Patrons and Incarceration

The topic of today's EDI article is a more sobering one: What are libraries' places in helping currently and formerly incarcerated individuals, as well as their families? This is primarily a public library concern; however, other library types (especially school and academic) can adopt programming and access to resources as their patrons experience loved ones being imprisoned or reentering society after imprisonment themselves.

North Dakota Parks and Recreation

Does your public library have State Park passes? If so, I encourage you to check out the North Dakota Parks and Recreation website and how you can promote that pass to your patrons. The ND Parks and Recreation website is loaded with information on our state parks system. You can look up which parks offer hiking opportunities, historic sites, water access for aquatic recreation, and primitive camping for your patrons who enjoy "roughing it." Their website also includes camping sites, cabin rentals, and yurt rentals.

Do you have patrons who like off-road biking, horseback riding, or cross-country skiing? By getting familiarized with Parks and Recreation's website, you provide your patrons with a state park pass while also giving them some great suggestions for opportunities near the library or a short drive away. Speaking of the State Park Pass program, The North Dakota State Library is working with ND Parks and Recreation to update the program. While no new passes are available at this time, we will have them available in the future once we work out all the details with Parks and Recreation.

With elections coming up next month for many towns and counties in North Dakota, the North Dakota Secretary of State offers a one-stop website for voting information.

Information on absentee ballots and voting by mail, campaign finance, and tribal voting can all be found at https://vote.nd.gov. If you get calls asking where the polling station is, you can use this website to look up where your patrons need to go to vote and what they need to bring with them for identification. There is even a link to the North Dakota Department of Transportation to complete an online address change to update the voter's file.

Ways to Encourage Summer Reading

Welcome to the last Tammy's Teaching Tidbit for the 2021-2022 school year! Regular classes are coming to a close in North Dakota, with some schools already done. (In a couple of weeks, summer school will begin!) This is the perfect time to talk about encouraging reading during the summer months.

Reading Challenges

Reading challenges can either be through an organization, usually with a physical prize offered, or independently with more intrinsic motivation attached (I am not going to say that one type of incentive is better than the other. Physical prizes, such as gift cards, free books, or tickets to activities, can be fantastic ways to "hook" reluctant readers. I firmly believe the most important aspect is that people read, both for enjoyment and lifelong learning.)

Talking Book Services

Talking Book Topics (TBT)

If you're a Talking Book patron, you may have noticed that you are no longer receiving the bimonthly Talking Book Topics (TBT) large print edition. Due to supply-chain issues and a worldwide paper shortage, the National Library Service (NLS) has informed all network libraries that they have decided to discontinue the TBT print edition. Many Talking Book patrons were subscribed to this publication to get information on the newest digital books (DBs). However, there are alternative ways to access the TBT now that the large print edition has been discontinued.

We have always offered, and will continue to offer, the TBT as an audio cartridge. This audio cartridge comes directly from NLS in a maroon case and includes an order form, which you can send to us after you've marked which DBs you'd like to add to your request list. You can navigate the cartridge using your Talking Book machine to hear the genres, titles, and annotations of the various new offerings from NLS.

If you would like to access past versions of the 2022 TBTs, you can order them as DBs from your Readers' Advisors.

- May June 2022 has not come out as a regular DB yet, but it will be available as a digital book in early June.

You can also access the TBT edition directly from the NLS website at www.loc.gov/nls/tbt. Additionally, we've set up a link to the site from the North Dakota State Library website at http://library.nd.gov/talkingbooks.html. You'll find it on the Talking Book services page for the public listed under "Related Information." You can use the HTML version, where you'll find direct links to BARD for downloading or adding books to your wish list, or the PDF format, which contains a printable order form for mailing. An abridged version of TBT is also included in the Braille Book Review, which is available as a Braille Ready File (BRF) on www.loc.gov/nls/bbr.

ND Memories Collection: By The Numbers

The State Library's **North Dakota Memories** digital collection has hit a milestone: over 2,500 items have been added. Hip hip, hooray! In honor of this milestone, the **Digital Initiatives Department** decided to do a breakdown of the collection. Here's a look at the numbers.

Since its launch in late 2014, ND Memories has grown exponentially. The collection had about 55 items at the end of 2014. A few years later, at the end of 2018, that number had increased to about 1,560. Now, roughly halfway through 2022, the collection has 2,505 items uploaded and readily available.

At its core, ND Memories is a community-driven collection, which means items (images, documents, objects, etc.) are contributed from the private collections of residents, organizations, and cultural heritage institutions. About 64% of the items in the collection have been contributed by residents, or former residents, of North Dakota. Of the remaining 36% of the collection, 19% came from the collections of libraries (public, academic, school, etc.), 14% came from museums and historical societies, and 3% came from 'other' (businesses, churches, etc.).

WordPress widgets are blocks of content that can be added to the sidebars, footers, and other areas of the website. Your website's theme will make a difference in where you can add a widget. There are many widgets to choose from - signup forms, videos, photos, social icons, maps, and more are available.


