Greetings and Happy New Year from the ND Center for the Book at the State Library! I'm excited to announce that requests for our next ND Author Book Tour featuring Sarah Vogel and her book "The Farmer's Lawyer" is now open! Register at <u>https://forms.office.com/g/4uzGJagNAv</u>.

What is the Great Reads from Great Places (GRGP)? GRGP is a program that all Centers for the Book across the nation participate in. Each year, centers choose an adult title and a children's title to represent their state. These books are either written by someone from their state or is written about their state. These books are then compiled into a list that becomes the Roadmap to Reading at the National Book Festival in Washington DC.

Through a grant from IMLS, the ND Center for the Books is able to host four book tours for each of our North Dakota books. For the 2023 Festival, our children's author was Denise Lajimodiere and her book "Josie Dances", and our adult title was Taylor Brorby's "Boys & Oil." Unfortunately, Mr. Brorby could not make a book tour happen, but we are so lucky to have our 2022 adult author, Sarah Vogel, to take his place.

The book tour event will feature a reading from the author, a Q & A / discussion, and a book signing. Libraries who are chosen will also receive a copy of the book, promotional items, bookmarks featuring the two titles, and brochures featuring the entire Great Reads from Great Places list.

Routines provide various advantages, including:

- 1. Allowing time to be maximized,
- 2. Helping achieve goals,
- 3. Providing calming and comforting expectations,
- 4. Ensuring that there is time for non-work-related tasks, and (Tigar, 2023)
- 5. Helping with self-regulation (Wilmot, 2023).

Library Expectations

Routines and expectations often go together. After returning from a break, students might need reminders of what the expectations are in the library. Take a library session (or two) to re-enforce expectations concerning topics such as:

1. Procedures for selecting and checking out library materials. Additionally, expectations for what to do after library materials have been checked out.

US Currency Reader Program

The National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS) has partnered with the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) to provide currency reader devices free of charge to eligible individuals who are blind or visually impaired. The iBill Talking Banknote Identifier is a compact device that announces a note's value in one of three ways: voice, pattern of tones, or pattern of vibrations.

This program is part of the Meaningful Access Initiative to assist individuals who experience difficulties identifying US currency.
