The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council, in partnership with the North Dakota State Library, is pleased to announce a Non-Competitive Library Vision grant round. The Summer Reading Program grant will support public libraries as well as eligible school libraries in enhancing their summer reading program. The maximum grant award is \$1500.

Funds can be used to hire program presenters, purchase equipment to enhance access to library programs, books that support the theme, and program supplies related to the Summer Reading program.

Grant applications are due March 15, 2021, and all funds must be expended by May 31, 2021. Applications must be submitted in Counting Opinions, and the guidelines are available on our website.

Kit-ing Around Kitchens of the Great Midwest by J. Ryan Stradal

This month, we are highlighting one of the State Library's newest book club kits: *Kitchens of the Great Midwest* by J. Ryan Stradal.

Character-driven and full of recipes, *Kitchens of the Great Midwest* follows the story of Eva Thorvald as she grows from a baby into a talented chef. Each chapter is told by a different narrator—a father, an ex-boyfriend, a rival, etc.—which gives the novel the feel of a collection of short stories that highlight the locations, eccentricities, and cuisine of the Midwest. The book balances the tropes of both "foodie" novels and contemporary fiction, and Stradal's voice lends humor and gentleness to both genres that are a breath of fresh air for all readers.

This kit comes with ten books, one discussion guide, and one sign-in sheet.

Kits can be checked out for eight weeks and reserved up to one year in advance. Book club kits can check out to libraries or individual patrons; no more than three kits can be checked out at one time.
