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Primary Residence Credit

The Primary Residence Credit (PRC) was established during the 2023 Legislative Session under House Bill 1158. This credit provides all North Dakota homeowners with the option to apply for a state property tax credit through the North Dakota Office of State Tax Commissioner. Homeowners with an approved application may receive up to a \$500 credit against their 2024 property tax obligation.

To be eligible for the credit, you must own a home (house, mobile home, town home, duplex. or condo) in North Dakota, and reside in it as your primary residence.

There are No Age Restrictions or Income Limitations for this credit, but only one Primary Residence Credit is available per household.

Libraries can play a role in helping patrons applying for this tax credit. For patrons without access to a computer at home or internet, a library can provide people with a computer and assistance to help them through the application process. The application itself is pretty easy to fill out. Applicants will need their Parcel identification Number, which is found on your County real Estate Tax Statement. If a patron doesn't have their tax statement, there is a link included on the form to look up their county tax statement.

The North Dakota State Tax Commission provides a PDF flyer that can be printed out and posted in your library.



Notary Public Training

Are you currently commissioned as a notary public or thinking about applying for a commission? Having the ability to print out a document and be able to have it notarized at your library is a great service that you can provide to your community. As a commissioned notary public, you are an important officer of the state and are depended on to perform notarial acts accurately, truthfully, and with integrity. While this is daunting and even intimidating, the North Dakota State Library has partnered with the North Dakota Association of Counties to offer an introductory course on becoming a notary. This course is not only good for those who are considering applying to become a notary, but also those who have their commission and have questions about fulfilling their duties. In this webinar, you will learn the basics of performing notarial acts, dos and don'ts, common mistakes made by notary publics, and the reasons documents may be rejected by various parties. You will also gain insight on electronic notarizations and remote notarizations, which have become more common over the last few years. There will be an opportunity to ask questions as well.

Through our partnership with the North Dakota Association of Counties, librarians in North Dakota can take this webinar at no cost! Who is Kanopy? In 2008 Kanopy made its debut in the educational market. It later became known as a free streaming service in late 2017 and early 2018. As Netflix began to focus its content on television, Kanopy began marketing itself to public libraries with its free streaming service and collection of classic films. The company currently works with 4,000 plus libraries and 158 million library card patrons from around the world.

Schneider Family Book Award

This year marks the 20-year anniversary of the Schneider Family Book Award. This prize honors children's and young adults' books that portray characters with mental, physical, or emotional disabilities in realistic and artistically expressive ways. The disabled characters may be main or supporting, and they cannot tie into negative stereotypes. Either illustrators or authors can be granted this award (Schneider, n.d.).



History of the Award

The Schneider Family Book Award was established by Dr. Katherine Schneider and her family in 2003; the first awards were given early in 2004 (Korbeck Verbeten, 2005; Schneider, 2022). Dr. Schneider is blind and grew up reading in braille and through recorded books. A robust reader, and extremely hungry for new knowledge, Katherine understood that not all content was available to her in blind and visually impaired formats. She continued to seek out other options, such as scanners that transcribed written word into spoken. As time went along, Schneider wanted to encourage authors and illustrators to show the experiences of characters who possess disabilities, not as handicaps but simply as a part of their daily lives. With this goal in mind, the Schneider Family Book Award was born (Korbeck Verbeten, 2005)!
