Divide County Library

Better access to information— isn't that what we all strive toward? The Divide County Library has recently taken a Bigfoot-sized step to ensure that its patrons have access to the most up-to-date and accurate information possible. With help from a 2006 Library Vision 2010/Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant, the library was able to make technology upgrades, catalog their items into an automated library system, and become an active participant in the ODIN consortium of libraries.

Leslie Deering, director of the Divide County Library, reports that overall, library users are thrilled and proud of the library's digital facelift. "It's really eased up the search process. We can now find exactly what our patrons want", Deering said. "The system is so user-friendly." Divide County Library patrons now have access to the library's collection of over 30,000 items, as well as the ability to search for items beyond their community by using the ODIN network. Deering also stated that the library has seen an increase in library patronage, both from new patrons and even from existing patrons who begin their research at home and visit the library to continue their search.

Divide County students are especially happy about the ability to do subject searching with the new ODIN search interface. Alysa Palmer, librarian at Divide County High School and Elementary School agrees. "The elementary kids love looking for books using the online catalog," she said. Using the old card catalog system, especially with its localized errors that had been ingrained over time, was a daunting, almost impossible task. Now, however, the librarians get excited about the ability to help both elementary and secondary students with their subject searching.

Without the assistance that the Divide County Library received from this grant, none of these changes would have occurred. "We appreciate the fabulous service that the State Library has provided and look forward to when we can begin sharing our resources with other libraries," Deering said. The State Library administered the grant and cataloged each of the 30,000 items into the ODIN catalog. Upcoming plans to show off the new and improved Divide County Library include an Open House and a membership drive, which will focus on how the library is better equipped to provide access to information.

The Technical Services Department works behind the scenes to acquire materials for the North Dakota State Library's collection and prepares them to be accessed by patrons and other libraries. This department is responsible for the acquisition of new materials in a variety of formats, including books, journals, and audio and video recordings, with special emphasis on acquiring materials produced by North Dakotans or about North Dakota. The Technical Services staff also handles the cataloging and processing of all new materials, including adding North Dakota State Library bibliographic records and holdings to the ODIN and WorldCat online catalogs, assigning call numbers, and attaching labels and barcodes so items may be found on the shelves and checked out. The department also catalogs and processes federal government publications received through the State Library's participation in the Federal Depository Library Program. Without the hard work of the Technical Services Department, patrons would not be able to locate or access materials, whether searching for them in the online catalog or looking for an item on the library's shelves.

Summer Classes Offered for Graduate Credit

The North Dakota State Library training staff is offering classes in two locations for one graduate credit this summer. Classes will be held in Williston at the Williston State College, June 16-17, and in Bismarck at the Bismarck State College in the library computer lab, June 19-20. The cost is \$10.00.

Advanced Online Research

Advanced Online Research will explore basic and advanced searching methods for the ODIN catalog,

available Online Library Resources, and Internet sites selected by North Dakota State Library staff. This class is designed for school teachers and school library media specialists who have a basic familiarity with the online resources. **Note: the content of this course covers the same materials as Electronic Resources Searching Techniques that was taught in 2006.**

Credit for Advanced Online Research is available for teachers from Minot State University, University of North Dakota, and North Dakota State University. Credit is available for school library media specialists from Valley City State University. Registration will be posted on the State Library's Web site: www.library.nd.gov, or you may register with Sue Clark at 1-800-472-2104.



For credit through Minot State University, University of North Dakota, and North Dakota State University, there is a \$50.00 graduate credit fee, which is due on the first day of classes (please write separate checks for the graduate credit fee and the workshop fee).

For credit through Valley City State University, you may register directly and also pay online through Valley City State University by linking to their website: https://secure.vcsu.edu/extend/profdev-registration.htm. If you chose not to pay online, you may pay on the first day of classes. There is a \$10.00 workshop fee, in addition to the \$50.00 graduate credit cost, paid to the instructors on the first day of classes (please write separate checks for the graduate credit fee and the workshop fee). **Recertification credit for Library Media Specialists must be taken from Valley City State University.**
