The next Library Vision Grant Webinar is scheduled for Wednesday, November 15, at 10:30 AM. Attending or viewing the recording of this webinar is mandatory for receiving a library vision grant award. The webinar will be presented on Zoom and registration is required. The upcoming grant round will open January 2. North Dakota Tribal libraries are now eligible for these new grants due to recent changes in the ND Century Code. There are three grants available this round, two for all North Dakota publicly funded libraries and one especially for North Dakota Tribal College libraries.

The two grants available to all publicly funded libraries are for public spaces and for security and will be available in awards up to \$15,000. The Tribal College library grant is for awards up to \$10,000 and will be an open-proposal grant. For the details on these grants, be sure to attend or watch the recording of the webinar. There will be an opportunity for you to ask questions at the end of the webinar if you attend live. The recording of it will be posted to our YouTube channel a few days later.

"If you are a 9-12th grade student in the United States, your challenge is to research past and future impacts of climate-related hazards in your community, including drought, wildfire, flooding, and extreme heat, then develop a proposed action to help build a more resilient community. Your entry must be original and include a written explanation of your proposed climate action (200 words max) and an image (max 3GB) of a "poster" that supports your climate action. The poster can be a digital design or a photo of a hand-made poster. Your climate action should explain at least one way your community can prevent, withstand, respond to, or recover from a climate-related event. The grand prize winner will present their poster at the Innovations in Climate Resilience Conference in Washington, D.C., and receive a \$5,000 STEM grant for a U.S. nonprofit organization, public library, or public school. The 2nd - 5th place finalists will receive a \$1,500 STEM grant for a U.S. nonprofit organization, public library, or public school."

Using Hip-Hop in the School Library

What is Hip-Hop?

Hip-hop is a cultural movement with the main components of MCing, DJ'ing, breakdancing, and graffiti. (Other aspects of hip-hop including clothing choices, slang, and a mindset for calling out the privileged.) These four primary elements are meant to support a strong knowledge of self, society, and civil rights. (The hip-hop era, in the 1980s and 1990s, is often seen as the next step of the Civil Rights Movement [Evans, 2020].) Rap, which combines rhyme and poetry with a musical beat, is the most mainstream musical aspect of hip-hop (Graves, Kelly, & McArthur, 2020; Bailin, 2011).

Science Kits for Public Libraries Grant

Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers

This grant is restricted to public libraries that serve geographic areas inside or partially inside the IEEE-Region 4. This includes all of Iowa, Michigan, North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and portions of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Nebraska, and South Dakota. The grant provides funding to establish a circulating science kit collections program. Libraries should expect to use their own funds to maintain the circulating science kits for a number of years. Libraries that already have a circulating science kit collection are not eligible.
