Call of NPL Items

The <u>Digital Initiatives Department</u> at the North Dakota State Library needs your help. We are looking for items relating to the Nonpartisan League (NPL) or the Independent Voters Association (IVA), circa 1910s to the 1930s, to add to the <u>Political Prairie Fire</u> digital collection. "Items" can include photos, cartoons, documents, books, memorabilia, etc.

"Political Prairie Fire" is the newest digital collection from the State Library. It's available online via Digital Horizons. The collection is dedicated to the NPL/ IVA era of North Dakota history, and includes many images, documents, videos, books, and cartoons relating to this time of political strife in the state.

We have a good start on the collection, but more content is needed to tell the full story.

For libraries, do you have any items in your local history collection or special collection relating to the NPL or IVA? Depending on what you have and how much you have, Digital Initiatives could handle the digitization. We can also talk shop (digitization, digital projects, preservation, etc.) and set up a site visit.

Eleven months after legislators passed a controversial bill barring "explicit sexual material" from public libraries' children's sections, only five North Dakota libraries report having moved books as a result of the law.

As of March 20, the Chester Fritz Library became a proverbial dinosaur dig site thanks to the efforts of the library's outreach team, Rebecca Brown and Zeineb Yousif. The complete skeletal "fossils" in question are approximately two inches tall and made of plastic. With multiple species of dinosaurs being represented, they are enough to elicit anyone's inner child. Brown and Yousif have hidden 30 of these little figures throughout every floor of the library, guaranteeing at least seven per floor. If the potential of finding a tiny dinosaur during a study session was not exciting enough, seven of them are tagged with a QR code indicating that the finder is entitled to a prize. Six of the prizes are 3D wooden dinosaur puzzles, and the grand prize is a Tyrannosaurus Rex skull Lego set.

Qingming Festival

The Qingming Festival (sometimes called the Ching Ming Festival) honors ancestors, as well as celebrates the beginning of spring. It is primarily acknowledged in China, Taiwan, and to a lesser degree in Malaysia, Singapore, and Thailand (Julia, n.d.). Qingming occurs during the first week of April. (For 2024, the celebration day is April 4th) (CBC, 2024). Qingming is derived mostly from Confucianism, which emphasizes respect to the deceased (Qing, n.d.).

Details of the Festival

The Qingming Festival originates from the legend of <u>Duke Wen and Jie Zitui</u> (CBC, 2024). During Qingming, translated to "Grave Sweeping Day," participants tidy up graves and bring offerings to their ancestors. Some offerings include food, willow branches (to keep evil spirits away), and burning joss paper (paper that looks like money) (Qing, n.d., and What, n.d.). After visiting the deceased, partakers rejoice in the beauty and renewal of spring through picnics, kite flying, and shooting off fireworks (Qing, n.d., and What, n.d.).

In addition, you'll have access to 34 standard courses with pre-post assessments, a library of over 120 financial topics, and more than 2,800 pieces of content including articles, videos, tools and courses. You'll find that your money personality changes as you learn on the site and have new experiences.

Regular interaction with the site has encouraging results. During the heights of the COVID-19 Pandemic, 32% of users experienced a decrease in financial stress, 59% built up a three-plus month emergency fund, and 28% were able to pay their credit card balance in full monthly.

Over a century later, in 1985, AASL's Lucille Thomas spearheaded National School Media Month. This first annual celebration took place at the capitol in Washington, D.C. In 2010, the name was changed from "National School Media Month" (School, n.d.).

Is Your Library's Communication Designed for Diversity?

Communication takes place through various means. It can be verbal, nonverbal (body language), written, or visual. In her presentation, "Designing for Diversity in Your Library's Communications," Mollie Peuler, an eLearning Librarian from Appalachian State University, invites librarians to evaluate how they communicate with their community.

Ms. Peuler began her presentation by discussing communication and the neurodivergent population. She explained that neurodiversity is the variation in how brains process information. Brains that process information as society has deemed "normal" are considered typical, while brains that function outside this norm are labeled atypical or neurodivergent. Examples of neurodivergence include AD(H)D, dyslexia, autism, bipolar, schizophrenia, or epilepsy. Ms. Peuler commented that needs of the neurodivergent population can be met by considering the following techniques.
