# **Library Vision Grant Opportunities**

This is a reminder that there are currently two Library Vision grant opportunities open until October 31. We are offering a second COVID-19 Response Grant, which has been expanded to now allow equipment to assist libraries with virtual programming. Libraries that received a round one COVID-19 Response Grant are eligible to apply for this grant round.

The Professional Development Grant is intended to assist libraries of all sizes with obtaining professional development for staff. Conferences, webinars, workshops, other types of professional development will be considered. Libraries can also apply to bring a speaker in for a staff development day. A library can apply on their own or partner with other libraries. We encourage virtual learning but are leaving this to the library's discretion.

All publicly funded libraries are eligible to apply for the grants. We encourage you to review the scoring rubric located on the State Library's website prior to submitting your grant application. You may reach out to Library Development or Deputy Director Cynthia Clairmont-Schmidt with questions for assistance with your application.

#### **Ancestry Library Edition Is Now Available at Home**

Under normal circumstances,  $\underline{\textbf{Ancestry Library Edition}}$  is a database that is only available inside the library walls. However, ProQuest and Ancestry have temporarily made this database available at home to anyone with a library card through December 31, 2020.

Search through Census records, the Social Security Death Index, immigration records, city directories, church records, and more for free!

#### **Library Community Meetings**

Shortly after the pandemic started, the State Library began holding semi-weekly Library Community meetings. In August, we switched to biweekly meetings, alternating between 11:00 on Tuesdays and 2:00 on Thursdays. I think the meeting helped librarians connect with their colleagues who served as a resource for each other. The meetings are open to all library staff in the state. In September, we added a biweekly meeting for school librarians.

The idea for meetings like this dates back to Greta Guck's NDLA Presidency. Greta proposed that NDLA subscribe to Zoom for several purposes, one of which was to host quarterly meetings for librarians. The NDLA Board discussed meetings by region, by library type, and general meetings. This idea did not come to fruition although the use of Zoom for board meetings had a huge impact on the organization, and being able to utilize Zoom for portions of this year's virtual conference was very beneficial to NDLA.

# **Black Women's Suffrage Digital Collection**

T h e Digital Public Library America (DPLA) has recently announced its new Black Women's Suffrage Digital Collection is now live. The impressive collection provides a user-friendly portal to freely access nearly 200,000 digital items (images, objects, documents, and oral histories) pulled from the thousands of institutions across the country that contribute content to DPLA.

The collection, according to its website, documents "the roles and experiences of Black Women in the Women's Suffrage Movement and, more broadly, women's rights, voting rights, and civic activism between the 1850s and 1960."
