THE BIG READ DEADLINE: JANUARY 28

The Big Read is a program of the National Endowment for the Arts designed to revitalize the role of literature in American culture and to encourage citizens to read for pleasure and enlightenment. The Big Read provides organizations with grants and comprehensive resources that support their efforts to inspire their community to read and discuss a single book or the work of a poet. Eligible organizations may apply for a grant ranging from \$2,500 to \$20,000. Grants must be matched 1 to 1 with nonfederal funds. Grant funds may be used for such expenses as book purchases, speaker fees and travel, salaries, advertising, and venue rental. http://bit.ly/1eTGxI8

NEA STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT GRANTS

The NEA Foundation provides grants to improve the academic achievement of students in U.S. public schools and public higher education institutions in any subject area(s). The work should also improve students' habits of inquiry, self-directed learning, and critical reflection. 

North Dakota Tidbits

- After nearly a quarter century of dedicated service, Bonnie MacIver will be retiring from her position as
 director of the Leach Public Library (Wahpeton) on December 31. During her reign, she's overseen the
 automation of the library, the addition of public access computers, the opening of a new children's area in
 the library's basement, enrollment in ODIN and in the ND Digital Consortium, and much more. She has also
 been actively involved with the North Dakota Library Association throughout her career. We're going to miss
 you, Bonnie!
- The land the James River Valley Library System (Jamestown) intended to purchase from Essentia Health as the location for their new library was sold to MetroPlains, who intend to build senior and affordable housing units on it.
- The Valley City Barnes County Public Library received an impressive 25% budget increase, as approved by both city and county officials. Plans for the library include computer upgrades, expanded collection budget, downloadable e-books, computer upgrades, improved programming, and building maintenance and repairs.
- On December 8, the Lidgerwood Public Library hosted a Tour of Homes fundraiser. There were five stops
 on the tour, each festively decorated for the holidays with trees, snowman rugs, and nativities. Coffee, apple
 cider, and treats were served at the library. Around 100 people attended the event.
- The Hebron Public Library recently held a fundraiser through Avon, in which 25% of the orders went to support the library. The money will be used to support their story time programming.
- The Bowman Regional Library is holding a Winter Art Sale on December 13th-14th, featuring art, crafts, pottery, and note cards. It's a perfect twofer—supporting the local library and supporting local artists.
- The Valley City Barnes County Public Library will be doing massive technological upgrades, replacing staff
 and public access computers, as well as their network hardware. The upgrades will be funded in large part by
 their recently awarded Library Vision 2014 Grant of \$10,397.
- The Garrison Public Library hosted a release party for the film Catching Fire, to which all 7th-12th graders were invited. The party featured crafts, activities, a costume contest, and food.
- Last month, the Bismarck Veterans Memorial Library held a family-oriented program on the Lakota Language.
 The program featured a reading of a Berenstain Bears story in English by Whitetail Cross and a screening
 of the corresponding television episode in Lakota. The program was put on in partnership with the Lakota
 Language Nest, an early childhood program hosted by Sitting Bull College in Fort Yates
