
webinar will walk library directors and those filing the annual report with steps needed to complete the application.

Frequently Asked Questions

Some topics that have already arisen this year, in the order you'll find them on the Public Libraries Survey. The topics that apply to more than one section are duplicated in each.

Library Governance

2.16, Annual report to local government. Many libraries submit this report every July. In that case, the question is about the one due in July 2021, not the one due in July 2022. In general, it's whichever edition of the report was due since you last answered this question.

Branches/Hours

To qualify as a bookmobile, a vehicle needs to have material that can be browsed and checked out at the stops, and a regular route. If it is only delivering items that patrons requested ahead of time, it is an outreach vehicle and is counted under 11.1 instead.

If your bookmobile offers programming, you still count the stops and total attendance in the bookmobiles section (3.6). The programs with their attendance are counted in the programs section (9.9-9.12). Bookmobile programs count as Live Onsite rather than Offsite because the bookmobile is an extension of the library itself. If you didn't record total bookmobile visitors separately from the number who actually participated in the programming, it's fine to use the same number in both places.

Talking Book Services

Free Magazines from the Talking Book Program

Patrons of the Talking Book Program are eligible to subscribe, free of charge, to magazines on digital cartridges. Choose from about 50 national magazines, including Good Housekeeping, National Geographic, Money, People, Martha Stewart Living, Seventeen, Cricket, and Bon Appetit. Many magazines are also available via digital download from Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD). The program also provides free subscriptions to several North Dakota magazines, including North Dakota Living, North Dakota Outdoors, North Dakota History, and North Dakota Horizons. Magazines from the Talking Book Program contain the text of articles; advertisements are not included.

Administered by the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, the Talking Book program offers an array of services for North Dakota residents who are unable to read standard print materials due to a visual, physical, or reading disability.

Misinformation Effects on Students

This will be the last week discussing lessons learned from News Lit Camp. Today, I am addressing misand-disinformation's effects on students.

The News Lit Camp conference offered a discussion with two teenagers from New York City, Isabel Tribe and Charlotte Hampton. During this breakout session, Tribe and Hampton commented that Generation Z is very social-media/tech-driven. Social media tends to be excellent at "drawing" minors in, well before they even become teenagers! (I'm looking at you, Instagram reels!) It can prove difficult for young people to sort fact from fiction in such a fast-paced online environment. To try and help combat misinformation, Tribe and Hampton created the Teens for Press Foundation. Teens for Press Foundation (TPF) stands behind the following beliefs:

THE FREE PRESS is integral to free society and democracy and must be protected at all times.

THE PRESS must remain unbiased and factual, especially in times of civic division and alienation. As a potential means of political indoctrination, media must remain free to report truthfully on the goings-on of government and corporations.

AS TEENAGERS we have an obligation to consume reliable news and create an informed electorate that lives up to the expectations of the Framers of the Constitution. Without a free press and universal access to it, citizens are impeded from selecting their representatives to the best of their ability.

National Library Week

National Library Week is April 3-9, 2022. It is an annual celebration highlighting the valuable role libraries, librarians, and library workers play in transforming lives and strengthening our communities.

The theme this year is "Connect with Your Library," which promotes the idea that libraries are places to get connected to technology by using broadband, computers, and other resources. Libraries offer opportunities to connect with media, programs, ideas, and classes in addition to books. Most importantly, libraries connect communities.

ChILLin' with ILL






Finding the Answer to PLS Question 10.5b

Are you looking for the total number of times your library's website was visited for the year to answer the Public Libraries Survey question 10.5b? If your library has a WordPress website, the number is easy to find!

After you've logged into your WordPress account, click on Stats, which is on the left-hand side of the screen. You will then see a graph that shows the number of views for your website. Click on "Years" to see the number of views and visitors for each year you've had a WordPress website. You'll want to click on the 2021 bar and find the Visitors number to add to your Public Libraries Survey.




