REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR STATE LIBRARY COMMISSION, 1960-1962

Operations at Headquarters

The State Library Commission has in 1960-1962 sent 258,793 books on loan to public libraries, to schools, to camps, to clubs, and to individuals.

Circulation of books to the schools continues to grow. In the past two years over half of the total circulation went to elementary and high schools. The Traveling Library has sent out 1,861 boxes during this two-year period. Each box contains from 20-25 books. Requests for special reading groups, the Family Group, and the group wishing help with Club Programs have had more requests than usual.

The State Library Commission has provided exhibits for public libraries, clubs, schools, and special convention assemblies; and has furnished bookmobile demonstrations for fairs and for special occasions to various places over the state in the interest of publicizing library service to the citizens of North Dakota.

The total expenditure for books purchased during the biennium was \$20,000. Some much needed but expensive reference books and sets were purchased with the help of money in the Library Services Fund. All books have been accessioned, classified, cataloged, processed for circulation, and made ready to be used by the public in North Dakota. In addition to these, some 7,500 have been processed in whole or in part to be used for extension purposes for county and regional libraries as by agreement under the Library Services Act. A Thermo-Fax Copying Machine and a Book Copying Machine have been added as welcome equipment to the offices of the State Library Commission. Library Services funds have helped with the purchase. Too, these funds have helped to make possible a new 120-drawer catalog cabinet.

The Field Library Consultant made trips to advise and assist in development and in meeting library standards to Public Libraries at Ashley, Bathgate, Bottineau, Cando, Carrington, Casselton, Cavalier, Cooperstown, Devils Lake, Drake, Drayton, Edgeley, Ellendale, Enderlin, Forbes, Forman, Goodrich, Grafton, Hankinson, Hansboro, Harvey, Hoople, Hope, Lakota, LaMoure, Langdon, Larimore, Leeds, Lidgerwood, Linton, Lisbon, Maddock, Mandan, Mayville, Mohall, New Rockford, New Town, Northwood, Oakes, Park River, Pembina, Rolla, Rugby, St. Thomas, Steele, Towner, Velva, Wahpeton, Walhalla, Watford City, Williston, and Wishek. School libraries visited and assisted were Alexander, Anamoose, Ashley, Bisbee, Bottineau, Bowbells, Buffalo, Cando, Casselton, Cavalier, Cooperstown, Drake, Egeland, Esmond, Fort Yates, Glenfield, Grafton, Hillsboro, Hope, Kindred, Kramer, Lakota, Langdon, Leeds, Maddock, Maxbass, Minnewaukan, Monango, New Rockford, New Town, Pembina, Rugby, St. John, Starkweather, Tappen, Tolna, Towner, Upham, Walhalla, Watford City, and the libraries at the School for the Blind at Bathgate and the State Industrial School at Mandan.

The Director and Extension Assistants have made numerous trips to meet with Library officials, boards, and committees in various parts of the state to help in making plans or resolving problems; and to participate in library functions, at dedications, "open house" for special occasions, or for induction or completion ceremonies for county and regional libraries.

The Director's time, too, is given in good part to office conferences, and publications. Among the latter are LIBRARY NOTES AND NEWS, the library state publication; articles for newspapers and professional magazines and other publicity; and letters pertaining to innumerable matters. Conferences are with representatives from over the state dealing with contemplated projects, and with staff members in making plans for future activities; also with officials pertaining to matters for legislative consideration.

Workshops, three in number, have been held each for one week at three Teachers Colleges — Ellendale, Dickinson, and Mayville. A total of 93 people attended. These represented librarians, library assistants and driver-clerks for bookmobiles in different parts of the state.

Two members of the State Library Commission staff took part in the Library Extension Workshop in Missoula, Montana, July 17-28, 1961.

Ward County entered into an agreement with the State Library Commission in November, 1959, for help from Federal-State funds and became self-supporting in the spring of 1961 through a tax levy

placed in the budget by the County Commissioners. It has a contract with the Minot Public Library which serves as the main station. A bookmobile provides service to more than 3,500 registered rural borrowers in the county. A steady increase in circulation indicates a widespread interest in the service.

Morton County entered into an agreement with the State Library Commission in May, 1960, for help with Federal-State funds and became self-supporting in the spring of 1961 through a county tax levy. It has its own setup in the Mandan Memorial Building. Library service is extended by means of a bookmobile to 3,225 registered rural borrowers and this number is increasing each month.

Adams County entered into an agreement with the State Library Commission in July, 1961, for Federal-State funds to help build and support it for the first year. Local county funds became available in the spring of 1962 to continue the maintenance. The library at Hettinger, the county seat, turned its books and materials over to the county system and became the main station library. This county also reports greatly increased patronage and is much in favor of this new arrangement.

Slope Area Demonstration. The State Library Commission continued during 1961 and part of 1962 a demonstration by bookmobile to eight counties in the southwestern part of the state known at the Slope Area. One of these counties, Adams, mentioned above, secured the required number of signatures on petitions — 51% of the voters — and has become a county library. Stark County, another county in this group, obtained the necessary number of signatures on petitions. However, the County Commissioners voted to not levy any county funds. It has therefore been decided to discontinue the demonstration for the time being in the Slope Area. This Demonstration Bookmobile No. 1 is being moved to a new county requesting a demonstration in the coming biennial period.

Divide-Burke Demonstration. Divide County was one of the first counties to be organized as a county library, but without bookmobile service. Burke County adjoining it would provide an ideal run for the advantages of bookmobile service to both counties. Demonstration Bookmobile No. 2 has been paving the way in Burke County for this two-county program. The required number of petition signatures were secured for the addition of Burke County. However, the County Commissioners voted to further test the wish of the people at a straw vote at the time of general election. The demonstration is being continued to give the many desiring this service an opportunity to work for it.

Plan for the use of Federal-State Funds for Rural Library Development. This appropriation is made up of funds available to the states under the Library Services Act, and matching state funds.

State Library Commission

- 1. Strengthen the State Agency
 - a. Additional personnel
 - b. Increased book collection at the State Agency
 - Extended library services to include such items as films, records and the like
 - d. Additional travel for staff members to library conventions and library centers.
- 2. Promotion and rural library development
 - a. Continue program of rural library promotion
 - Provide guidance and assistance for areas formed under the Library Services program
 - c. Continue help to areas through book selection and cataloging service
 - d. Library training program
 - Subsidies to promote library training to personnel and board members of libraries in the state, and to persons interested in securing library training, for attendance at workshops, library conferences and conventions either in or out of the state. Subsidies to persons conducting such workshops in the state.
 - 2. Study grants up to \$2,000 for professional library training under an agreement whereby the persons return for at least two years of work in North Dakota.
 - Attendance by State Library Commission staff members at workshops, conferences and conventions for library purposes outside the state — this to include expenses for travel, lodging and meals.
