E-Rate Forms For Consortium Members Submitted by Al Peterson

Last week, I sent out a couple of E-rate forms for the libraries that are participating in either the StageNET E-rate Consortium or the Public Library E-rate Consortium through e-mail. If you are part of either consortium, these two forms are the only items you need to return to me. I always get a few questions, so I thought I would write this article on a couple of the more common ones.

What is a Letter of Agency?

The Letter of Agency is a written agreement that you, as a library, are willing to let the consortium coordinator file the E-rate forms on your behalf. You need to keep a copy of this letter in your E-rate files.

What's the Form 479 for?

A Form 479 Schools and Libraries Universal Service Certification by Administrative Authority to Billed Entity of Compliance with the Children's Internet Protection Act is a declaration that your library is compliant with the CIPA Guidelines. I always include instructions on how to fill out this form. For more information about CIPA, go to <u>https://www.fcc.gov/consumers/guides/childrens-internet-protection-act</u>.

If I filled them out last year, do I have to fill them out this year?

Yes.

How do I get my signed forms back to you?

These forms can be physically mailed back to me at:

You can also scan them and e-mail them to me. Please keep the originals in your E-rate files for at least ten years. That way, if we ever get audited by the FCC, we can go back ten years to show compliance.

SCHOOL AND LIBRARY GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

Joann Sweetland Lum Memorial Grant (YALSA)

This annual \$1000 grant aims to recognize a librarian who has a creative, innovative project that promotes literacy (digital, media, visual, computer, data, financial, civic/ethical, news, information, multicultural, and cultural).

Collection Development Grant (YALSA)

This annual grant is funded by Baker & Taylor and awards \$1,000 for collection development to two YALSA members who represent a public library, and who work directly with young adults ages 12 to 18.

Great Books Giveaway (YALSA)

Each year the YALSA office receives approximately 3,000 newly published children's, young adult and adult books, videos, and CDs for review. YALSA and the cooperating publishers annually offer one year's worth of review materials as a contribution to up to 3 libraries in need. The total estimated value of this collection is \$30,000.

Innovation Award (YALSA)

This annual \$500 award is funded by Friends of YALSA (FOY). It recognizes a member who has brought a new idea to life through their library that has benefited the teens in their community.

Frances Henne Research Grant (YALSA)

This annual grant of \$1,000 is to provide seed money for small scale projects which will encourage research that responds to the YALSA Research Agenda.

MAE Award for Best Literature Program for Teens (YALSA)

The annual MAE Award is designed to honor a member of YALSA who has developed an outstanding reading or literature program for young adults. The award provides \$500 to the winner and an additional \$500 to the winner's library or library agency.

Service to Young Adults Outstanding Achievement Award (YALSA)

This award of \$2,000, sponsored generously by Marney Welmers, recognizes the national contributions of a YALSA member who has demonstrated unique and sustained devotion in two or more of the following areas to young adult services: promoting services for and with young adults, conducting and publishing research about young adult services, mentoring other professionals in the field, or for notable efforts in the work of the Young Adult Library Services Association.

Explora Primary = Students (K-5th Grade) Online encyclopedia portal designed for young researchers (K-5).

Explora Public Library = General Research

Online encyclopedia portal designed for public library patrons.

Explora Secondary = Students (6th Grade-College) Online encyclopedia portal designed for students in grades 6-12.
