The North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (DPI), in partnership with the ND State Library (NDSL) and Bank of North Dakota (BND), is hosting a Summer Reading Challenge. Their goal? To get some kind of summer reading event in every single county in North Dakota. A pretty hefty goal, huh?

To help combat summer loss, DPI is offering grants for **any** ND library that does some kind of summer reading program. These grants could be anywhere from \$100 to \$1,000 or more! What could you do in your library with an extra \$1,000? What opportunities could you offer your community with that extra money?



Complete guidance for grant eligibility will be available in mid to late May and will follow the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund's (ESSER) allowable use guidelines.

If you have not held a summer reading program before and have no idea where to start – have no fear! The NDSL staff is here to help!

Interdisciplinary Instruction: School Librarians and Technology Classes

Up until 2019, library and technology standards were intertwined within the same North Dakota State Content Standards document. When writing the new Library Media Content Standards, the standards writing and review teams attempted to be mindful that these two areas are considered separate. However, librarians still do regularly work with technology. Thus, the digital citizenship component to the Library Media Content Standards was created!

How much school librarians already teach technology varies. Some districts possess technology teachers as well as school librarians. Other districts combine these two roles into one job. For the sake of this article, I am approaching school librarians and technology teachers as two different jobs.

The North Dakota Computer Science and Cybersecurity Standards break down into five concepts: technology systems, computational thinking, information literacy, computing in society, and digital citizenship. While many school librarians will touch on all these concepts, the two most-overlapping ideas are information literacy and digital citizenship.
