It is more important than ever for libraries to find ways to connect with their communities. During our weekly Library Community meetings, we've heard great examples from some North Dakota libraries. The Fargo Public Library outreach department instituted Dial-a-Story for seniors. Dial-a-story isn't a new concept by any means. In fact, it is something that libraries did back when I was a kid. For those not familiar with the concept, you dial a number and listen to a story being read to you. The Fargo twist was aiming the stories at adults rather than kids.

Another example is the Kidder County Public Library's annual fundraising event. Each year, they have a purse auction and house walk. The house walk couldn't be included this year, and they did the purse auction via Facebook. They still wanted to give the community a way to participate, so they also had a picnic table decorating event where patrons took pictures, and the library shared them on Facebook.

The Cooke County Library in Gainesville, Texas, has found a neat way to connect with their community. They have a new video series called Beyond the Cover. The series will focus on local businesses and topics, mainly about agriculture. Their first video focused on the <u>corn</u> <u>harvest</u> and can be viewed on the library's YouTube page.

One of the benefits of belonging to associations like the North Dakota Library Association (NDLA) or the Association for Rural and Small Libraries (ARSL) is that you learn so much from your colleagues. I've heard of so many different ways that libraries are connecting with their community. ALA to Award \$2 million to Small and Rural Libraries

The American Library Association (ALA) invites libraries in small and rural communities to apply for grant funding to help them address issues of concern in their communities.

Up to 650 U.S. libraries in small and rural communities will receive \$3,000 each to tackle issues ranging from media literacy to COVID-19 safety to unemployment. Grants will be awarded in two waves in 2020 and 2021.

Applications will be accepted from Sept. 21 to Dec. 2, 2020.

Are you or your patrons looking for credible information about voting? Then consider checking out the North Dakota Secretary of State's website. Features on their website include 2020 voting options, tribal voting, absentee or mail-in ballots, election results, and a host of other election information. You can also find out where your voting location is, what types of ID are accepted, where the drop boxes are located, or you can apply for an absentee ballot.

The full text of the measures that are on the ballot is posted on the ND Secretary of State's website. Also included is information on starting a ballot initiative and running for office in North Dakota.
