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Welcoming Libraries

The theme for this year's National Library Week, which was celebrated April 4-10, was "Welcome to your Library". National Library Week (NLW) was first celebrated in 1958 with libraries of all types from across the country joining the American Library Association in celebrating all things libraries. It is one of my favorite weeks of the year. NLW is celebrated each year during April with various events happening during the week, including National Library Workers Day which is celebrated on the Tuesday of NLW.

North Dakota libraries worked hard during the last year to continue to provide exemplary service to their communities, through what we all know was one of the most challenging times that many of us have lived through. In my testimony to the Senate Appropriations committee and the House Appropriations subcommittee, I said that "Libraries faced challenges in 2020 like so many entities but I am proud to say that North Dakota libraries quickly pivoted and were able to provide much needed services to their communities. Libraries across the state began home delivery and curbside pickup of physical library materials and increased the e-materials offered. Libraries offered "take and make" craft kits and virtual programs- both live and pre-recorded for all ages, assisted people with completing the Census, and provided needed printing services for patrons through email and contactless pickup. Libraries are more important than ever as showcased by the increase in database usage and e-materials."

Libraries are continuing to offer the services that were instituted during the pandemic including virtual programs, holds pickup lockers, curbside and home delivery. Many of the libraries are open and offering in-person programs or planning to move in that direction soon. The theme for this year's NLW is so true of our local libraries of all types. Librarians and library staff welcome patrons regardless of age, economic status, race, religion, ethnicity, gender, ability or sexual orientation. We need to remain diligent to the principles of equity, diversity and inclusion in our collections, the programs and services that we offer and our library environments. I invite you to focus on providing a welcoming environment for all that enter your library whether in person or virtually as you work on figuring out your "new normal".

THE READING NOOK

I'll start this list with what's my favorite book so far in 2021, *Aftershocks* by Nadia Owusu. *Aftershocks* is a beautifully written memoir by a writer who lived all over the world, thanks to her Ghanaian father's job in the UN. Owusu takes a specific time in her life—the week she spent in her room following a shattering fight with her stepmother—and goes back and forth through the different places she lived and the complicated relationships she had with her absentee mother, her controlling stepmother, and her beloved father, who died when she was thirteen.

The Three Mothers by Anna Malaika Tubbs takes three remarkable women—Berdis Baldwin, Alberta King, and Louise Little—and discusses their trials and tribulations as Black mothers in the Jim Crow era. Their stories would be interesting by themselves, but these three particular women raised three men who grew to shape a generation—James Baldwin, Martin Luther King Jr., and Malcolm X.

When Suleika Jaouad graduated from college, she thought she was about to start her real life. Instead, she learns that she has leukemia and spends the next four years in the hospital trying to survive. When she emerges on the other side, Jaouad realizes she had no idea what she is supposed to do next. Between Two Kingdoms follows her on a road trip across America, meeting with the strangers who had reached out to her in the hospital.






Preservation Week

The event and the need to promote preservation were born out of a survey that was conducted several years ago. Thousands of institutions responded to the survey, and the <u>results</u> were shocking. In the United States, cultural heritage institutions hold almost 5 billion items (books, documents, photographs, drawings, maps, textiles, paintings, etc.), over 60% of which are housed within libraries. Over 1 billion of these items were deemed to be at risk or in danger of damage. This survey is over 15 years old, so these numbers are likely even higher now.




