Mental Health First Aid for Librarians Submitted by Al Peterson

As librarians, we are in contact with people every day, on their good days and bad. Unfortunately, some of our patrons may be suffering from a mental health crisis, and we find ourselves in the position to try to help them. Through a partnership with the Department of Human Services, the North Dakota State Library is offering Mental Health First Aid for Librarians. This eight-hour course (two hours on your own, six hours online class) will provide you with the knowledge and skills to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental health and substance use challenges among adults. This training is a certification course, and the certification is good for three years.

Through this course, you will learn:

- Common signs and symptoms of mental health challenges
- Common signs and symptoms of substance use challenges
- How to interact with a person in crisis
- How to connect a person with help
- Expanded content on trauma, substance use, and self-care.

This online course is scheduled for June 8th. We are limiting the class to the first 15 registrants, and there is no cost for participants. If you have questions, please feel free to reach out to alpeterson@nd.gov.

Makerspaces and Exploration Stations

Last week, I addressed e-books and tech resources from the ELMA Conference. This week will be my wrap-up discussion of conference topics: makerspaces and exploration stations.

"A makerspace is a collaborative workspace inside a school, library or separate public/private facility for making, learning, exploring and sharing that uses high tech to no tech tools" (What, n.d.). Exploration Stations are interactive programs that give [patrons] a chance to explore, learn and play with a variety of educational activities for all ages (Exploration, n.d.). So, what's the difference? Honestly, not much. The two terms can typically be interchanged, with exploration stations being viewed as a subcategory of makerspaces. The actual title does not overly matter. However, the goals and purposes of such activities certainly do matter!

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One family's story remembered at Holocaust exhibition

BISMARCK, N.D. (KFYR) - The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library hosted an exhibition on Americans and the Holocaust throughout April and early May. On Sunday, it featured the story of one family's past. Dina Butcher told the story of her family's experience and how some managed escaped Nazi Germany.

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Fairy and Folk Tales: Castle Blocks

The State Library offers a variety of kits for checkout —STEM, robot, NASA, outdoor, storytime, book club, and display kits are all available. Kits are a popular program at libraries of all types for both passive and active programs.

The Fairy and Folk Tales: Castle Block kit boosts critical thinking skills by bringing hands-on learning to young children. They are geared for 2nd and 3rd



graders, but with adult interaction, they can fit children even younger. To learn more about this kid and NDSL's other available STEM kits, visit the **STEM Kit LibGuide**.

This kit comes with eight storytelling wands, 60 castle blocks, an activity sheet, two castle books, a resources and lesson extension guide, a how-to-use guide, repacking guide, and a statistics sheet.

Kits can be checked out for eight weeks and reserved up to one year in advance. No more than three kits can be checked out at one time. This kit can only be checked out by libraries and educational institutions and are not for individual circulation. Kits for school or classroom use need to be checked out by the Library Media Specialist. To see when this kit is next available, check out <u>KitKeeper</u>.
