### **Makerspace Grant**

Makerspaces allow people with shared interests in STEAM activities to create projects using shared space, equipment, and knowledge. This grant supports the ability to add new STEAM experiences in the library setting.

- Grant Period: September 1-February 29, 2024
- Final report due: May 31, 2024

### **Programming Grant**

The purpose of this grant is to support the development of new programs or the enhancement of existing programs in North Dakota libraries.

# Birds Aren't Real: How Students Can Work Against Misinformation: An ALA Presentation by Robbie Barber

### What is Misinformation?

Misinformation is the unknowingly spreading of fake data, usually without intentional malice. (Disinformation, on the other hand, entails spreading false information with the intent of causing harm.) An example of misinformation involves sharing an article on social media because of a clickbait title, without actually reading the article. Satire, which Birds Aren't Real falls under, and sarcasm are also types of misinformation.

#### A Little History of Birds Aren't Real

Birds Aren't Real is a conspiracy theory began by Peter McIndoe in 2017. McIndoe, who proclaimed that he was basically raised by the internet, started this movement to show just how ridiculous the spread of misinformation can be! According to this theory, birds were replaced by surveillance drones back in the 1970s. McIndoe created an elaborate back story, complete with an actor, posing as a former CIA agent, sharing his role in the operation. As Birds Aren't Real gained traction, the mainstream media approached it as a factual movement! Over the years, Birds Aren't Real supporters (often called "bird truthers") have grown in number. While, supposedly, most of the supporters are in on the joke, people still question the legitimacy of this theory (Lorenz, 2021). More information can be found here, here, and here.

## Changing Stereotypical Beliefs Through Books

How are stereotypes formed? Do these beliefs influence how we react to or interact with individuals? Can stereotypical beliefs be changed? These are questions that have come to my mind as I have served the Academic, Special, & Tribal libraries over the last several months.

According to <u>Amy Morin's</u> article <u>Harmful Psychological Effects of Racial Stereotyping</u>, we all create mental shortcuts, split-second judgments, when we encounter others. While these judgments help determine if an individual is safe, trustworthy, or a source of risk, the quick analyses are usually inaccurate and create bias and stereotypical assessments. Generalizations are usually based off an individual's experiences formed during the foundational years of their life. Things such as what we hear others say, how they treat other people, what we read in text, view on TV, social media or movies, the heroes presented in sports, or celebrities in society are just a few examples that influence how we as adults will interact and respond to others. If these learned stereotyping behaviors are not recognized and acknowledged, such discriminatory behavior will continue to occur and negatively impact others around us.

In the late 1970s, Larry Ott and Silas "32" Jones were boyhood pals. Their worlds were as different as night and day: Larry, the child of lower-middle-class white parents, and Silas, the son of a poor, single black mother. Yet for a few months the boys stepped outside of their circumstances and shared a special bond. But then tragedy struck: Larry took a girl on a date to a drive-in movie, and she was never heard from again. She was never found and Larry never confessed, but all eyes rested on him as the culprit. The incident shook the county—and perhaps Silas most of all. His friendship with Larry was broken, and then Silas left town.



More than twenty years have passed. Larry, a mechanic, lives a solitary existence, never able to rise above the whispers of suspicion. Silas has returned as a constable. He and Larry have no reason to cross paths until another girl disappears and Larry is blamed again. And now the two men who once called each other friend are forced to confront the past they've buried and ignored for decades.
