Database Challenges

The last couple of years have seen an uprising in book challenges for school library (and classroom) shelves and curriculums. The majority of these books contain references to race, sexuality, or gender identity. While challenges to books have been placed in the spotlight, a quieter challenge is also occurring. This call for censoring action is directed toward library databases. Databases are challenged for similar reasons as printed materials, with obscenity and pornography being the main accusations. State bills (such as in <u>Nebraska</u>, <u>Utah</u>, and <u>Tennessee</u>) have been presented, and in some cases already signed into law, to help protect minors from online materials that are deemed age-inappropriate.

National Precautions Already in Place

The Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA), which passed in 2000, requires all schools to adhere to certain rules to qualify for e-rate discounted services. Such rules include an internet safety policy, which addresses filters that block obscene pictures, child pornography, and any materials that are harmful to minors (Children's, n.d.). CIPA, coupled with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), also requires library database providers to adhere to filtering guidelines (Natanson, 2022). Are the efforts always perfect? Of course not. Filters are notorious for either under- or over-filtering. However, databases are already actively attempting to keep age-inappropriate materials at bay.



Friends of the Carrington City Library were awarded a \$3,000 literacy grant from the Dollar General Literacy Foundation, the foundation announced.





This year's theme is "An Ocean of Possibilities," and the fan-favorite event kicks off with the Splash Into Summer Reading Bash on June 2.

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
