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## Talking Books Services

One of the services that is provided by the North Dakota State Library in partnership with the National Library Service, which is a division of the Library of Congress, is the Talking Books program. All North Dakota residents that are unable to read standard print materials because of a visual, physical, or reading disability are eligible for the program, which provides audiobooks and players as well as audio magazines and large print books to patrons free of charge. Eligible patrons can also access a large array of digital books that can be downloaded to a computer, tablet or phone.

## Local History Grant

This month's column will focus on the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) Library Vision grants. For this round, there are three categories of grants: [collection development, marketing, and local history](#). All three grants provide wonderful opportunities for recipients, but I'm going to focus on one grant in particular. The Local History Grant is near and dear to my heart for a few reasons, but mainly because it directly applies to my duties in Digital Initiatives (DI) and because I helped develop the grant proposal.

Initially, the idea started out small and was only going to be a grant for digitization hardware. However, every library's situation is different and so is the way they approach local history. So the grant was expanded to include many more possibilities.

This grant can still be used to obtain digitization, or scanning, equipment and supplies. If you're interested in obtaining hardware to [start a digitization project](#) to scan your own collections or have a community-based scanning project (like [ScanDay](#)), you can consult the [hardware page](#) on the DI LibGuide for examples of scanners. You can also use this grant to obtain a computer or laptop to support your digitization activities.

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### NASA@ My Library Kit Expedition: Earth

The State Library has acquired additional NASA@ My Library kits through a grant from the Space Science Institute. One of the new kits is called Expedition: Earth.

Expedition: Earth has the components for up to 15 participants to take part in activities and crafts that teach patrons about weather and magnification.



Each kit includes two microscopes, prepared slides with specimens, fifteen small magnifying glasses, six books, and the components for the other activities. Activities include A Matter of Perspective, A Wonderful Weather Story, Around the School, Clouds Above, Estimating Cloud Cover, Tech on the Go: Magnification, and Wind Streamer, which can also be found in the STEM Activity Clearinghouse online at <http://clearinghouse.starnetlibraries.org/>.

The craft components that are included in the kit (construction paper, paper plates, and crepe paper) do not need to be returned to the State Library.

There are four copies of the Expedition: Earth kit. They can be reserved through [KitKeeper](#) up to one year in advance.
