

# A Little History about the Olympics

#### Scheduling

The Summer Olympics occur every four years. Paris, France hosts in 2024. This year, the Olympic Games run from July 26<sup>th</sup> through August 11<sup>th</sup>. There is a Winter Olympics, which also occurs every four years. The scheduling of the Summer and Winter Olympics alternate so that one section of the Games occurs every two years. To help clarify, the next Winter Games will be in 2026, with the following Winter Games in 2030; the next Summer Games is in 2024, and the following Summer Games will be in 2028 (Olympic, 2024).

# Promoting and Supporting Literacy in North Dakota Through Mobile Libraries

Every year library outreach is celebrated on the Wednesday of National Library Week. National Library Outreach Day, previously known as National Bookmobile Day, is April 10. This day is an opportunity for library patrons and advocates to highlight and thank libraries, library staff, communities, and community leaders who offer and support bookmobile services (Ahayes, 2024).

National Today defines bookmobiles as "...mobile libraries that help transport books from one local community to another." These traveling libraries promote reading by providing individuals who can't visit larger libraries or who live in underserved areas access to literacy materials. In the early 20th century Maryland librarian Mary Titcomb, became the first librarian to meet literacy needs of individuals living in rural communities by coming up with a means to transport books to them. Mary's idea to use a horse-drawn wooden carrier filled with boxes of books is said to be the first bookmobile in the United States. In 1912, the horse-drawn mobile library was replaced with motorized bookmobiles that reached rural and urban schools, senior communities, and remote mountainous areas (Ahayes, 2024).

Before opening their doors in 1903, the history of the Valley City Barnes County Library can be traced even further. In 1898, a group of women came together and started raising money to fund a town library."

# **Elections 101: Elections Resources**

Librarians provide a wealth of resources to patrons and show extra care in ensuring that the information they provide is accurate. Finding sources of truth can be difficult in an age where people have the Internet at their fingertips and are inundated with messages from traditional media, social media, and family and friends.

When it comes to information about North Dakota elections, the Office of the Secretary of State is the trusted source, and there are materials available that you can provide to your patrons about the security and integrity of North Dakota elections.

The ND Secretary of State website was recently revamped, and the <u>Elections</u> section has been reorganized to make it easier for people to find information. Examples of information that may interest library patrons include where to vote, how to update an ID, how to vote absentee, and facts about elections and voting equipment.

Printable flyers are also available in the <u>Voter Resources</u> area. You can share these with your patrons electronically or by printing and making them available for people to take with them. There are general voting information flyers and ones that pertain to more specific voter audiences and situations. The "Elections & Voting in North Dakota" and "Elections Processes in North Dakota" flyers are available as hard copies, and you can request to pick some up at the ND Secretary of State office in Bismarck by contacting Communications Director Misty Curn at <u>micurn@nd.gov</u>.

Information about elections and voting is frequently posted on the ND Secretary of State's social media channels. This is a great way for you to stay informed about elections information and to learn when new resources become available for you to share. You can find us on Facebook, Instagram, and X (Twitter).

# **Opioid Crisis Support Kit for Public Libraries**

#### WebJunction

To aid staff at public libraries in determining how their library can address opioid use disorder in their community, WebJunction has developed the "<u>Opioid Crisis Support Kit</u> <u>for Public Libraries</u>." This resource will help strengthen libraries—and, more broadly, the communities they serve—as the nation continues to struggle with the opioid crisis.

The Support Kit was tested by staff in 15 public libraries across the US and enhanced by their feedback. The content includes pragmatic strategies, tools, and other resources to help libraries—including those in rural areas—as they determine their specific communities' needs and define the roles and activities their library is most suited to carry out. The kit will help libraries assess their staff strengths and capacity, identify key partners with whom to collaborate or coordinate, and plan and implement programming and services that support local needs.

# Codeybot

Codeybot is a smart programmable robot. He's a wedge-shaped, expressive, dance machine who shoots lasers and teaches you to code.



This kit includes 5 packs, each containing one Codeybot, one docking station, a user manual, a USB charging cable, and an LED laser turret.

System requirements: Codeybot requires a tablet or smartphone running iOS 7.0 or later; currently, Codeybot does not support Android devices.
