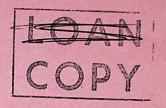

PURPOSE AND AUTHORITY OF THE AGENCY



The State Library is supported by a biennial appropriation from the State Legislature, and is a division of the Office of Director of Institutions. The library was established in 1907 and currently operates under Chapter 54-24 of the North Dakota Century Code.

The State Library is maintained to serve all of the state's residents in cooperation with local libraries in order that a full range of library resources is readily available to everyone. Emphasis is placed upon library resources which are specialized, infrequently used, often expensive, and generally not readily available elsewhere in the state.

54-24-03. POWERS AND DUTIES OF STATE LIBRARIAN.) The state librarian shall:

- Make rules and regulations according to which the business of the state library shall be done.
- Provide and care for all books and library materials in all collections of the state library, general, reference, and special, and make all rules regarding the loaning and returning of library materials.
- 3. Employ qualified library personnel to care for all library procedures.
- 4. Make library materials available to libraries throughout the state, to individuals connected with departments of state, and to citizens of North Dakota who do not have adequate library facilities, under the rules and regulations of the state library.
- 5. Promote and assist by counsel and encouragement the formation of libraries and the improvement of those already established, in keeping with state and national standards, and be available to librarians and trustees of libraries in the state for assistance in organization, maintenance, or administration of the libraries.
- 6. Coordinate the efforts of librarianship throughout the state, advising and assisting the extension of qualified public libraries into centers of county or regional (multicounty) libraries.
- 7. Compile statistics of the free public libraries of North Dakota and their larger counterparts of county and regional libraries, and of the work done at the state library, and make a full biennial report to the state director of institutions and the governor.
- 8. Collect, maintain, and make available a reference and reading collection of books, slides, films and other graphic materials such as will supplement and support the needs of all libraries in the state, either by direct loan or by consultation, and such as will form a reference source for the officers of the state in the performance of their duties.
- Collect and maintain a collection of the publications of the departments and agencies of state government, including the enacted laws of this state, current session laws and journals.
- 10. Conduct, or arrange to have conducted, research into the conditions of library service in the state, and produce written plans for the development and betterment of such service.
- 11. Compile, or arrange to have compiled, union lists of resources of libraries throughout the state, and make such lists available for consultation.
- 12. Establish levels of certification for librarians of the state such as will meet the standards recommended by the American Library Association.

REPORT

The purpose of the State Library is to insure equal access to information for all citizens of North Dakota, whether they are nine or ninety-eight, disabled, a farmer at Zap or an employee of Job Service. To do this, the State Library not only serves people directly, but makes every effort to help libraries develop at the local level and serves as a coordinating agent for statewide library services.

In order to develop quality library service for the citizens of North Dakota, the State Library works with institutional, public and academic libraries to improve information services in these libraries, helps plan continuing education experiences for librarians and conducts research to support the plans for future projects of libraries in North Dakota.

To help plan library development in North Dakota, the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries, made up of both librarians and citizens, is appointed each year to advise the State Librarian and the Director of Institutions of the information needs in North Dakota.

The State Library is also a resource library for school, public, academic and special libraries. As a resource center, the State Library provides special materials such as filmstrips for children's programs in school and public libraries, large print books for persons with visual problems, and books that are too specialized or expensive for public and school libraries to purchase. All of these materials are also available to walk-in patrons and persons who do not live in a community with a library. Since the State Library is the primary information source for state agencies, the book, cassette, and journal collections try to reflect the professional needs and interests of persons working for the State of North Dakota.

The key role of the State Library is coordinator of a statewide interlibrary loan service. To that end the State Library maintains a record of the books and magazines of all the academic and major public libraries. Thus, if a public library does not have a particular book, the request is sent to the State Library. If a staff member at the State Library cannot find the book in the State Library's collection or in any of the collections of other North Dakota libraries, the request is sent out-of-state. An agreement is signed by the Director of Institutions and the Minnesota Board of Higher Education for this service.

LIBRARY LEGISLATION (July 1, 1979-June 30, 1981)

State Aid to Public Libraries - State Aid to Public Libraries became effective July 1, 1979. In the 1979-1981 biennium these grants to public libraries have been used to purchase more books and materials, extend hours of operation of local libraries and provide more children and adult programming. The 1981 Legislature added an additional \$100,000 to the 1979 appropriation of 1 million dollars.

In the 1981 Legislature the State Aid to Public Libraries bill was amended

to clear up some of the problems of administering the State Aid Bill. Primarily, HB-1551 amendment, sponsored by Representative Unhjem, specifies that the money will be granted to a library based on the governing body's mill levy support rather than the dollar amount that a mill brings in in a given year. HB-1551 also specified guidelines for local units of government to form joint library boards. This was done to formalize arrangements some of the libraries had been following for years. Five joint library boards were formed before July 1, 1981 as a result of this legislation. They are: Williston and Williams County, the McLean-Mercer Library, the South Central Library, Valley City and Barnes County, and the Carnegie Bookmobile County in Grafton.

Blind and Physically Handicapped - North Dakota continues to contract with the South Dakota State Library for library service to the Blind and Physically Handicapped. During the 1979-1981 biennium, a survey was taken at the request of users of the South Dakota service. The survey revealed that while there are some problems with the service from South Dakota, the larger issue was that North Dakota is not serving nearly the number of people that are qualified for books for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. In order to advertise the service to people who are qualified and to work out the problems with the South Dakota State Library, a half-time person was approved by the 1981 Executive Budget and the Legislature.

State Funding for Educational Information Center - The Educational Information Center (EIC) was started in the 1977-79 biennium with federal funds. In the year and a half of operation it has distributed educational materials on North Dakota colleges to high schools and started a TAPE program whereby a person could call a toll-free number to the TAPE Center at the North Dakota State University and listen to one of eighty-five tapes on different educational opportunities in North Dakota. The 1981 Legislature allowed \$7,000 to go into the EIC budget if the federal government continued to fund the program.

Public Access to State Documents - Representative Janet Wentz sponsored a bill to amend the North Dakota Century Code Section 28-32-03.2 to give all state depository libraries (UND, NDSU, Minot State, Dickinson State, State Library and State Historical Society) copies of the North Dakota Administrative Code at no cost.

Liberty Memorial Building - The 1981 Legislature approved a 1.5 million dollar appropriation to renovate the Liberty Memorial Building for the use of the State Library. The move is scheduled for June, 1982 and will give the State Library much needed space for reader services, meeting room use for state agencies and additional office space. The new location on the Capitol grounds will also make the State Library much more accessible to people who work in state agencies.

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT IN 1979-1981 BIENNIUM

Two trends have emerged in the 1979-1981 biennium that have increased the development of library cooperation: one is that the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries has taken an active role in planning interlibrary cooperation among all types of libraries and worked extensively to improve library service

in institutions; the other is that the State Library and the North Dakota Library Association have begun merging their efforts in continuing education for librarians.

<u>Interlibrary Cooperation</u> - The Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries initiated a project in the northeast quadrant of North Dakota that draws together librarians from school, public, academic and special libraries. Their current projects include a directory of local resources and a bibliography of special collections of books and audio-visual materials in the participating libraries. Future projects may include: cooperative purchasing of books and materials and cataloging.

<u>Continuing Education for Librarians</u> - The State Library consultants and the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries have been active in initiating or continuing education activities in the 1979-1981 biennium. The Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries sponsored an interlibrary cooperation workshop in 1979 to which librarians came to hear nationally-known speakers.

The State Library Planning Division and the North Dakota Library Association have cooperated in several continuing education projects. The State Library was awarded grants from the North Dakota Committee on Humanities and Public Issues to bring the Newbery and Caldecott winners and a Health Science workshop to the 1980 North Dakota Library Association annual convention. 1980 and 1981 were the first years that the State Library and the North Dakota Library Association merged their spring workshops for public librarians which not only saved on expenses, but increased attendance because the same workshop was held in two locations in the state rather than one in Bismarck. The Tuition Reimbursement Program for Librarians, begun in the 1977-1979 biennium, has continued to be a success with many librarians enrolling in courses during the 1979-1980 biennium.

Education Programs in Public Libraries - State Library consultants have been active in this biennium in stimulating the growth of children and adult programming in public libraries. Educational Telephone Network (ETN) was placed in seven public libraries during the last biennium and it continues to be used by professional groups to conduct meetings and workshops. Through a grant from the North Dakota Committee on Humanities and Public Issues, an exhibit and program on Einstein was given in twelve libraries throughout the state. Summer reading program themes, packets and publicity ideas were made available to public libraries for the summers 1980 and 1981.

<u>Library Service to State Institutions</u> - The Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries took an active role in improving library service to North Dakota's institutions during this biennium. An extensive survey of resident and faculty attitudes toward libraries as well as collections in the institutions was taken. The Council made the recommendations for the grants that the State Library gave to institutions during both years. Also, the Council conducted the first workshop for institutional librarians and education directors in June, 1981.

LIBRARY SERVICES

MINITEX and OCLC - The use of MINITEX continues to be an important aspect of providing information to North Dakotans. The total number of books in North Dakota is approximately 800,000, which makes access to the additional 6 million volumes in Minnesota and South Dakota a necessity.

Plans were made during the 1979-1981 biennium for five additional colleges to go on-line with OCLC. This will make it easier for interlibrary loan, cooperative collection development, etc.

LIBRARY SERVICES

Circulation, Interlibrary Loan and Reference Activity - The State Library reference staff takes pride in answering all requests within twenty-four hours of receiving it (unless the person needs it sooner). Requests are received through the mail, teletype, In-wats telephone line (which is available to public libraries) and telephone and walk-in requests from state agency people. During the 1979-1981 biennium the staff handled an average of 211 requests per day, which is an increase of 25 per day over the previous biennium.

Census Data Center - In the fall of 1979 plans were made to create a Census Data Center in North Dakota to insure North Dakotan's easy access to U.S. Census materials. The Census Data "Center" is actually four agencies - the Planning Division of the Federal Aid Coordinator's Office, the State Library, the Geography Department of the University of North Dakota and the Agricultural Extension Department of the North Dakota State University. The State Library's role in the "Center" is to house paper copies of all Census material from all states and to be a clearinghouse for requests that need to be answered from UND and NDSU.

White House Conference on Libraries, November, 1979 - Six people from North Dakota were selected by the Governor's Conference on Libraries to attend the White House Conference on Libraries held in Washington, D.C. in November, 1979. Delegates were: Boyd Wright, Grand Forks; Diane Duty, Cando; Jackie Mundy, Minot; Peg Warren, Williston; Joanne Pahlmeyer, Regent; Judy Vogelsang, Dickinson; Hazel Doan, McKenzie; and Gloria Dohman, Wahpeton.

The delegation from North Dakota was disappointed that metropolis libraries received more attention than providing information service to rural areas. However, whether as a result of the White House Conference or not, the Library Services and Construction Act was renewed in the Spring of 1981.

North Dakota Library Association and other library groups have worked extensively on the resolutions made at the Governor's Conference on Libraries held in Bismarck in 1978. Most delegates felt that while the White House Conference was a good learning experience, the North Dakota Conference was much more applicable to the problems of North Dakota. A further suggestion of the delegates was that in the future funds be provided for follow-up activities of citizen groups for both State House and White House Conferences.

FUTURE DIRECTIONS

The decade of the Eighties will be a challenging one for the State Library. The information needs of all citizens - whether a state government employee or a rancher in Bowman - have increased. The need for immediate information or expensive library materials has grown in all parts of the state. Concurrently, commercial concerns have discovered that information can be packaged and sold. If access to unbiased information is to continue, libraries across the country

will have to be open to new ways of distributing materials to their clientele. The challenge of providing accurate, unbiased information to the public in the face of rising costs of materials is one that all libraries are encountering. The problem is not insoluble, and in North Dakota insisting on quality information services has been a rallying point for both the State Library and the North Dakota Library Association.

One of the most positive events of the coming years will be the move of the State Library to the Capitol Grounds in June, 1982. One of our primary clientele is state government employees, yet in the past it has been estimated that only ten percent of the State Library's time has been spent working on their information needs. Several features of the remodeling of the Liberty Memorial Building were made to attract state agencies to the State Library. The ground floor is being made into an attractive area for employees to conduct extended research or preview films, cassettes and filmstrips. The top floor of the building will have four meeting rooms (two with group audio-visual capability) for the use of state agencies. Just being in such close proximity to the Capitol Building will help State Library staff make contact with state agencies and heighten the visibility of State Library services.

In order to prepare for the future, both in terms of internal operations and in relation to other libraries in North Dakota, the State Library has begun a program of analyzing exactly what the agency does and for whom. The questions to be answered include: How many people from the Bismarck-Mandan area who do not work for state government are being served by the State Library? Are there public libraries in the communities of the schools the State Library is serving? What percentage of the individuals the State Library serves by mail have library service in their communities? Which state agencies is the State Library serving most frequently? Why aren't other state agencies using the State Library? What kinds of information do state agencies ask of the State Library? Also, what kind of information do public, school and academic libraries most frequently need?

In the area of internal operations, the State Library is in the process of finding out how much staff time is spent maintaining the State Library's card catalog, the state's union card catalog, reference, circulation, and book processing.

Providing high quality library service to North Dakotans can best be done in the Eighties through cooperation and networking with other libraries both within North Dakota and in surrounding states. In a day when the money available to libraries is uncertain, it behooves libraries of all types to cooperate in tangible ways — resource sharing, cooperation, acquisitions and automation. Plans are now underway for the State Library to continue to form closer working ties with the North Dakota Library Association to provide continuing education opportunities to North Dakota librarians, improve rural library service, and plan for statewide technological development in libraries.

STATE LIBRARY STAFF

The North Dakota State Library has 21.65 Full-time-equivalent positions authorized by the State Legislature and 2.0 Full-time-equivalent positions authorized by the Emergency Commission. The persons serving in these positions during the 1979-1981 biennium are as follows:
