16 North Dakota libraries will be honored at the December 17th Library Community meeting at 11:00 AM.

The Star award is an annual award given out to North Dakota libraries in recognition of the administrators and staff that provide exceptional service to communities of all sizes. Libraries are divided into tiers based on their operating expenditures, and the top 3 libraries in each tier have performed the highest on a number of metrics amongst their peers. The metrics that are considered for the Star awards are total circulation per capita, central branch service hours per week, program attendance per capita, and combined computer and WIFI use per capita.

The Wheelie award highlights the bookmobile that excels in the following areas: total circulation per capita, number of stops, and miles traveled.



Kit-ing Around

This month, we are highlighting one of the State Library's newest book club kits: *The Book of Lost Names* by Kristin Harmel.

Harmel writes a thoughtprovoking, historical fiction novel based on the true story of a woman who helped children escape from France to Switzerland during World



War II by forging identity documents. However, during the process, she forged a code in The Book of Lost Names to help preserve the real names of the young children she was helping erase. Now, 65 years later, Eva is reunited with the book that went missing after the war and revisits the memories she thought she had left behind. Told with an emotional dual-timeline and heartfelt voice, this novel is a character-driven World War II novel that will capture the hearts and minds of your book club.

This kit comes with ten books, one discussion guide, and a sign-in sheet.

Kits can be checked out for eight weeks and reserved up to one year in advance. Book club kits can check out to libraries or individual patrons; no more than three kits can be checked out at one time. Kits for schools or classroom use need to be checked out by the Library Media Specialist. To see when this book club is next available, check out KitKeeper.

<u>Shelf Awareness</u> is a free e-newsletter for independent bookstores rather than libraries, but with the same focus on upcoming in-demand titles. It is run by a longtime Publishers Weekly editor, with a similar format.

They actually have two editions. If you ever shop at Ferguson's Books in Grand Forks and Bismarck, you've probably already received Shelf Awareness for Readers in your email, forwarded by the store to all their customers.

The daily Shelf Awareness Pro is directed at the booksellers themselves. It is noteworthy in the fact that it includes information on which authors are

discussing new titles on that week's major television programs and radio shows.

Space Planning Resources for Renovations and New Libraries

The Massachusetts Libraries Board of Library Commissioners released a brand-new resource for library space planning. <u>Library Space: A Planning Resource for Libraries</u> specifically focuses on the step-by-step process of public library design and includes illustrations of seating, room types, shelving, and more. It empowers librarians, administrators, and designers with the tools for planning and redesigning public libraries.

For years, libraries have used the resources put together by the <u>Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction</u> and the <u>Connecticut State Library</u> to estimate the space needs of their library based on their collection size and population. These are still excellent resources for space planning, but the new guide brings in the expertise of a global design firm alongside case study libraries and a focus group of library directors to develop the best practices presented.

If your library is reaching to meet the <u>NDLCC's Standards for Public Libraries'</u> Future-Focused level standard F15, "Library board and director conduct a space needs assessment every 3-5 years and make a report of findings to primary funding entity," these guides are an excellent place to start. Further resources and examples of completed assessments can be found <u>here</u>.

Conducting a space needs assessment allows library stakeholders like the staff, board, city or county commissioners, and community to look at how library space is currently being used and if it can be changed to better serve the needs of the community.

Recommended STEM Books


STEM is a core element of contemporary K-12 education, as well as Governor Burgum's Transforming Education initiative. The leading library and publishing magazines all regularly publish lists of their favorite current or upcoming STEM books to help guide purchasing decisions. But an additional resource is the scientists themselves.

Many science organizations are also producing lists of the books they think will best prepare students for science and technology careers, developing both skills and enthusiasm. One such <u>list</u> is released annually by Perdue University, one of the top engineering schools in the country. They have an entire Research Institute for Pre-College Engineering to help promote STEM education, and the institute produces an annual holiday gift guide of toys, games, puzzles, apps, kits, and <u>books</u>.


