Facility Management and the Christmas Tree Submitted by Al Peterson

If you have ever driven by the North Dakota State Capitol during the holidays at night, you will no doubt see the large Christmas Tree on the North and South sides of the Capitol created using green and red shaded windows.

Office lights were first used in 1934 to create a cross to convey a holiday message. Capitol workers built a star immediately above it that was 16 feet in diameter and contained 120 electric lights. The current tree configuration began in the mid-1940s using colored paper shades to create a Christmas tree until plastic shades were purchased in the late 1950s. The current colored plastic shades were purchased in 1993. A total of 88 shades (20 red and 24 green on each side) are needed to create the Christmas trees. The current star on the top of the capitol building is 10 ft by 10 ft.



Not only are the Christmas trees created using the lights in the Capitol building, but windows on all sides are used to create the numbers for the current and new year. This New Year tradition began in the mid-1970s and continues to this day.

Education, Not Politics (Part 2)

Last month's column (part 1 of 2) highlighted how I came across an interesting piece of North Dakota history involving the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the State Library. My "investigation" started simply enough by uploading an image of Minnie Nielson to the State Library's digital collections, and it expanded from there.

Let's briefly recap part 1 (to refresh your memory or in case you missed it). The outgoing state superintendent, Neil C. Macdonald, refused to leave office because he adamantly believed that Nielson didn't meet the necessary requirements to hold the office. He was quickly forced out after a ruling by the ND Supreme Court. Shortly after, the NPL-controlled legislature met in the 1919 regular session and created the Board of Administration. The state superintendent was made a member of this board, but the board assumed many of the duties of that office.

Traditions

Unusual Traditions Around the World

Gävle Goat, Sweden

Each year at the beginning of Advent, the world's largest straw goat is assembled in Gävle, Sweden. This 13- by 7-meter structure first appeared in 1966. It remains in this location until after New Year's Day. A new goat is produced each year. This tradition's original intent entailed attracting tourists to the south side of the Gävlean River. However, throughout its history, this structure has earned a different tradition from people's insistence upon trying to ruin it, typically through means of arson (The various, n.d.)! Kit of the Week

Airblock STEM Kit

Airblock is a modular programmable starter drone. It can be assembled as a drone, hovercraft, and other configurations. It can be controlled and block-coded via Bluetooth.

The kit includes two packs that each contain one master controller module, one charger, two batteries, one charging cable, six protective top covers, four protective bottom covers, three red propeller power modules, three black propeller power modules, one hovercraft base, one bag of spare parts. There's also a 6-port USB desktop charger, a user manual, inventory guide, packing guide, general information and problem solving tips sheet, and two start-up guides.

System requirements: Tablet or smartphone running iOS 9 or later or Android 4.1 or later.
