Summer Reading Kick off 2014

Fizz. BOOM. Read!

On May 30th, the North Dakota State Library, the North Dakota Heritage Center, and the Capitol were filled with children gathered together to celebrate reading, as the Bismarck and Mandan public libraries kicked off their summer reading programs. It was a full day of fun and activities for children in the Bismarck/Mandan and surrounding communities. Over 3,800 people attended the event and children had the opportunity to sign up to participate in the programs at the Bismarck and Mandan Public Libraries.

The day kicked off with an engaging story time with First Lady Betsy Dalrymple, a music show by children's entertainer Steve Weeks from Colorado, and a presentation on dinosaurs by State Paleontologist John Hoganson.

This year's slogan is "Fizz, Boom, Read!" so Gateway to Science presented a special "Fizzy, Exploding Science Show." The Discovery Dome from Dickinson State University was also on site with a "One World, One Sky" show.

In the State Library Reading Room, guest readers read their favorite stories to children. Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem, Secretary of State Al Jaeger, Chief Justice Gerald VandeWalle, and Kathleen Wrigley all read stories throughout the day.

Cash Wise Foods provided low-cost sack lunches for attendees, and activities were provided throughout the day by Geological Survey, the ND Forest Service, the ND State Water Commission, ND Parks and Recreation, Shade Tree Players, Girl Scouts, St. Alexius Medical Center, Sanford Health, Barnes and Noble, Dakota Zoo, the Bismarck/Mandan Genealogical Society, Action Jackson Comics, Theo Art School, Knife River Indian Villages, Fort Mandan, the Bismarck Police and Fire Departments, Burleigh and Morton County Sheriffs, Bismarck State College, Bismarck Downtown Artist Co-op, Leap of Faith Dance, Northern Plains Dance, Feil Orthodontics, RDO, and many more.

News and Thoughts...

from State Librarian Mary J. Soucie

At the beginning of June, I traveled to Sacramento, CA to meet with Western Council of State Libraries. This group is comprised of the State Librarians from all states west of the Mississippi River. It was a jam packed two days of meetings. The first day was our Continuing Education day. Drew Keller from Storyguide presented on the topic of video marketing. Here are a few points we learned from Drew.

The way we think of video has changed significantly. In 2013, there were 100 hours of content going up every minute on YouTube; those numbers are now even higher. YouTube is the second largest search engine in the world. Libraries are not as well represented on YouTube as they should be. We are missing a huge opportunity to engage with a significant amount of our users.

There are many different types of videos: how-to; interview; event coverage; point-of-sale; executive address just to name some. You need to define the purpose of the video and then decide on which format to use. Most online video viewers watch mere seconds, rather than minutes, of a video. It's imperative that you start with an engaging statement. From there, go into your brand and then content. Hook them early or you lose them. The overarching questions as you plan your video is why would someone look for this content and why is this something I need to do? You're defining the end, rather than the start, of your video.

There are different ways to use your videos:

Awareness- Splash video. These are about 45 seconds long and are also called landing page video. The purpose is to create emotional alignment with the organization.

Interest- Case Study. The purpose is to share information to help people make decisions. One example of a topic would be genealogy.

Credibility- Tutorials or how-to. The purpose is to establish credibility of the library as a resource to turn; establish the library as a subject matter expert (SME)

Community- local expert. The community creates and nurtures itself by utilizing user generated content (UC). This is the opportunity for the library to use videos created by patrons.

The best online videos educate, entertain, and inform the viewer. You want to create videos that are crisp, engaging, and informative. Stories are not just a retelling of facts. Think of a fiction book vs. a textbook; you want your videos to be more like fiction than textbooks. More data does not increase understanding, improve retention or make you look smarter- don't get buried in fact or data in your videos. Too much data is confusing. Pick one surprising fact, something that's a revelation to your audience or gives credence to the story and reveal it as you go through the video.

Think of video as a one-to-one conversation. Though thousands of people may see your video, they'll see it one at a time so talk as if you're talking to one person. You should write for the ear by using an active voice rather than a passive voice. Be clear and concise. If you're writing a script or someone brings you one, say it out loud to listen to it the way the audience will. Don't edit the video on the camera as you go along; it's much easier to edit content out than to add content that isn't there.

This is just a quick overview of the content that Drew shared with us. I will share more of my notes in future Flickertale columns. E-rate: the Funding Commitment Decision Letter

For those participating in E-rate, you should have been through the Program Integrity Review, submitted your answers to the reviewer's questions, and now you have received your Funding Commitment Decision Letter. After you receive your FCDL, you can start the preparations to begin receiving discounted services. You should discuss with your service provider(s) any details involved in the provision of services and invoicing for those services. Once services have started, you should be ready to file the FCC Form 486. After you have received your Funding Commitment Decision Letter (FCDL) and the delivery of your services has started, you file an FCC Form 486 to inform USAC that:

- Services for which you have been approved for discounts have started and invoicing can begin,
- Your technology plan (you are required to have one if applying for Priority Two category of services) has been approved by a USAC-certified Technology Plan Approver,
- You are in compliance with the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) (or CIPA does not apply because your application is only for telecommunications services and/or interconnected Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) services).

REMEMBER: THE FUNDING COMMITMENT DECISION LETTER IS NOT THE END OF THE PROCESS!

The FCC Form 486 must be certified no later than 120 days after the Service Start Date or 120 days after the date of the FCDL, whichever is later. Filing late can result in a reduction in funding; the later the filing date, the greater the reduction. After USAC has processed your FCC Form 486 and you have begun to receive services, you or your service provider can invoice USAC for the discount share of those services. There are two methods that can be used to invoice USAC.

Invoice Method #I

Applicants file FCC Form 472, the Billed Entity Applicant Reimbursement (BEAR) Form, if they have paid the service provider in full for the services and want to be reimbursed for the discount amount.

The service provider must approve the form before it is submitted to USAC. USAC will review the invoice and process a payment to the service provider if payment is approved. The service provider then passes the reimbursement on to the applicant.

Invoice Method #2

Service providers file FCC Form 474, the Service Provider Invoice (SPI) Form, if they have provided discounted bills to their customer and want to be reimbursed for the discount amount.

Under both invoice methods, USAC will review the invoice and process a payment to the service provider if payment is approved. Note that applicants are required to pay the non-discount portion of the cost of the services.

Introducing One Book Dakota

The North Dakota Humanities Council, in a joint effort with the South Dakota Humanities Council and the I25th Anniversary Committees of both states, is presenting One Book Dakota to commemorate the entry of North and South Dakota into statehood. The New York Times bestselling book Dakota: a Spiritual Geography by Kathleen Norris will serve as the joint One Book for the two states.

Norris, a resident of Lemmon, South Dakota, will conduct a sixteen-city tour across North and South Dakota over the coming months. She will meet with readers and participate in discussions of the book, with additional festivities to be held at some locations. All events are free and open to the public. Standards

Hopefully, you've seen the newest revised version of the Standards for Public Libraries that the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) adopted at their May 2014 meeting. If you haven't, you can find them on our website at http://library.nd.gov/publications/NDLCCstandards.pdf or by contacting your Field Services Librarian. It was a long journey to get to this version of the standards. The NDLCC began working on the first draft of the standards in 2011. Volunteers were sought to serve on a task force and work began in 2012 to craft the standards. They were initially adopted in June 2013.

The Standards for Public Libraries will be fully implemented on July 1, 2017. After that date, in order to be eligible for Library Vision grants, public libraries will have to be in full compliance with the standards for their population. Your Field Services Librarian will assist you with meeting the standards in any way that they can. State Librarian Mary Soucie (msoucie@nd.gov) or Assistant State Librarian Cynthia Clairmont-Schmidt (ccclairmont@nd.gov) are also ready and willing to answer questions about or provide assistance with meeting the standards.

Like any planning document, the standards will have to be reviewed and possibly revised on a regular schedule. The only revisions we plan at this point, however, is to add a glossary to help further clarify as we get questions from library directors or trustees. If you have questions, please feel free to give your Field Services Librarian a call or drop them an email.

- The Underwood Public Library partnered with the Northern Expressions Arts Council to kick off their summer reading program with a performance from children's musician Steve Weeks. The Library kicked off their Geek the Library campaign the same day.
