NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK

This year National Library (NLW) week is being celebrated April 12th-18th and the theme is “Unlimited possibilities @ your library®”. This year’s honorary chair is author David Baldacci.

News and Thoughts...

from State Librarian Mary J. Soucie

We have reached mid-point of the State Legislative Session. Being my first one, I've found it interesting, a little nerve wracking and a little bit tiring. Most of all, though, I've found it exciting. I've given testimony in front of three different committees so far and attended quite a few hearings on various bills that could affect libraries or the North Dakota State Library. We were able to champion for libraries in formal and informal ways while we were at the Capitol. It is an honor to represent our North Dakota libraries and colleagues in this way.

In May, I will have the opportunity to represent our libraries at the federal level. I will once again head to Washington D.C. to meet with Senators Heitkamp and Hoeven and Representative Cramer. This is our opportunity to tell our federal legislators our library story. I will ask them to continue to support the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), which provides grant monies to the State Library to support our programs and services. I will also talk to them about the e-rate program and its impact on libraries and North Dakota.

Most importantly, I will share with our federal legislators stories about all the great things that are happening in libraries across North Dakota. That is where you come in. Please share with me the different ways that you serve your patrons, whether it's programs, services, or providing materials in different formats.

In addition to sharing this with our federal legislators, we plan to share these stories with our state legislators. It's important for us to share our stories and to educate people on all the different things that libraries offer today.

I love to tell people "if you haven't been to a library lately, you haven't been to a library".

NDLA will host their Legislative Day at the Capitol on April 14th, which is during National Library Week. Please consider spending some time at the table, talking to legislators about all the great things happening in libraries across the state.

National Library Week is a great time to thank your local community for the support that they give to the library. You are invited to participate in "ND Snapshot Day: a day in the life of the library". Take pictures of the activities and people that use the library throughout the day. Document the different ways that the library is used. Ask patrons to finish this sentence "I love my library because". You can put this on hearts or squares or circles or whatever you want and then post them throughout the library. Take the different reasons people give and share them with your funding agency (i.e. city, county, university, school board/administration, etc.).

For those of you that sent a letter of support for the various bills this session, thank you! You have done one small piece of advocating for your library and for ours and we really appreciate it.

There are a million reasons why you should advocate for the library and a million ways to do it. Find the way that works best for your library and for you. Advocacy can be a scary word but it really doesn't need to be. Start small with one activity and then another and before you know it, you're no longer afraid of the word.

- Rocket Languages is a free online language learning program that features 14 language courses including American Sign Language and ESL for Spanish and Japanese.

ONLINE LIBRARY RESOURCE

ZINIO

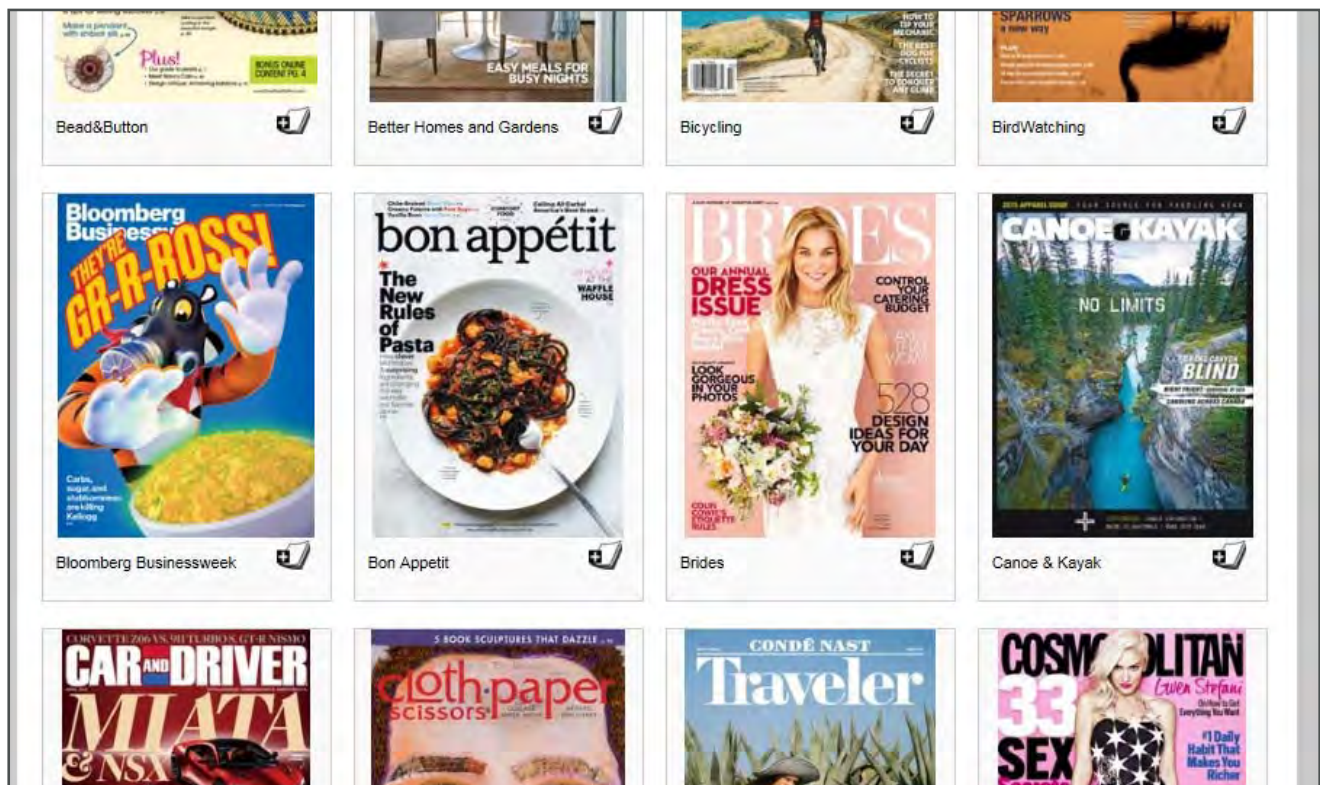
Zinio is a download service that offers full color digital magazines. Users can access 120 popular magazines from numerous publishers via computer, tablet, or smart phone. There are no holds, no checkout periods, and no limit to the number of magazines you can download. The Zinio digital magazine collection covers news, sports, entertainment, travel, fashion, art, gardening, and more. The print and digital issues are published simultaneously.

Zinio recognizes the library card prefixes for 56 North Dakota public libraries. It is important to note that the Remote Access Numbers assigned to public libraries and schools will not work. Any North Dakota citizen can get a free ND State Library card if your local public library does not issue a Zinio recognized card.

Effective March 10, 2015, users will now only create one account which will work to: 1) Check out magazines from the ND State Library collection, and 2) Read the checked out magazines at the Zinio.com site. The Zinio app for your portable device is a free download at your app store. Checked out Zinio magazines do not disappear from your computer or smart device. Magazine issues will remain in your personal collection until you delete them. Magazine issues are downloaded, not streamed, so you can read while offline when you do not have an Internet connection.

SNAPSHOT DAY 2015

Libraries across North Dakota are encouraged to participate in Snapshot Day on Wednesday, April 15th, 2015 or any day during National Library Week (4/12/15 through 4/18/15). Snapshot Day began in 2009 when a task force of librarians in New Jersey wanted to show the value libraries provide their communities.

Since 2009, all types of libraries around the country have participated in Snapshot Day by documenting a day in the life of their library through statistics, photographs, stories and more. According to the ALA website "Library Snapshot Day: A Day in the Life of Your Library" this initiative "provides a way for libraries of all types across a state, region, system or community to show what happens in a single day in their libraries. How many books are checked out? How many people receive help finding a job? Doing their taxes? Doing their homework? This initiative provides an easy means to collect statistics, photos and stories that will enable library advocates to prove the value of their libraries to decision-makers and increase public awareness."

The Library Advocacy and Funding Committee of NDLA met in January and came to the conclusion that in order to increase funding and advocate for improved library services, libraries must demonstrate WHAT we do in order to show our value to our administrators, board members, legislators and the community. Libraries already track much of the work we do, but Snapshot Day goes a step further by detailing the type of work being done and can include photos and personal stories. This is where you come in: on Wednesday, April 15th (or any day during National Library Week) compile information regarding all types of questions, programs and other services that take place at your library. More information will soon be available regarding what to do with the information you collect and how to promote this event.

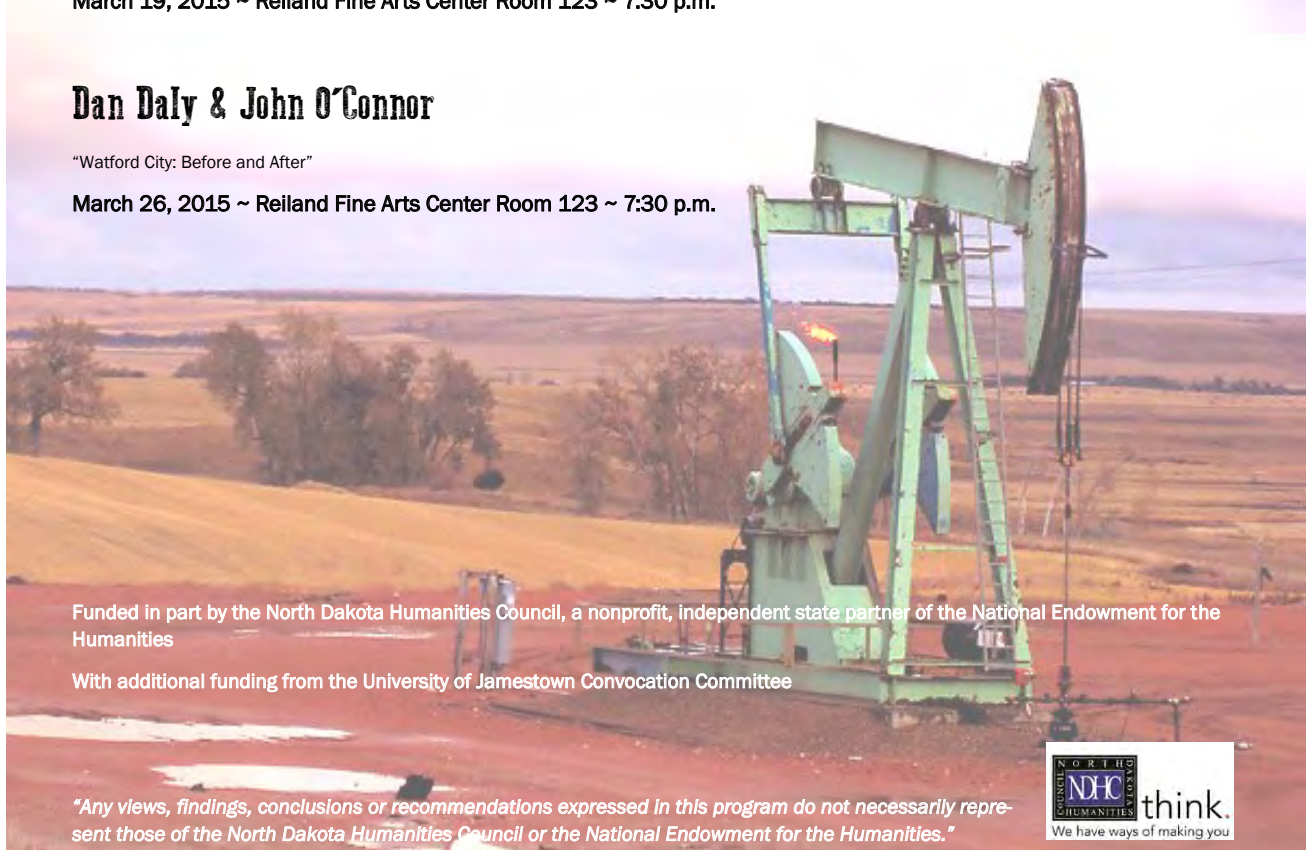

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES OFFICE OF CHALLENGE GRANTS

DEADLINE: MAY 5

The mission of the NEH Office of Challenge Grants is to advance knowledge and understanding in the humanities by strengthening the institutional base of humanities teaching, scholarly research, public programming, and other humanities activities. This is a matching grant and recipients must raise three times the amount of federal funds offered. These may include special collections of books and journals, archives and manuscripts, prints and photographs, moving images, sound recordings, architectural and cartographic records, decorative and fine art objects, textiles, archaeological and ethnographic artifacts, furniture, historical objects, and digital materials.

Libraries may pitch only one project each, with a maximum award of \$15,000.00. Projects that will have a measurable and long term impact on an under-served population and will continue to operate after grant funds have been utilized will be looked upon favorably.

Lakota City Library hosted a successful movie night at the library. They had 33 kids attend this fun filled evening.

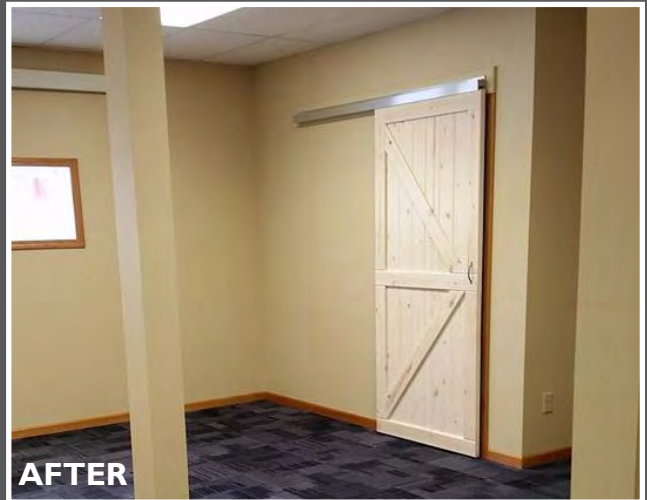

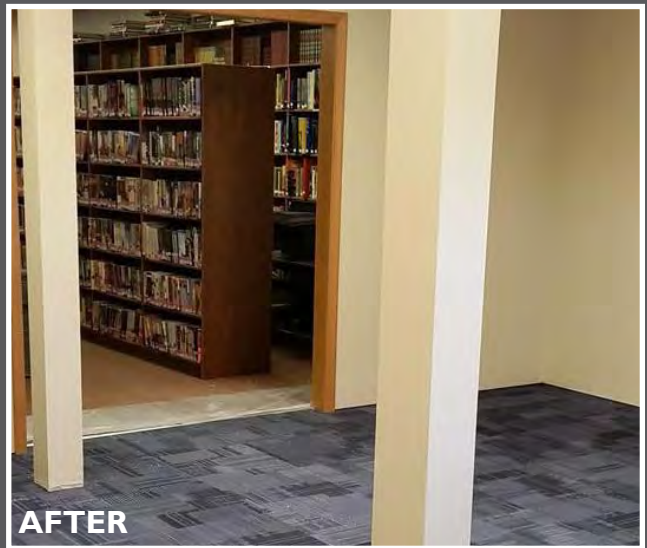
