New Grant Opportunities for Libraries

The North Dakota State Library (NDSL) and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) are pleased to announce three grant opportunities: **Collection Development**, **Local History**, and **Marketing**. These grants are open to publicly funded North Dakota libraries.

Applications for each grant will be submitted via Counting Opinions, and applications will be open October 1-31.

The NDLCC adopted a <u>Grant Application</u> template and a <u>Grant Guidelines</u> template. These will be used for all Library Vision grants. We hope that the consistency will make the grant writing process easier.

A new requirement for applying for a Library Vision grant will be to attend or view the current NDSL grant writing webinar and will need to be done annually. We will host the webinar live on 10/12/21 at 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM and 10/14 at 2:00 PM; all times are Central. If you are attending the 2021 NDLA Annual Conference, the breakout session *Grant Writing Tips and Tricks* on Thursday from 11:00-11:50 will count for the webinar requirement.

ILL Bridge

The North Dakota State Library's Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) Task Force has made recommendations on how NDSL should deploy the dollars received from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP or ARPA).

The top priority is to invest in a system that will connect consortia and stand-alone libraries across the state for the purposes of improving resource sharing. Joining the bridge will increase the ability of your patrons to see items that are available across the state and will make it easier for your staff to fulfill InterLibrary loan requests. Libraries of all sizes and types will benefit from having direct access to the holdings of member libraries across the state. NDSL will pay implementation costs and the first-year costs through September 30, 2022. Ongoing costs will be shared by NDSL, ODIN, and the participating libraries.

We estimate that the maximum cost per library to participate after September 2022 will not exceed \$2800 per library. We will work on a formula during the year and hope that the costs will be lower than that.

In order to begin the procurement process, we need to determine how many libraries will be interested in participating in our first-year trial. Please send an email to ndsladmn@nd.gov by September 23 to indicate that your library is willing to participate in the trial. We apologize for the rapid turnaround time.

There will be more details shared about how we will be allocating the remainder of the ARPA dollars as we move through the procurement process for the ILL bridge. This is an exciting opportunity for the libraries of North Dakota and for the citizens of the state.

Library Services and Technology Act

State libraries receive federal dollars from the Institute of Museum and Public Libraries (IMLS) through the Grants to States program, which is part of the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA).

The State Library is required to develop a Five-year plan that guides how we will use our LSTA dollars. The plan gets evaluated every four-and-a-half years to determine if we achieved our stated goals. The evaluation is then used to help write the next Five-year plan.

NDSL has engaged JM Strategies to assist us with the evaluation process as well as writing the new plan. The first step in our evaluation process is a **survey**. We would really like feedback from all library types and from staff at all levels of the organization. Please complete the short survey by Monday, September 27.

We will be hosting a focus group session at the 2021 NDLA Annual Conference in Grand Forks on Thursday, October 7, from 1:00 to 1:50. We will also host a focus group session in Bismarck. There will be three online focus group sessions as well: one each for Academic/Special/Tribal, Public, and School libraries. We look forward to hearing from the North Dakota Library Community on our current, and future plans.

The LSTA Task Force will assist with the evaluation and the plan. We appreciate the folks that are generously serving on this Task Force.

Here at the ND State Library, our ILL Dept. is also busy requesting DVDs, audiobooks, CDs, and journal articles. We will request these items from anywhere in the USA at no charge to you. You are only responsible for the postage to return these materials back to the ND State Library.

E-rate Forms for Consortium Members

Next week, Al Peterson will be sending out a couple of E-rate forms for the libraries that participate in the StageNET E-rate Consortium or the Public Library E-rate Consortium.

The Letter of Agency is a written agreement that you, as a library, are willing to let the consortium coordinator file the E-rate forms on your behalf. You need to keep a copy of this letter in your E-rate files.

A Form 479 Schools and Libraries Universal Service Certification by Administrative Authority to Billed Entity of Compliance with the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) is a declaration that your library is compliant with the CIPA Guidelines. Instructions on how to fill out this form will be included.

If you are a part of either consortium, these two forms are the only items you need to return.


