Teacher Tools eLibrary BookCart

Featured in the **eLibrary** and **eLibrary Elementary** databases are teacher tools for lesson planning, creating assignments, and giving multiple choice quizzes. Teachers and librarians can create virtual book carts that contain selected publications, reading lists, web links, and quizzes. The resources can be customized into digital lesson plans that focus on student research and classroom activities. Students can access and use the carts from school or home and email completed quizzes directly to the teacher.

Using the BookCart Editor, educators can easily create subject-specific carts containing links to relevant articles, images, maps, multimedia, favorite websites or Homework Central websites. Carts can be created for specific reference assignments or for special learning activities. Carts can also be shared by educators in the same school or any school in the district.

Teachers or librarians can create new book carts from scratch or access almost 500 existing carts created by ProQuest Curriculum Specialists. These existing carts can be copied and then edited or changed to meet local classroom needs. Educators can also search for existing carts to edit by using the standard search or by using the grade level search feature to customize resources to specific reading levels or curriculum standards.

State Documents Department

The State Library administers the North Dakota State Document Depository Program. This program ensures the permanent retention of documents published by North Dakota state agencies, and catalogs them for easy public access via ODIN. State documents include reports, newsletters, brochures, and meeting minutes, as well as maps, videos, and sound recordings.

Agencies are required by the North Dakota Century Code to submit eight copies of every publication intended for general public distribution to the State Library. Six of those copies are then distributed to the other depository libraries - State Historical Society, University of North Dakota, North Dakota State University, Minot State University, Valley City State University, and the Library of Congress. The remaining two copies are retained by the State Library, one for circulation and one for permanent retention. Although the circulating copy says 'Ask at desk' next to the call numbers, this simply means that a library employee will need to pull it from the shelf. The item can still be checked out in person or requested through interlibrary loan.

The State Library currently receives and disseminates about 200 titles per month from over 150 agencies.

In addition, a rapidly-increasing number of documents are being published electronically, either as well as or instead of on paper. Electronic documents can be accessed through ODIN the same way as the print versions; both formats are retrieved through one simple search. All electronic documents are currently in .pdf form and are viewed via a link to a website. No downloading is required.

2008 Spring Workshops: Back to Basics

The 2008 Spring Workshops are just around the corner. The State Library will hold the workshops at two locations: Grand Forks on March 31st and April 1st at the Ramada Inn, and Bismarck on April 3rd and 4th at the Best Western Doublewood Inn and the Bismarck State College Library Computer Lab. This year, the workshops are going "Back to the Basics" with programs on teen library services, the summer reading program, organizing a book club at your library, de-selection and weeding, applying for E-Rate for telecommunication services, an overview of services offered to libraries from the North Dakota State Library, applying for North Dakota State Library grants, and more. We will also be bringing in representatives from the vendors who supply the Online Library Resources from (Bismarck workshop only). Mark your calendars! State Library Receives Award

Congratulations to the second place winner for Minitex's "Top Ten Catalogers in the Minitex Region Award". The State Library's Catalogers created 2,346 original records in 2007. That means 729 more original records were created in 2007 than in 2006. This award is given to libraries that contribute the most original cataloging records to OCLC within the Minitex region. Minnesota State University at Mankato took first place with 2,429 records.
