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#### **Library Vision Grant Opportunities**

The State Library and the Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) are pleased to announce two grant opportunities. The Collection Development and Laptop and Tablet grant applications will be open from January 2, 2023, through January 31, 2023. Neither of the grants have a match component.

The Collection Development Grant has a maximum award of \$2,000. The purpose of this grant is to support collection development for libraries. Libraries are encouraged to use grant funds to develop a new collection for their library or to expand their North Dakota collection. The grant may be used for e-materials if a library belongs to one of the shared e-book collections.

The Computer and Tablet grant has a maximum award of \$3,000. The purpose of this grant is to provide funding to purchase laptop computers and tablets for patron use. The devices may not be for staff use.

Both grants will follow the same timeline.

Application Period: January 2-January 31, 2023

Award Date: February 28, 2023

Grant Period: March 1- May 31, 2023

Final Report Due: August 31, 2023

All applicants are required to attend or view the most current grant webinar. The State Library will host a live webinar with a Q&A on January 4 at 1:00 P.M. CT. There will be a recording that can be viewed that will be posted to our **YouTube channel** by noon on December 30. All prior grant webinars have been removed from the YouTube channel. Please be sure that you are watching the current grant webinar if you do not attend the live one.

#### **Nonpartisan Leader Cartoons**

The 'Nonpartisan Leader Cartoons' collection contains nearly 100 political drawings/cartoons that were used in the "Nonpartisan Leader," the official publication of the Nonpartisan League. The cartoons date from the mid-1910s to the 1930s and depict many topics relating to politics in North Dakota. Most of the cartoons in the collection were created by John Miller Baer, who also served as a U.S. Representative from North Dakota from 1917 to 1921.

How to Get Started with Grant Writing

- 1. Develop your what and why. Some potential questions to ask include:
  - What difference will it make if funders invest in your project?
  - How will the project improve student learning?
  - What is your vision of learning once you have implemented your project?
- 2. Clarify your students' needs. Some questions to ponder:
  - What skills are your students lacking?
  - What projects are in your community that you can build upon?
  - What technology and/or consumable materials are needed for this project?
