



NORTH DAKOTA LIBRARY COORDINATING COUNCIL AWARDS GRANTS

The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) is responsible for approving the distribution of Library Vision 2014 (LV2014) grant program funding. The grant program receives funding each biennium from the North Dakota legislature. The Council establishes priorities and categories based on LV2014, and facilitates a grant program each year, making grants available to public and school libraries based on the priorities. Past priorities have included WorldCat to join the statewide library catalog, technology to access statewide databases and the statewide library catalog, innovative partnerships between a library and non-library entity, and the Military Family Contact laptop grants.

NDLCC UPDATES

An NDLCC article in the March 2012 Flickertale (found at <http://l.usa.gov/lbmuCOG>) outlined numerous issues that the council was addressing. Standards for public libraries have been established, and are available at the ND State Library website at <http://library.nd.gov/>. The standards will be used by the NDLCC in awarding grants, and you may note that they go into effect in 2015. The mentoring program for librarians is being developed by the North Dakota Library Association. The State Library has established a digitization program and has started to digitize county histories. The program will also include developing projects throughout the state with libraries and local historical groups.

FUTURE FOCUS MEETINGS

The Council will be having statewide focus group meetings in the spring of 2014 to receive public and librarian input on revising Library Vision 2014 and improving library development in North Dakota.

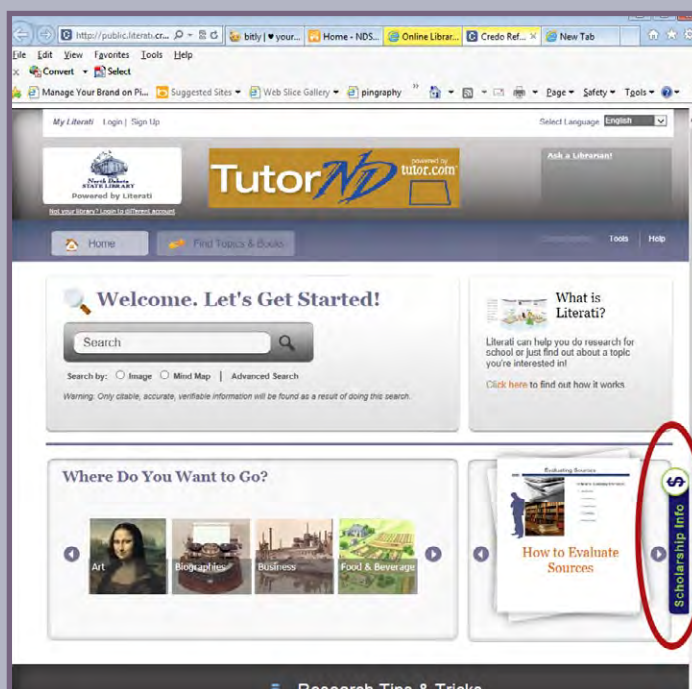
Find Scholarship Information in Funding Finder Express

Funding Finder Express is a financial aid database where you can find current and comprehensive scholarship information. It is accessed from a widget labeled "Scholarship Info" found on the Literati Public database webpage, along the lower right side.

Users will be able to find current scholarships, loans, awards, and grants. Students can customize searches to fit their profile and receive email alerts when new funding opportunities become available or deadline dates approach.

Our Town Grants (National Endowment for the Arts)

Art works to improve our lives in manifold ways. Communities across our nation are leveraging the arts and engaging design to make their communities more livable. Doing so, they enhance the quality of life, increase creative activity, provide a distinct sense of place, and stimulate local economies to capitalize on their existing assets.

According to the report Creative Placemaking, “creative placemaking animates public and private spaces, rejuvenates structures and streetscapes, improves local business viability and public safety, and brings diverse people together to celebrate, inspire, and be inspired.”

Organizations may apply for creative placemaking projects that contribute to the livability of communities and place the arts at their core. An organization may request a grant amount from \$25,000 to \$200,000. Find out more here: <http://arts.gov/grants-organizations/our-town>

Libri Foundation donates new, quality, hardcover children's books to small, rural public libraries in the United States. The foundation matches any amount of money raised by local sponsors (Friends of the Library or other local groups) from \$200-\$350 at a 2-to-1 ratio (for a total of up to \$1,050 worth of new children's books). TRAVELING HISTORICAL DISPLAYS COMING THIS SPRING

The North Dakota State Library (NDSL) is working on a program to celebrate the 125th anniversary of our statehood. The program will have eleven different displays that highlight parts of North Dakota history. These topics were chosen based off books we have in our collection, agency/organization willing to participate in this project, and resources available to NDSL. Each display will be a little different. They will come with five books from the NDSL collection, handout resources, a children's activity and a list of additional books that relate to that topic. Most of the displays will have some sort of visual pop-up display, access to S.E.N.D. trunks (from the historical society <http://l.usa.gov/HSKL7o>) and additional display items.

Her work has been translated into Norwegian, Danish, and German, and she has won the Silver Angel Award for *An Untamed Land* and a Romance Writers of America Golden Heart for *Song of Laughter*.

Several of her books are set in North Dakota, interweaving the stories of immigrants who helped settle and develop our beautiful state. The Blessing series is set in a fictional town called Blessing, North Dakota and a play has been written and performed based on the books.

North Dakota Tidbits

- The James River Valley Library System recently received a concept floor plan for a new facility from JLG Architects. The layout covers 28,000 square feet, including an expansive and inspiring children's area, a young adult room, a large meeting room and a smaller meeting room, an advanced technology classroom, a heritage collection room and archival storage room, an audio lab, more than two dozen public access computers, and several comfortable seating, study, and gathering areas. - North Dakota First Lady Betsy Dalrymple recently visited the Washington Elementary School Library in Valley City to speak about the Dolly Parton Imagination Library program. Imagination Library gives free books to children every month from birth to age five to promote early childhood literacy. First Lady Dalrymple has been instrumental in implementing this program in towns throughout North Dakota.
- The Leach Public Library in Wahpeton recently held their 28th annual Chocolate Day fundraiser for the library. The event is a combined chocolate dessert, coffee, and used book sale. It's put on by the Friends of the Leach Library and is the largest fundraiser the library has each year.
- The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library recently held two exciting adult programming events. The first featured Jennifer Pharr Davis, the National Geographic Adventurer of the Year, who has hiked more than 12,000 miles on long-distance trails on six continents. She holds the record for the fastest thru-hike of the Appalachian Trail. The second featured classical guitarist Peter Fletcher. Fletcher is a versatile player who has focused on the works of Mompou, Grieg, and Satie, as well as Baroque music.
- The Grand Forks Public Library began a new programming series called STEM Café. Occurring on the first Tuesday of each month, the series will feature science, technology, engineering, and math professionals sharing details about their careers, research, and expertise with the public.
- Williston State College recently held their first ever Lead with Literacy event, co-sponsored by the Williston Herald. The program featured a presentation from Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Mike Jacobs, speaking about his 35-year career with the Grand Forks Herald and their coverage of the 1998 Red River Flood. Also included in the event were a presentation from a teenaged North Dakota author, Mattie Richardson, writing classes for youth and adults, a spelling bee, and a used book sale.
- The Harry L. Petrie Library in Linton held a book signing event featuring five North Dakota authors on October 10th. The authors taking part in the event were Roxanne Henke, Bill Kraft, Angeline Reinbold Ibarra, Jeanne Schumacher, and Lynn D. Bueling.
- Sarah Matusz from the State Library recently held a hands-on technology clinic at the Edna Ralston Library in Larimore. The class focused on using the tablets and ereaders that are available for loan to ND libraries as part of our Technology Tool Kits.
- Montana-Dakota Utilities Resources Foundation recently awarded a \$4,000 grant to The Library Foundation which supports the Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library.
- The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library received a \$2,000 grant from Target for its 2014 Summer Reading Program.
