage patrons to order extra books in advance so you will have plenty of reading material on hand.

This is a great time to think about signing up for BARD to download books on a USB drive to play in the digital machine or download the BARD Mobile app for your iOS or Android device. BARD provides instant access to over 80,000 audiobooks, braille books, magazines and music scores from the comfort of your home, even when the library is closed.

Please be aware that the Talking Book Library will not be able to approve your BARD application on days the library is closed.



TROUBLESHOOTING BARD MOBILE

We know that occasionally you may have trouble using the BARD Mobile app. If you do, you may be tempted to uninstall and reinstall it. This is almost never necessary. Uninstalling the app will cause you to lose all your books, your reading position in each one, and any bookmarks you may have set. Instead, try the following steps.

If the problem is with a particular book, delete the book from your device and download it again.

For other problems, try:

- Restarting your device.
- Completely close BARD Mobile and then restart it. To completely close BARD Mobile
 on an Android device, choose Overview, and then choose Close BARD Mobile. To do
 it on an iOS device, double-tap the Home button to bring up the app switcher. Swipe
 left or right until you find BARD Mobile, and then flick up with three fingers if you use
 VoiceOver, or swipe up if you don't.
- If you use BARD Mobile for iOS, re-initialize BARD Mobile. Note that it is possible to re-initialize BARD Mobile on an Android device as well, but doing so erases all your books, so you might as well reinstall the app.

Here's how to re-initialize BARD Mobile for iOS.

- 1. Close BARD Mobile.
- 2. Choose the Settings option on your home screen.
- 3. Choose BARD Mobile in Settings.
- 4. Turn Setting Initialization on.
- 5. Close Settings.
- 6. Reopen BARD Mobile. You will need to agree to the terms of service and log in, as you did the first time you used the app.

DAMAGED BOOKS

From time to time, the book you are reading will say "cartridge error" or "end of book" in the middle of the story or before the story has even begun. If it says "end of book" when you first put the book into your digital player, you may have already listened to the book in the past. If not, or to listen to it again, push the green Play/Stop button a few times.

If that does not work, or if you hear a "cartridge error" message, please do one or both of the following before mailing the book back to North Dakota Talking Book Library:

Please call (1-800-843-9948) or email tbooks@nd.gov and tell us which book is having a problem and we would be happy to mail you a replacement copy, AND/OR please make an X in the top left corner of the mailing card next to the word Damaged. This appears on the side that has the Talking Book Library address on it, when the hole in the mailing card is on the top right. By telling us the item is damaged, we will not send you the same copy or send the damaged item to another patron.

OVERDUE BOOK POLICY

Patrons may check out books on digital cartridge for 45 days and are allowed one renewal per book. If you need additional time, please call or email the Talking Book Library and we would be happy to renew your book cartridges for 45 more days.

If you receive an overdue notice in the mail, please review the book titles carefully. If you never received that title, have sent it back quite a while ago, or if you would like to renew the item, please contact us. It is important to keep your list of books checked out up to date, so we can continue replacing your books in a timely manner.

USING BOOKSHELF TO FIND MAGAZINES AND BOOK TITLES

Locating specific magazine or book titles on a cartridge containing multiple titles is easy if you use the Bookshelf feature on your digital player. It allows you to navigate back and forth through the cartridge to find the magazine or book title you want to read.

Follow these steps to locate the magazine or book you want:

- 1. Insert the cartridge into the digital player.
- 2. Hold down the green Play/Stop button until you hear the word "Bookshelf."
- 3. Release the Play/Stop button and tap down on the white arrow-shaped Fast Forward button to the right of the Play/Stop button to move through the titles on the cartridge until you hear the title of the magazine or book you want to read.

To move back through the titles on the cartridge, hold down the Play/Stop button until you hear "BOOKSHELF" and then tap down on the white arrow-shaped Rewind button until you hear the title you are seeking.
