If you are looking for comprehensive information on ethnicities, ethnic studies, or minority groups, then access $\underline{\text{\bf Ethnic NewsWatch}}.$ This resource extensively reports on ethnic and minority groups by providing perspectives that aren't generally addressed in mainstream $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right)$ news content or found in any other database. Through various types of sources such as blogs, podcasts, newspapers, magazines, trade and scholarly journals, reports, and several other formats the Ethnic NewsWatch database provides access to more than 2.5 million full text articles from over 500 publications. Click on this link to view a complete list of publication titles offered in this resource.

Ethnic NewsWatch holds the largest full-text archive of Native American publications as well as scholarly information on Jewish, African American, and Hispanic American ethnic studies. This exceptional online resource also provides access to over 300,000 articles dated between 1959-1989 in its historical file. These articles include primary source material on topics such as the Vietnam War protests, civil rights movement, immigration law, and migrant workers. Ethnic NewsWatch also offers almost a quarter of its collection in Spanish.

TIFF

In a previous article of this column, I highlighted two common file formats for images: JPEG (or JPG) and PNG. In that article, I alluded to another file format, which deserves equal recognition: TIFF.

TIFF (or TIF) stands for Tagged Image File Format. Incredibly, the format has existed for nearly 40 years, having been created in the mid-1980s. Equally as impressive, the latest update for the format (version 6.0), was released over 30 years ago in the early 1990s. According to the third edition (May 2023) of the "Technical Guidelines for Digitizing <u>Cultural Heritage Materials</u>" of the <u>Federal Agencies Digital Guidelines Initiative</u> (FADGI), the "go-to master file format for still digital imaging has been TIFF v6 for decades."



Innovate North Dakota is a voucher reimbursement program to help North Dakota entrepreneurs further their business by supporting customer and market research. Through expert guidance from business coaches at Entrepreneurial Centers located in Bismarck, Jamestown, Fargo, and Grand Forks, Innovate ND provides the entrepreneurial community of North Dakota the resources needed to help turn an innovative idea into a profitable business. The program goals are:

- Grow the entrepreneurial ecosystem in North Dakota and enhance economic development and economic diversity in the state.
- Educate and assist participants on the lean business model canvas, value proposition, and customer identification.
- Assist participants to validate their product and market by tracking metrics such as investment, sales, or customer interviews.
- Support the development of new, innovative businesses with clear potential for Primary Sector Certification.

Each participant is eligible for up to \$22,500 in reimbursable expenses through two phases offering \$7,500 and \$15,000, respectively. The participant has up to three months per phase, for a total of six months, to complete all requirements of the program.

"Sukkot" translates to "huts" or "booths" in Hebrew. This holiday ties into the forty years the Israelites spent wandering the desert and the temporary dwellings they used. Value of Horror Literature for Students

October marks the beginning of the "spooky" season. Whether you are a fan of horror literature or whether it leaves you shaking in your boots, there is no doubt this is a highly popular genre. Becoming terrified can produce an adrenaline rush, a touch of excitement, in otherwise seemingly ordinary lives.

Psychologic Effects of Horror Literature

Horror author Neil Gaimen commented that fairytales are important because they teach readers that dragons exist; they also teach those same learners that dragons can be defeated. The horror genre carries the same lesson. Terrorizing stories help grow readers' own courage and emotional regulation. Unfortunately, students go through real life horrors every day, including bullying, abuse, family trauma, and illness. When students experience scary situations while in a safe environment, such as reading a horror book, they learn coping mechanisms for their own fears. Oftentimes, monsters and ghosts can feel easier to face and confront than real life terrors (MacGregor, 2023).






Website Accessibility - Alternative Text

If your library has a WordPress website through the State Library, you will be receiving an e-mail in the next week or two on what you may want to check, add, or edit to help your website become more accessible, usable, or in line with the Standards for Public Libraries guide.

One of the things that I check for is if the images on your library's website include alternative text (alt text), which is text that describes the images, charts, diagrams, etc., that are on the website.
