Those seeking a pithy, tongue-incheek, and eminently readable companion to Shakespeare (or simply a way to liven up a classroom discussion) shall rejoice in Martin and Tichenor's *Reduced Shakespeare: the Complete Guide for the Attention-Impaired [abridged]*. The authors know and love the Bard in all his complexities and absurdities, and it shows in their discussions of his life, work, and legacy. Wanting a four-word moral from *Henry V*? "England good. France bad."

Library Legislation

The 2007 Legislature will be reviewing, listening to testimony, and acting upon four pieces of library legislation.

The State Library has submitted a bill to clarify the requirement in law to collect and publish statistics for public libraries. The law currently says that statistics need to be collected for all libraries, but school and academic libraries do not submit their statistics to the State Library. The State Auditor's office requested this clarification.

The State Library submitted its biennial request for funding to the Governor's office, which becomes part of his request to the legislature for all state government services. Current services that were included are reference and resource sharing, Online Library Resources (Opposing Viewpoints, Health and Wellness, and Ancestry Library Edition), state documents, talking books and the radio reading program, \$1,000,000 in state aid for public libraries, library training, and Library Vision 2010 grants. An optional, additional package is also part of the request which includes a person to provide enhanced training and additional funding of \$200,000 for state aid to public libraries.

Two pieces of legislator-sponsored legislation will be a part of the 2007 session. A bill to change the maintenance of effort part of the State Aid to Public Libraries Law will be introduced. This will change the requirement from the mill levy being the basis of eligibility to the dollars appropriated from the mill levy as the eligible requirement. This will bring the interpretation back to the way it has been for the first 26 years, from 1980-2005, and make all but one public library eligible for state aid in 2007. In 2006, 47 out of 104 public libraries were not eligible for state aid. An emergency clause is attached to the bill which would make it effective as soon as the Governor signs it. The second piece of legislator-sponsored legislation is a bill that will retroactively fund those public libraries that were not eligible in 2006 for state aid. The North Dakota Library Association is seeking \$197,734 for this legislation.

The North Dakota Library Association (NDLA) will play an active role in supporting these legislative bills. NDLA President, Beth Postema, interim director of the Fargo Public Library, has appointed Kelly Steckler, director of the Mandan Public Library, the legislative chair for the upcoming session. Ilene Larson will again serve as the lobbyist for NDLA. Watch the NDLA list serv for information about these bills.

Most of what you need for following bills during the 60th Legislative Assembly, which convenes January 3, 2007, is available from the legislative branch Web site at <u>http://www.legis.nd.gov/</u>.

The following printed materials of the 60th Legislative Assembly of North Dakota (2007) are available after December 11, 2006, upon payment of the appropriate subscription fee. Prices differ, depending on whether the documents are picked up from the bill and journal room or are delivered by first-class mail as soon as they become available for distribution.

The price list for subscribing to paper copies of documents is (subscription fees are nonrefundable):

- A set of bills and resolutions as introduced and printed or reprinted, \$160 if picked up; \$270 to receive by mail.
- A set of bills and resolutions as introduced and printed or reprinted, including a set of all engrossed and reengrossed bills and resolutions, \$290 if picked up; \$465 to receive by mail.
- 3. A set of the daily journals of the House and the Senate, \$90 if picked up; \$200 to receive by mail.
- 4. A copy of the House and Senate Journal Index (available after final adjournment), \$30 whether picked up or mailed.
- 5. A set of weekly committee hearing schedules of the House and Senate, free if picked up; \$30 to receive by mail.
- 6. A set of daily calendars of the House and Senate, free if picked up; \$55 to receive by mail.
- 7. A daily bill status report, \$350 if picked up; \$460 to receive by mail.

In order to subscribe to any of these legislative documents, you must complete a <u>legislative document</u> <u>subscription service (2007) form</u> available from the Web site. You may also request a form by telephone (701) 328-2916, fax (701) 328-3615, or mail Legislative Council, State Capitol, 600 E. Boulevard, Bismarck, ND 58505-0360. A completed form must be sent along with a check in the appropriate amount payable to NORTH DAKOTA LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Pilot Project Begins By Stacey Goldade

Three North Dakota libraries have been chosen for a pilot project. Hebron Public Library, Hebron Public School, and Glen Ullin Public School will have their holdings added to WorldCat (OCLC), which is an international database with over 70 million titles. WorldCat (OCLC) is available on the State Library Web site.

The purpose of the project is to allow the libraries involved to use whatever circulation system they choose, but still participate in the Interlibrary Loan program in the state. Since the libraries involved are geographically close to each other, another benefit is that they can easily share books with each other by sending them with teachers who are traveling back and forth between the two towns.

The project entails work by the staff of the libraries and the Statewide Catalog Development Department of the State Library. The staff of the libraries supplied the State Library with information on the titles they owned. The State Library staff is now in the process of cataloging each title into WorldCat (OCLC).

While the project is not yet complete, everyone involved is excited to see the results of this new idea. When the cataloging is completed, North Dakota libraries will be notified of how they will be able to contact the libraries to borrow something that they own.







LIBRARY LEGISLATION MID-SESSION UPDATE

<u>SB 2013</u>

The State Library presented its 2007-2009 Budget to the Senate Appropriations Committee on Thursday, January 18, 2007. The base budget includes: funding for Online Library Resources, Library Vision 2010 grant funds, training, interlibrary loan and reference services, technical assistance, MINITEX resource sharing contract, statewide cataloging services, services to persons with disabilities, and the State Document Depository Program. The optional budget includes an additional \$200,000 for State Aid to Public Libraries and an additional FTE to provide training statewide on the Online Library Resources and statewide library catalog. It was passed by the Senate, 46-1. The House Appropriations subcommittee has not yet made a decision on the bill; it will go to the entire committee at a later date.

SB 2061

This bill includes a change in the Duties of the State Librarian to compile statistics on public libraries, rather than all libraries. It was passed unanimously by the Senate and House and now goes to Governor Hoeven for his signature.

HB 1103

HB 1103 is a bill to change the part of the State Aid to Public Libraries law that addresses maintenance of local effort by public libraries in order to be eligible for state aid. The House passed it 92-0, including the emergency clause, and referred it to the Senate Political Subdivisions Committee.

HB 1309

HB 1309 is a bill for an Act to provide an appropriation up to \$200,000 for libraries that did not receive State Aid to Public Library payments in 2006. It was passed by the House 90-4, and sent to the Senate.

Information for legislative budget hearings will be distributed weekly during the session through the State Library LISTS(s) on Fridays. For up-to-date information about the North Dakota Legislative Assembly, hearing schedules, and legislative bills, go to <u>http://www.legis.nd.gov/</u>.

New Grant Guidelines

The grant guidelines for the fiscal years 2007-2008 will be available on the North Dakota State Library homepage, <u>http://ndsl.lib.state.nd.us</u>, by April 30, 2007.

The North Dakota State Library will begin a grant round April 30, 2007. The categories this year include Opportunity Knocks, Expanding Library Services, Libraries Leading The Way, Participate in the Statewide Online Catalog Through WorldCat, and Automate Your Library by Participating in ODIN, Infolynx, or the North Central Library Authority Union Catalog. All grant applications must be postmarked no later than July 1, 2007. Watch your mail for a copy of these grant guidelines. Grant awards will be made by September 1, 2007.

Construction in the Heart of America

The Heart of America Library in Rugby is completing an expansion project that has



been in the planning and fundraising stages since 1997. An addition of 1,250 sq. ft. was added to the west end of the building with construction beginning in 2005, and completion to be in 2007. This created more space for the junior collection and added a reading corner for parents and children to relax. Handicap

accessible restrooms were constructed and automatic door openers installed in the new one-level entrance. A director's office and cataloging area were created close to the new circulation/reference desk. An art and reading area became possible when the old entrance and restrooms were removed. With the help of a LSTA/LV2010 grant, a computer area for the public was created. The library collection was automated in 2005 and became a member of the North Central Library Authority when the library received a State Library grant. The library is a public library funded with city and county funds.

ODIN Catalog, Who's New?

School and public libraries in North Dakota have been awarded grants from the North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council to add their titles to ODIN (Online Dakota Information Network). The libraries that receive these grants provide bibliographic information to the State Library. The Statewide Catalog Development Department at the State Library is responsible for adding the titles to the ODIN and WorldCat database. Northwood Public School, Larimore High School, and Larimore Elementary School are cataloging projects that have recently been completed. Anne Vig, librarian at Northwood, says "Our teachers were shown how to use this system at an inservice before school began in August." Other libraries that recently received grants are: Carrington City Library, Wishek School Library, Maple Valley Elementary School in Buffalo, Divide County/Elementary Library and Divide County High School Library, both in Crosby. The State Library will be adding these collections to ODIN to enrich the statewide online catalog and increase the number of titles that North Dakota citizens can access. Once the projects are completed, these libraries will loan their titles via the Interlibrary Loan program in the state.

"To the good people who keep talking books coming to people who can no longer see to read. Heartfelt Thanks! I'm sure I have no inkling of the work, perhaps frustrations involved in keeping those books coming to us. It is a wonderful service." ~Talking Book Patron

We've also heard many times over that after a patron has lost their sight, being on the Talking Book program has opened a whole new world for them. Along with the Talking Books, the Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS) is another appreciated service that Disability Services offers patrons. Hearing the local news along with daily features, obituaries, and the weekly grocery ads keeps patrons in contact with their communities. Knowing that it's more than just a service, it's that it is making a difference in someone's life, is what makes the job rewarding.



Legislative Funding for North Dakota Libraries

The State Library was involved in legislation during the 60th Legislative Session ranging from statistics collecting to increasing State Aid to Public libraries by 20 percent. The North Dakota Library Association proposed and supported two bills that affected State Aid to Public Libraries. In total, the following four bills, now signed by the Governor, enhance and increase support for library services in North Dakota.

SB 2061 - Changed the duties of the State Librarian so that statistics are compiled on public libraries rather than all libraries.

HB 1103 - Changed the part of the State Aid to Public Libraries law that addresses the maintenance of local effort by public libraries in order to be eligible for state aid.

HB 1309 - Began as a request for \$200,000 for public libraries who did not receive state aid in 2006; was amended to

equalize in 2008 the amounts between those who received more and those who did not receive funding in 2006.

SB 2013 - This appropriation to fund the State Library increased funding for State Aid to Public Libraries by \$200,000 (20 percent) and funded a person to provide training to librarians, library staff, public library boards, students, faculty, and citizens to learn to search the Online Library Resources and statewide library catalog. It also continued current funding for Library Vision 2010 grants, Online Library Resources, training, interlibrary loan and reference services, technical assistance, resource sharing, statewide catalog development, services to persons with disabilities, and the State Document Depository Program.

Tech Tips from the State Library

Microsoft has recently released the latest version of Windows called Vista. Many retail outlets have switched completely to Vista and you cannot even buy a PC from them with any other version of Windows. Vista is going through the same kind of growing pains that any new software experiences. In the case of operating systems, there can be problems with compatability between the new operating systems and existing software and hardware. These things usually get resolved in the first few months after general release.

Additional well received programs included Find Me the Money, a panel discussion on grants, gave out valuable information for people searching for grants or needing specific questions answered about the grant process; and Public Library Laws and Patron Confidentiality, and How to Conduct a Meeting and Performance Review, which were covered in an informative workshop facilitated by Dr. Richard Ott.

Database training, featured at the Bismarck workshops, was well attended and well received. Overall, the workshops were a success despite the fact the weather was more like Old Man Winter than a Spring Fling. The staff at the North Dakota State Library looks forward to planning next year's 2008 Spring Workshops which will be filled with quality programs and presentations.

Fargo Public Library Building Projects Update

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
Fargo's Main Library - The closing of Fargo's downtown library in December 2006, brought an end to almost 40 years of library service in that facility. In order to continue to provide library service to Fargo's downtown during the construction period, a temporary downtown facility opened quietly in late January at 408 Roberts Street. This location will serve as the downtown library for the next 14 months while the new main library is under construction. This building is home to 35,000 items, which is about 25 percent of the main library's collection.

There are 10 Internet-accessible computers and a small storytime area. Because many items from Fargo's main library were not able to be reused or stored, area libraries and other non-profit organizations benefited by aquiring these items for their use at no cost. These libraries and non-profits included the following: Griggs County Public Library, Stutsman County Library, Sitting Bull Technical College Library, NDSU Library, Watts Free Library in Leonard, North Dakota, Grand Forks Public Library, YWCA, Head Start/SENDCAA, Minnkota PAAWS, Moorhead Alternative High School, Dakota Boys Ranch, AGAPE Ministries, and Better World Books.

The libraries that are added are chosen by the North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Coordinating Council based on grant applications they submitted. The grant recipients are responsible for providing bibliographic information for all their books, videos, etc. The grant library is able to function normally throughout the project. The cataloging staff of NDSL add each individual title to ODIN and when the cataloging phase is complete, the librarian is trained in how to use ODIN to check materials out to their patrons. Comments from librarians include "Thank you so much for your diligence and efficiency in cataloging our library books! I appreciate all that you do for our school library" and "Your department does a great job and I appreciate it! Thank you so much."

Online Library Resources Available to Citizens and Libraries Statewide!

Thanks to fiscal support from our state legislature and LSTA grant moneys, the following subscription resources are available to all citizens and libraries throughout North Dakota:

eLibrary and eLibrary Elementary – These great educational resources provide access to newspaper and magazine articles, reference books, maps, images, audio and video files, and transcripts from news programming. They're wonderful for school projects and basic research.

Health & Wellness Resource Center – This is a great resource for lay-level health information. The Health & Wellness Resource Center allows you to search through medical journals, health-related newspaper articles, find prescription drug information, browse through a medical encyclopedia or dictionary, and find contact information for health organizations. If you're not a textual learner, there are also numerous videos presented by health professionals on topics ranging from acid reflux to x-rays (and beyond!)

Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center – A wonderful place to find information and opinion articles on controversial issues, such as abortion, global warming, immigration, nuclear proliferation, or the war in Iraq. Resources include newspaper, magazine, and journal articles; reference sources; primary sources; statistics; essays; and recommended websites. Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center is a great place to turn for debate teams, social studies classes, or anyone looking to learn more about today's hot topics.

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Ancestry Library Edition – This is a vast and everexpanding electronic warehouse of genealogical information. You can search through historical records (census, military, birth, marriage, death, immigration, etc.), newspaper stories, books, photos, and maps. Note that unlike the other resources in this article, Ancestry Library Edition can only be accessed from within a library.

WorldCat (OCLC FirstSearch) – The largest database of library holdings (Books, CDs, DVDs, etc.) in the world. North Dakota citizens can use this constantly expanding database to locate materials that can be ordered through their library. This resource is especially useful for librarians who work with collection development, cataloging, or interlibrary loan.

You can access these resources through your local library's website or through the State Library's website at <u>www.library.nd.gov</u>. If you're not accessing these resources from within your library, you will need to sign in to access them.

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Get Help with Your Homework: Use Online Library Resources


It's the beginning of another school year and time for reports and assignments. Students, teachers, and parents can access valuable educational resources from school or home through the State Library's homepage at <u>www.library.nd.gov</u>. These resource databases contain a broad range of full-text and multimedia content and are free to all North Dakota citizens, thanks to funding from libraries in the state and the North Dakota Legislature. Resources include full-text articles, citations, images, maps, transcripts, audio and video clips. Online articles can be printed, emailed or saved to disk.

Child-friendly resources for K-5 include **Kids Info-Bits** and **eLibrary Elementary**. These databases are simple to use and are targeted to younger readers. They contain thousands of colorful graphics and full-text articles. Young students can ask questions in natural language or use search terms and they can follow topic trees to narrow and focus searches.

Resources targeted to students in grades 5-12 include the **Discovering Collection**, **Student Edition**, **Junior Edition**, and **Junior Reference Collection**. Here students will find thousands of images and articles from newspapers and popular magazines. Included in the databases are topic overviews, biographies, reference materials, and homework help.

Databases created for high school students, college students, and the general public include: **Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center** (covers current topics and gives both sides of issues); **eLibrary** (simple to search, it includes television and radio transcripts); **Health & Wellness Resource Center** (medical encyclopedia, drug finder, health assessment tools, health news, and health videos); **EBSCOhost Research databases** (Business and Academic information source, includes peer-reviewed articles); **Pro-Quest Newspapers** (over 600 international, national, regional, and local newspaper, most are fulltext).

The Online Library Resources available through the State Library and local libraries are a great place for students to begin research for papers and projects. Parents and teachers can rest assured that these databases are evaluated for quality and are appropriate for students of all ages. ND Librarians Attend Rural Library Sustainability Conference at ALA in Washington, D.C.

In June, delegates from 35 states gathered in conference and community to discuss Rural Sustainability of libraries in Washington. We met fellow directors and library personnel who had connected via computer on Web Junction - (the Web site for the connection of rural librarians) set up by the Gates Foundation. We had our own conference time before the ALA gathering of over 26,000. There were interesting introductions from each state represented. We told them of clean air - enough for wind farms in North Dakota. We said that, yes, we have cowboys and Indians and buffalo but we call them ranchers and producers, Native Americans and bison. As the #1 producer of sunflowers, we brought a small sample for each of the other states represented there.

Our time in the afternoon centered on answering the question, "What does it mean if our libraries are the hub of the community?" We rotated in discussion groups and found a wealth of ideas from around the country. One Nebraska library uses their library facility for receptions after funerals in their small town.

There was a presentation from Parker, Arizona that inspired our libraries through COMMUNITY, CONCEPT, COLOR, COLLECTION, CONNECTIVITY AND COMMITMENT. The personal touch was most interesting. At our table was the Paraprofessional of 2007 from North Carolina (see Library Journal, March 1, 2007). We exchanged cards and stories with librarians from Hawaii, Colorado, Ohio and beyond.

The ALA Conference had a myriad of workshops and speakers. A highlight for me was hearing the words of some of my favorite authors like Patricia Cornwell, David Baldacci and Lois Lowry. Others from the ND contingent went to workshops and were inspired by Robert F. Kennedy, Jr.'s presentation. There were hundreds of booths in the exhibit hall offering books, informational and promotional items. Many authors and illustrators were there to sign books.

With our "extra" time we did a lot of walking - I repeat - a lot of walking to the sights of Washington, D.C. and an evening tour of monuments. We visited Senator Dorgan's office and had an escort to the senate in session.

Speaking for the five from North Dakota, it was an honor to represent our state and rural libraries. It was inspiring to see ourselves as a part of the picture of literacy and learning in the USA. The five participants from North Dakota were selected from among the 68 rural library directors, staff, and board members who participated in the "Bright Ideas, Bright Future" workshops, which were held in Mandan on February 9, and Fargo on February 16. The workshops were conducted as part of the Rural Library Sustainability Project, a cooperative effort of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, WebJunction, and the North Dakota State Library. Attending

the national conference from North Dakota were: Priscilla Backstrom, Maddock Community Library; Lynda Dunn, Edgeley Public Library; Sarah Snavely, Bowman County Public Library; Beth Reitan, Bottineau County Library; and Suzann Jangula, Harry L. Petrie Public Library, Linton.

The library collection of the North Dakota Game and Fish Department can now be accessed through ODIN. The Game and Fish Deptartment has a collection of approximately 5,000 volumes including books and journals covering a range of topics in the subject areas of wildlife biology and management. A large part of the collection is comprised of research reports issued by various national and state-level wildlife agencies from the 1920s to the 1970s, but it also includes current materials covering zoological and management aspects of big game animals, waterfowl, upland game birds, furbearing animals, and freshwater fish.

This non-circulating collection is housed at the main headquarters of the North Dakota Game and Fish Department at 100 E. Expressway in Bismarck. Materials can be accessed by visiting the Game and Fish Department, by in-library use at the North Dakota State Library, or via photocopy request through the interlibrary loan system at your local library or the State Library. To search for items in the North Dakota Game and Fish Department Library, connect to the North Dakota State Library in ODIN, and select ND-Game & Fish Deptartment from the "ND State Libraries and Branches" dropdown box on the lower right of the Basic Search screen. The Game and Fish Department Library is one of ten state government agency libraries that are cataloged. maintained and made accessible to the public by the North Dakota State Library Statewide Catalog Development Department. 

If you would like to request large print books, you can do so by using the Advanced Search page of the ODIN catalog and limiting your format to large print. You can also contact the State Library and ask that a variety of large print items be mailed to you.

State Library Training via the Web Debuts

New online training sessions are being designed to reach librarians who have limited or no budgets to travel to conferences and workshops for professional development.

Online training will offer librarians more flexibility in their daily schedules for gaining professional training. For instance, online training can be scheduled in the morning before libraries are open or scheduled at night after hours. Courses could also be taken at home. The software used is a product called Team2Team On Demand Web-Conferencing. This software allows for the recording of sessions and archiving them in case you missed the live session. Also, the presenter can give an attendee shared control of the mouse, allowing for someone who likes hands-on learning an opportunity to participate in the demonstration. Each Web Conferencing user's system must meet the following requirements:

- Windows 98 or later
- Internet Explorer 5.5 or later
- 1024 x 768 screen resolution
- Microsoft Virtual Machine (VM) or Sun Java Runtime Environment (JRE) installed and enabled, as follows:
 - For Internet Explorer 5.5 or later: Microsoft VM 1.1.4 build 3740 or later, Sun JRE 1.3.1_08 or later, or Sun JRE 1.4.2_05 or later.
 - For Netscape 4.75 and later Netscape 4.x versions: Sun JRE 1.3.1_08 or later.
 - For Mozilla 1.0 or later, Netscape 7.0, and later Netscape 7.x versions: Sun JRE 1.4.2_05 or later.
 - For Firefox 1.0.2 or later versions: Sun JRE 1.4.1_03 or later. Pop-up blocking must be disabled in your browser (all pop-up blockers absolutely have to be turned off).

A workshop titled New Opportunities, New Possibilities: Online Training offered through the North Dakota State Library was presented at the North Dakota Library Association in September. This workshop introduced the audience to the programs the staff will be using to provide additional training online to North Dakota librarians. Online programs are currently being developed, so keep an eye out for announcements on the LISTS for new training opportunities and possibilities being offered by the North Dakota State Library.

Genealogy is considered by most to be the fastest growing hobby in North America. Once you get started, it's hard to stop. Research is getting easier to do with free access to Ancestry Library Edition, one of the largest genealogy databases in the world. Ancestry is easily navigable and has information from across the United States. Canada, the UK & Ireland, Europe, and Australia. You can start looking at databases by clicking on the map for the area you are interested in or just do a simple name search. Ancestry Library Edition includes immigration records, birth, death, and marriage records, biographies, user submitted family trees, and much more. The following are databases available through Ancestry Library Edition that could be very helpful in starting your genealogy research:

Interlibrary Loan is a cooperative arrangement among North Dakota libraries to share their collections so that citizens have access to materials and information that are not available in their local library. Any North Dakota state resident can request an item from the State Library. The State Library then borrows the material or obtains a photocopy from another library on the person's behalf.

photocopy from another library on the person's behalf. When the request comes into the State Library, the Document Delivery Department staff will find libraries that own the requested item. The library will then send the item directly to the patron. After a patron has used the requested item, it should be returned to the lending library. Once the item is checked in on the lending library's shelf the process will start all over again.

Last month, the Document Delivery Department processed 3,439 interlibrary loans, which figures out to about 150 per working day! The State Library staff looks forward to finding more items for your library and your patrons in the future. Happy Holidays!

A subscription to all of these databases and more has been purchased by the state of North Dakota for free use at your local library. Talking Books, Interlibrary Loan, and the Online Library Resources are all pleasant surprises to folks who stop by. Many fill out a new library card application on the spot. Others walk away with a variety of informative brochures and a snazzy refrigerator magnet.

Did you know that WorldCat can be used for a variety of things that will make your life easier? Are you wondering what book is next in a series? Do you want a list of titles from your favorite author? You can find these answers by searching WorldCat!

Librarians, you can get help in your daily work by using WorldCat. If you are having problems assigning a call number to a new book, you can see if there is a suggested call number in the bib record in WorldCat. Also, for those libraries with limited budgets, it might be helpful to see how many other libraries in the state own a particular title.

This may influence your decision on whether to buy a copy for your patrons or rely on Interlibrary Loan to fulfill their needs. Of course, interlibrary


loaning from other libraries does place a bit of a burden on the lending library because of postage costs, etc.; however, it can be a tool to help you evaluate how your budget should be spent. If a patron is requesting something popular, you'll probably want to purchase it yourself. If it's something that only a few patrons will use, it might be better to interlibrary loan it. To see a list of the libraries that own a certain title, just click on "Libraries worldwide that own item", which is found in the bib record display.

Grant Information

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The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council and the North Dakota State Library have awarded 2007 grant funds totaling \$137,239 to five North Dakota libraries. The projects include the Bowman Regional Public Library's laptop lab which targets computer literacy for teens and senior citizens; the Dickinson Area Public Library's portable computer lab to be used in partnership with the NDSU Extension Service for technology education; the Hankinson Public Library's computer project to offer distance education classes; and the Mandaree and Grafton Public School libraries projects to participate in the Statewide Library Online Catalog.

The Coordinating Council and the State Library released new grant guidelines in November. The guidelines are on the State Library's website and were also mailed to every school and public library in the state. The current grant round offers an opportunity for libraries to add their catalog to WorldCat, which will strengthen recourse sharing for citizens in North Dakota. Any library that is interested in this grant round may contact the State Library for more information.
