Braille E-Reader Review

The new Braille eReaders have recently become available to all interested Talking Book patrons across the country. Jim, one of our local TB patrons, gave us the following enthusiastic review of his experiences:

"A couple of weeks or so ago, I received the eReader. I never thought I could enjoy reading Braille so much. I used Braille a lot throughout my lifetime, especially while active in the business world, but rarely read magazines or books in Braille because of the bulkiness. I have already read several magazines and a short book on this little machine."

We asked Jim, 77, how difficult it was to learn to use the machine. "I received a HumanWare eReader 20-cell display. It works very, very well. I had to spend a couple of weeks learning how to use the unit. Now I just power up and read away. It even remembers exactly where I left off. No more searching to find my place."

Jim had a few final thoughts. "The little machine can sit in your lap at home, traveling, or wherever you wish to read. The 20-cell display quickly and easily gives you all the reading you want! No more big, bulky volumes. No more tired hands from reading across pages of Braille. No more looking for ways to pile Braille books to be mailed back. This is a fantastic little machine. You would have quite a battle on your hands to take this wonderful little thing back."

Where Are My Books?

If you ever feel like you are not receiving all your books, the following are some reasons why this may happen.

- You have reached the limit of cartridges allowed (5). Remember that cartridges in transit still count as being checked out to you.
- You have read all the books available written by your favorite authors.
- You are set up as "request only" and have not given us new titles to add to your account.
- Your desired reading interest preferences are too limited.
- You have exhausted your reading interest list, and there are no longer any books available to add to your request list. It may be time to pick a new author or genre to try.

From the sailor who was on the USS Hornet for the splashdown of one of the Apollo capsules to the mother who had 21 children in 21 years, these tidbits of North Dakota life will leave you smiling. Meet the man who discovered his future wife after she pulled a rabbit out of a hat and, at 89, the oldest working nurse in the nation. Read the tale of the soldier who stood guard in the imperial palace during the occupation of Japan in 1945 and of a returning World War II warrior who had to walk through a blizzard to finally make it home. Equality at the Ballot Box: Votes for Women on the Northern Great Plains By Lori Ann Lahlum

On 10 December 1869, the Governor of Wyoming Territory signed the first full woman suffrage bill in the history of the United States. Suffragists in the neighboring territories of Montana and Dakota believed their prospects were similarly bright. Over the next twenty years, however, organizers' efforts to secure votes for women met only limited success. The fight for full women suffrage on the Northern Great Plains would take another three decades. 12 hours, 35 minutes. 2019.

On a November morning in 2015, Christopher Jackson waited for his fiancée, Angila Wilder, to pick him up from work as she always did. But this time, she didn't show—and Christopher's calls went unanswered. The police found what looked like a scene from a horror movie at their home. The backdoor kicked in. A bedroom splattered with blood. And a pregnant young woman violently stabbed to death. Could Christopher have murdered the woman he claimed to love? In the 1970s, the once-proud University of North Dakota hockey team fell on hard times, until a group of physical, fierce players were recruited into the program. In the early 1970s, Steve Blehm set a legendary high school basketball standard in Devils Lake, N.D., averaging 47 points per game. He was deaf. Her name is Renee Blackbear, but what most people call the 19-year-old Ojibwe woman is Cash. She lived all her life in Fargo, sister city to Minnesota's Moorhead. She has one friend, Sheriff Wheaton. He pulled her from her mother's wrecked car when she was three. Since then cash has navigated through foster homes, and at 13 was working farms, driving truck. Wheaton signs her up for college. In between classes and hauling beets, drinking beer and shooting pool, a man who claims he's her brother shows up. 6 hours, 50 minutes. 2019.

Talking Book Topics

Talking Book Topics (TBT) lists a selection of titles recently added to the National Library Service (NLS) collection and the Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD) service. Here are some of formats where you can access TBT:

- On the NLS website www.loc.gov/nls/tbt, view TBT in HTML with direct links to BARD for downloading or adding books to wish lists in BARD Mobile.
- On the NLS website www.loc.gov/nls/tbt, view TBT as a PDF, which include order forms for Adult, Children, and Foreign Language-Spanish titles.
- Audio cartridge, which comes with a large-print order form. We automatically sign up all North Dakota patrons for the audio cartridge.
- BARD audio magazine, downloadable to cartridge or to BARD Mobile.

The materials and equipment that patrons check out from Talking Books are assigned to an individual account. Each patron is responsible for these items. Materials include digital and large print books, audio Bibles, and audio magazines. Equipment includes digital players and headphones.

Equipment and materials sent to our patrons are the property of the United States Federal Government (Library of Congress) and Talking Book Services. They are loaned to patrons of the Talking Book Program. Equipment and books should not be loaned to others, thrown away, sold, or donated to charities.

Sharing items among patrons is discouraged for several reasons. First, these materials are easily misplaced or lost. Second, if you share materials with other Talking Books patrons, this takes away from your ability to check out additional items.

If you want to recommend a title to a friend who is a Talking Book patron, please have them call and order their own copy instead of borrowing them your copy. Also, please remember that individuals who are not registered Talking Book patrons cannot use our books and equipment. Talking Books is limited to individuals who are eligible for the service due to specific disabilities outlined by the National Library Service.
