Public Libraries Survey and Annual Report Webinar

The Public Libraries Survey (PLS) opened on February 1 and will run until March 31. This survey is conducted annually and is the primary information resource for data on public libraries nationwide. In North Dakota, it is also a requirement for public libraries to qualify for State Aid and to meet the minimum requirements to be eligible for Library Vision Grants. We will present a webinar on the PLS on Wednesday, February 8, at 1:00 PM to cover some common questions and give you a chance to ask any that you may have. Please join us or watch the recording that will be posted to our YouTube channel within a couple of days of the event.

I am happy to report that this year's report will no longer include any questions related to COVID-19 and should only include a few new questions, which will only be required in the 2024 survey. We encourage you to start thinking about how you will collect the data for them next year and prepare a year of trial data in 2023. That way, you will be well prepared for when they are required in 2024.

Finally, I would like to note that I am taking a long-planned, COVID-19-delayed vacation right in the middle of the survey and will not be available from February 27 through March 12. However, the Library Development Department will be monitoring the <u>ndsl-ld@nd.gov</u> email address if you need any assistance during this timeframe.

Proposed Qualified Allocation Plans under the 2024 LIHTC, and 2023 HTF, HOME and HIF programs

North Dakota Housing Finance Agency will hold Public Hearings for its proposed Qualified Allocation Plans (Plan) for the 2024 Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program, 2023 National Housing Trust Fund, 2023 HOME Investment Partnerships Program, and 2023 Housing Incentive Fund on March 2, 2023. Each plan sets forth the procedures and criteria that the agency will adhere to in allocating financing to multifamily affordable housing projects in each respective program during the September 2023 application round.

Interdisciplinary Instruction: School Librarians and Music Education

While schools typically maintain distinct subject areas, 21st-century learners need to understand that knowledge is multi-faceted. One of the most effective ways for educators to address all standards, thus preparing students for life beyond PreK-12 schooling, entails teaching across the curriculum. School librarians work in an interesting space; they rarely possess a school-set curriculum to follow! (This certainly comes with plenty of opportunities, as well as challenges.) For the next several weeks, "Tammy's Teaching Tidbit" will highlight how interdisciplinary education might look in the library.

The first cross-curricular effort involves music education. One of the literacies, and often the first to develop, is music intelligence. Music intelligence is the ability to create and appreciate pitch, timbre, and rhythm. Additionally, it encourages appreciation of many forms of musical expressions (Lamb, & Johnson, 2006). Music helps set the mood and can be used to motivate listeners, as well.

Recently, the Libby team has reworked the filtering system on the library and search screens in Libby. You can find the handy filter button (circled in the screenshot) in many places throughout the app, including on the library home screen, on the search screen (replacing the + more button), in search results and in lists created by your library.

STEM Kit: Fuel Cell Car

This hydrogen fuel cell car kit is conveniently designed to bring the latest research on clean, renewable energy sources out of the laboratories and into your hands. Using distilled water and the supplied electrolyzer, students can transform water into hydrogen which the fuel cell converts into electrical energy, powering the car.
