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

Learn Something New at Workshops



The North Dakota State Library recognizes the need for ongoing educational opportunities for librarians across the state. Pat Wagner with Pattern Research will present an in-depth workshop on *Creating a Strategic Plan* for your library. Participants will create a simple draft of a strategic plan, which can be used to create a working short-term plan for their library.

Dan Maars with North Dakota Career Resource Network (NDCRN), will present a session on *Career Development Resources* to use with students, librarians, parents, teachers, and counselors. Many of these resources are currently available in our libraries. He will also discuss various strategies on how you can foster greater use of these resources by parents and children.

He says every effort must be made to assist youth and adults with decisions about their career path by providing citizens with career planning information. Bank robber Willie Sutton was asked, "Why do you rob banks?" His reply was "that's where the money is." So why work with librarians? That's where the information is!

North Dakota Libraries Receive Grants

The North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) have awarded 14 North Dakota libraries grants totaling \$74,734. The funding comes from Library Vision 2010 (LV2010) and Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) sources. Projects include video conferencing for the Hazen Public Library; a mobile computer lab for the Minot Public Library; and technology equipment grants for the Beulah, Dunseith, Hettinger, Killdeer, Larimore, Leeds, Milnor, and Walhalla school libraries and the Casselton, Bowman, Divide County, and Wishek public libraries.

Professional scholarship grant money was designated for librarians who are pursuing their Masters of Library Science Degree, and will work for a minimum of two years in a North Dakota library. Federal LSTA money was designated to cover the cost of public library filtering for two years. 


Ninety-three percent of public libraries in North Dakota offer Internet access to the general public.

State Library Goes to Washington



The Morton County Library has been serving patrons for over four decades, and for those book lovers who are unable to make it to the library, the library comes to them, via the Morton County Bookmobile. In their trek to feed the hundreds of hungry minds with library material, the bookmobile averages about 600 miles per month.

Library Director Sheila Huber says their service is very personal and widely appreciated. "I think people are grateful for this service; when we first started it was the only service for some of them, and the kids just love it."



Morton County Library's Bookmobile


Huber says this is a great resource, and for some residents this is the only library service they have. The Morton County Library currently serves about 2,500 patrons on a regular basis.

For patrons who would rather go to the library to pick out their material, the doors are open six-days a week. Thanks to a reciprocal agreement with the Mandan Public Library, Morton County Library patrons may also use the Mandan Public Library at no charge.

Packing up specialized boxes of books and sending them to schools across Morton County is a special service provided by the library. Huber says they individualize the selection to meet the needs of the students and their curriculum.

2004 Grant Guidelines Released

Sharpen your pencils! The North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council have released the 2004 Grant Guidelines for the next round of library grants.

On March 1, the 2004 Grant Guidelines were mailed to public, school, and academic libraries, public library board presidents, and school superintendents. The guidelines are also available on the North Dakota State Library Website at <http://ndsl.lib.state.nd.us/Grants.html>. The actual application is only available on the Website, and applicants will need to go to the Website for the forms (paper copies will be available by contacting the State Library).

Two major categories of grants are available and applications are due June 1, 2004. The first category is MINI TRAINING GRANTS (maximum of \$200), with the purpose of training the public in the use of the online library resources. This grant category must be completed by November 30, 2004. The second category is PROJECT GRANTS including three sub-categories: (1) automation projects, with the purpose of assisting libraries in participating in the existing statewide library catalog; (2) digitization projects, with the purpose of initiating or extending library digitization efforts in the state; and (3) collaborative projects, with the purpose of extending innovative cost-effective library services through community partnerships. PROJECT GRANTS must be completed by June 1, 2005.

Start planning how you can improve and extend local library services, join the statewide library catalog, develop a digitization project, or train your citizens to use the online resources.



Librarians Attend Gates Workshop

Three North Dakota librarians were invited to a workshop in Seattle by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation this past February. The workshop, "Sustaining Public Access Computing in Rural Libraries," provided practical assistance to small, rural librarians who were looking for examples and best practices for sustaining public access technologies for their patrons.

Librarians Stacey Goldade, North Dakota State Library; Marlene Ripplinger, Harvey Public Library; and Bonnie Krenz, Griggs County Library attended the conference with many other librarians from rural communities throughout the country. They had the opportunity to discuss the challenges they face providing public access for their patrons. Participants walked away with their own plan to increase public access computing for libraries. The Gates Foundation provided airfare, lodging, and transportation for the workshop.




\$\$First Book Grants Available\$\$



Sessions held during the week included: Principles and Practices of Effective Leadership, Interpersonal Communication, Managing Differences, Risk Taking, Using Power and Influence, Leading Change, Creating a Culture of Commitment, Working With Groups and Teams, Group Problem Solving, and Achieving Leadership Potential.

Librarians interested in applying for the Leadership Institute are required to submit applications for consideration to Mountain Plains Library Association. Peterson says he encourages other librarians to apply for next year's Institute to experience their own personal growth.

The Mohall Public Library has changed locations three times in the last ten years, but that hasn't hindered it from providing great library service to its patrons.

Librarian Reta Erickson has been on board for two of those moves, and says the present location allows them to feature their wonderful collection of fiction. "Many people have commented on the good selection of fiction we have in our collection, and now it's all there as you come in the front door of the library."

Erickson has worked at the Mohall Public Library for over ten years, and says this is the least stressful job she can imagine and though they are still getting things situated, "the coffee pot is always on."

They are currently in the process of creating a special room that will house the library's collection of older books like *Zane Grey* and *Tarzan*. This room will also serve as a reading room.

The library also has a decent selection of children's books and three Wednesdays each month, it offers a program for children ages three to ten years old.

Although they have not been able to automate the library, Erickson says a computer with Internet access has been installed so patrons who are interested in accessing a computer are invited to stop in and use it.

The Mohall Public Library is open Monday through Friday from 11:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., and on Saturdays from 11:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.


Media Training

We spent the beginning of the day together, but later split up into two groups (librarians from small rural libraries in one room, state and regional library staff in another room). Sandra Nelson (a consultant and author) helped facilitate the discussion, and spent most of the day with state library and regional system librarians.

Representatives from small rural libraries discussed barriers to providing public access computing. Their concerns were then given to the other group, who brainstormed ideas for helping them and worked on an action plan to take home and implement. The rural library representatives also shared successful ideas with each other, so they could implement some ideas on their own. Each person also received a binder full of ideas on a variety of topics, such as raising funds, developing effective partnerships, reaching nontraditional library users, and how to be an effective advocate for your library.

In addition to the Gates Foundation workshop, I was also able to attend the 10th Public Library Association Conference held in Seattle. This was my first national conference, and I deliberately attended sessions on topics that were new to me, even if they didn't relate to my day-to-day job duties. My favorite sessions were about nonfiction reader's advisory and floating collections. Floating collections consist of items that do not have a permanent home at any one library, instead they float between the different branches of a library and are put on the shelves of whichever library happens to have it at the time. I also enjoyed hearing from Anna Quindlen, Nancy Pearl, and Nancy Farmer, as their speeches about being authors were entertaining, humorous, and thought provoking.


The workshops are an opportunity for librarians to network with other librarians, acquire new skills, and grow professionally.

Reference Corner

Summer reading time is here and this year's theme "Discover New Trails @ Your Library" helps celebrate the 200th anniversary of the journey of Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery. The North Dakota State Library has purchased a variety of material in anticipation of the Corps of Discovery bicentennial. If your summer readers are interested in books about Lewis and Clark, be sure to check for titles available at the North Dakota State Library. You can find them by searching for the terms "Lewis and Clark" in the online catalog by title, keyword, or subject heading. You can also limit your search by adding the word "juvenile." Some of the titles include *Animals on the Trail With Lewis and Clark*, and *Dog of Discovery: a Newfoundland's Adventures with Lewis and Clark*.

New ODIN Online Catalog

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Libraries of the Online Dakota Information Network (ODIN) consortium are shifting to a new online catalog system during the summer (2004). A tremendous amount of work is taking place at the participating libraries, all with the goal of improved access and functionality for library customers.

Why change to a new system?

Students, faculty, staff, and general public who use libraries depend on a working online catalog. The current software (PALS) used by ODIN libraries is more than 25 years old and will no longer be supported by its developers. Libraries rely on a working online system for their daily activities. This is an opportunity for North Dakota libraries to upgrade software and improve online service to their users.

Libraries around the world that currently use PALS software are moving to new online systems. The North Dakota, Minnesota, and South Dakota consortia each selected the same library software, ALEPH 500 produced by Ex Libris. This will ultimately foster excellent inter-consortia cooperation once each state has successfully installed its new systems.

What are the benefits of the new system?

This new ODIN library catalog will provide users with a state-of-the-art, integrated, online library system with a number of significant improvements including:

- Improved Web capability
- User-defined data view of results sets
- Searching of multiple external library catalogs and full-text databases
- Enhanced interlibrary loan
- Improved graphics capability
- Saved searches to report new materials added to the catalog since a previous date

When will the new system be operational?

The target date for the switch to the new system is August 1, 2004. New hardware installations and data testing for libraries is in progress. Library staff around the state began training for the new system this spring.

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How was the new system selected?

Participating libraries conducted a thorough review of the systems available before selecting the ALEPH 500 software from a vendor named Ex Libris. The selection process included an extensive "requirements list," demonstrations by vendors, and evaluation by over 50 librarians from all types of libraries around the state. Ex Libris best met our demanding requirements with a system that allowed for flexibility of our individual member libraries.

ODIN

ODIN membership includes 54 North Dakota academic, public, school, and special libraries. Together these libraries own a total of over five million items. ODIN is operated by the North Dakota University System (NDUS) and headquartered on the University of North Dakota campus in Grand Forks. This multi-type consortium includes libraries serving citizens throughout the entire state. ODIN libraries also participate in the MINITEX consortium, which supports resource sharing and database acquisitions among libraries in Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota. North Dakota State University Libraries have chosen this opportunity to join the ODIN consortium on its new Ex Libris system.

Public Libraries to Participate in Centralized Filter

Forty-three public libraries across North Dakota have signed on to participate in the centralized Internet filtering network that is managed by the North Dakota State Library and North Dakota Information Technology Department (ITD). By joining the centralized filter, the libraries guarantee that the library will be compliant with the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) by July 1, 2004.

In order to determine local standards for each library community, a list of categories that can be filtered was sent to the participating libraries. CIPA requires libraries to filter certain visual depictions for adults and minors. These include visual depictions that are (1) obscene, (2) child pornography, or with respect to use of computers with Internet access by minors, or (3) harmful to minors.

In order to meet community standards, the library may choose to filter other categories. If your library is not participating in the centralized filtering network and receives E-rate, LSTA, or StageNet funds to provide Internet access for patrons, the deadline to have the filtering software operating is **July 1, 2004**.

If filtering software is not functioning in a library that receives one or more of these federal or state funds by July 1, the library will become ineligible to receive further funding for Internet access.

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

North Dakota Libraries Receive Project Grants PERM COPY

Eight North Dakota libraries have been awarded funding to assist in automating their libraries. Thanks to grant awards totaling over \$250,000 from the North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council, these libraries are one step closer to providing enhanced library services to their communities.

Grant recipients include Beulah Public School Libraries, Cavalier Public School Library, Heart of America Library (Rugby), Larimore Public School Library, Minot Public Schools Libraries, Napoleon Public School Library, Northwood Public School Library, and Underwood Public Library.

Libraries will use the funding to add their records to the statewide library catalog, Library Access North Dakota (LaND), which will allow patrons to see what is in their local library catalogs. Once added, librarians and patrons will be able to access these library catalogs electronically twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week from any Internet site.

The grants are funded through the Federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), and Library Vision 2010 (LV 2010), the long-range plan created by libraries across the state to facilitate resource sharing.

State Library Submits Budget

The North Dakota State Library submitted its 2005/2007 budget to the Office of Management and Budget on July 12, after a review by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The budget includes a base level that contains current services: statewide interlibrary loan, reference, training and continuing education, state aid to public libraries, grants to libraries, disability services, and state document services.

It also contains a two-part supplemental package, which are requests that did not "fit" into the base level: State Aid to Public Libraries totaling an additional \$1 million dollar request, and an Online Resources request totaling \$200,000.

The next step in the process is to request a hearing with the Office of Management and Budget in September. Library Coordinating Council members, library directors, and library supporters may attend the hearing and are encouraged to do so. The time and date will be sent out as soon as it is established.





After this date you can still order, but may not be guaranteed that everything will still be available. 

North Dakota Librarian of the Year

Minot Public Library Director Jerry Kaup has been named *Librarian of the Year* by the North Dakota Library Association. This award is presented to an NDLA member who has made notable contributions to the North Dakota Library profession.

Kaup has been at the Minot Public Library for over twenty-seven years and says receiving this honor has been a humbling experience. "I was flattered to receive this award. It makes me feel good that people think I have done great things for library services in North Dakota, and I thank them for that."

He attributes much of his success to other people looking out for him by helping him make important career decisions along the way. Libri Foundation Grants Application Deadline Approaching

Rural libraries may apply to the Libri Foundation for up to \$1,050 worth of new books. The Libri Foundation is a nationwide, nonprofit organization established for the sole purpose of helping rural libraries acquire quality children's books they could otherwise not afford. Through the program the Foundation donates new, quality, hardcover children's books to small, rural public libraries.



This is a 2-1 matching grant. The Friends of the Library or other local sponsors can contribute \$50 to \$350 to the library that will be matched by the Foundation. In general, a library should serve a population under 10,000, have a very limited budget, be in a rural area, and have an active children's department, but the applications are judged on an individual basis.

The Foundation awards grants three times a year. Application deadlines need to be postmarked by December 15, 2004. Grants are awarded January 31, April 30, and August 31. For more information go the Foundation's Web site at <http://librifoundation.org/#GUIDE>.

Previous grant recipients are eligible to apply for a second grant three years after the receipt of their first grant. Libraries that do not fulfill all the grant requirements, including the final report, are not eligible for a second grant.

Since October 1990, the Foundation has donated over \$2,300,000 worth of new children's books to more than 1,800 libraries in 48 states.




Library Vision 2004/2010 and Library Services Technology Act funding has enabled 68 libraries to become part of the statewide library catalog.

State Library Presents Budget to OMB

The North Dakota State Library presented its 2005-2007 budget to the Office of Management and Budget on Wednesday, October 13, 2004.

The proposed budget includes a base budget that contains current services: statewide interlibrary loan, reference, training and continuing education, state aid to public libraries, Library Vision 2010 grant funds, disability services, and state document services.

It also contains a supplemental package that includes an additional \$1 million dollar request for State Aid to Public Libraries, and a request for \$200,000 for additional online library resources.

The budget hearing provided an opportunity to share what the information needs are of North Dakota libraries and citizens across the state.

Information on dates for legislative budget hearings will be made available through the State Library and NDLA lists.
