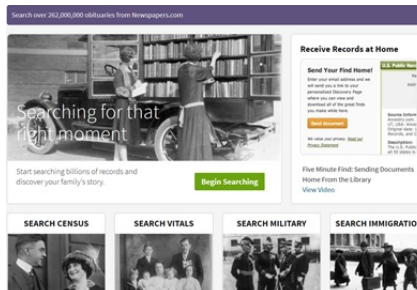


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## Discover Family History with Your Library Card Ancestry Library Edition Available at Home

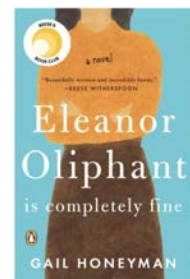


This course is 16 lessons long, has 29 exams and assignments, and will take an average of 9 hours to complete. It's available for free through [Universal Class](#) with a library card.

### *Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine* by Gail Honeyman

Eleanor struggles with social skills and lives a very structured life. While this may sound like the setup for either a comedic satire or slow-paced book, it is, instead, the setup for a discussion on mental health, individuality, and the importance of human connection. This novel has both well-developed characters and a strong narrative voice. Honeyman highlights how a person can be both content with their life that is different from what is considered 'typical' and simultaneously left wanting. Eleanor's perspective on the world is real and honest, and it is this voice that makes the book so profoundly moving and ready for discussion.

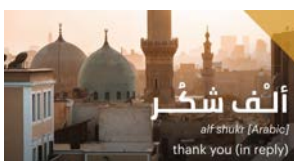

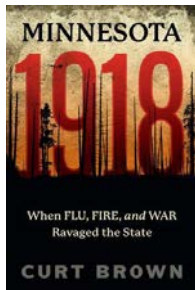
For those you would like to sign up, registration can be found through the PeopleSoft portal under Learning.

## Book Review

### "Minnesota 1918: When Flu, Fire, and War Ravaged the State" by Curt Brown Reviewed by Crystal Forster



This book reveals the series of calamities that converged on the state of Minnesota during 1917-18. Fires started by trains in the northern part of the state killed nearly 500 while thousands were dying from the Spanish Influenza throughout the state, country and world. At the same time, additional thousands were sent to fight in WWI where more died from influenza than in combat. The book covers little-known details about the strange political atmosphere, as well as details from individuals who lived and died during that time. Heart-wrenching stories and letters give the history a mesmerizing human interest. I learned a great deal about this time in history from this book and would recommend it to anyone.
