# **State Library Welcomes Hulen Bivins**

There's a new face at the North Dakota State Library. Hulen Bivins began duties as State Librarian on December 6th. Bivins is replacing former State Librarian Doris Ott, who retired in November.

Bivins previously served as the Assistant Director of the Alabama Public Library Service where he coordinated the Field Services staff, in-agency library programs, services to the Blind and Physically Handicapped, and the certification program for the payment of state funds to libraries in accord with state regulations. With more than 35 years of librarian experience, he has also worked with the Public Library of Nashville (TN) and the library system of Marshall University (WVA).

"I am excited about the opportunity to work with a State Library agency known for its dedication to library services that enhance the quality of life for the citizens that it serves," Bivins said. "Whether the service rendered is for educational or leisure interest, the 100% effort of the library staff is exemplary. It is my personal hope that the vision that I bring to the staff shall challenge standard perceptions, create more analysis, and result in even more quality services for the citizens of North Dakota."



Bivins holds a B.A. in History from Lipscomb University, an M.S.L.S. in Library Science from the University of Tennessee, and a J.D. from the Jones School of Law at Faulkner University.

## \$200,000 INCREASE FOR STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES

Governor Dalrymple presented his budget to the Legislature on December 8, 2010. The great news for libraries is that he included full funding for the State Library's current services and an additional \$200,000 for State Aid to Public Libraries!

State Aid to Public Libraries is distributed to city and county libraries based on the formula of \$1 per capita for cities and \$1 per capita and \$5 per square mile for counties. The funding supports the ability to purchase additional materials, add staffing, and upgrade technology for public libraries.

The governor's budget recommendation includes current services such as Minitex, Library Vision 2014 grants, librarian and public training, interlibrary loan, reference services, state documents, statewide cataloging, and talking book services for the disabled.

State Librarian Hulen Bivins will present supporting testimony to the Senate appropriations committee for the State Library budget, including State Aid to Public Libraries.

Students and teachers in North Dakota now have access to EBSCO's Searchasaurus, a database designed for students in grades K through 3. It is a colorful interface with a dinosaur theme that searches the Primary Search database resources. Searchasaurus is a fun way for young researchers to experi-

ence online searching, and it helps students develop basic searching skills.

From the Searchasaurus home page, students can search by keywords or topics. To search by keyword, enter terms in the Find box and click Search. The search is performed and the results are displayed. To search by topic, just click on a topic (for example, Animals), then click a subtopic (for example, Mammals), then Horse; the search results are displayed.

You can also combine a keyword search with a topic search. This might be useful if you want to search for information about bears (the animal), but don't want information about the Chicago Bears football team. For a combined search, you must choose the topic first (for example, Animals), then enter "bears" in the Find box. Searchasaurus displays a list of articles relating to your keyword within the topic you selected.

Searching by Lexile ranges is also possible. Below the Find box, select a Lexile level, enter your search terms in the Find box, and click Search. Lexile searching works with keyword searching only.

The home page also features buttons to search for dictionary words, encyclopedia articles, or pictures. Students can explore the Top Searches of the day or read Fun Facts of the day. The Teachers Resources link allows teachers to search educational journals, ERIC, and curriculum standards.

Searchasaurus accesses a variety of primary resources including full-text magazines, newspapers, Funk & Wagnall's New World Encyclopedia, American Heritage Children's Dictionary, Encyclopedia of Animals, reference books, biographies, photos, and maps.

Students, teachers, and parents can access Searchasaurus, and other valuable online educational databases, from school or home. Parents and teachers can be confident that these databases are evaluated for quality and are appropriate for students. Contact the State Library at 800-472-2104 for more details.

The North Dakota State Library and the Collaborative Summer Library Program (CSLP) have recently partnered to create the 2011 "You Are Here" Teen Video Contest.
