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Library Coordinating Council Nominations Sought

The <u>North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC)</u> is seeking nominations, including self-nominations, for members. This is an interesting and exciting opportunity to help shape library services in our state.

The NDLCC serves as the State Library's advisory board and assists with the creation and implementation of the Library Vision strategic plan, including the awarding of Library Vision grants. The Governor appoints NDLCC members according to Century Code §54-24.4. Typically, the Council meets quarterly with two meetings held in-person and two via videoconference. The in-person meetings also include tours of libraries.

Several of the current members have terms that are ending on June 30, 2025, and they have reached their term limits. The NDLCC includes librarians and two citizens at large. One of the citizens at large positions is open.

Scandinavian American Bank Exhibit

The Digital Initiatives Department of the North Dakota State Library (NDSL) is excited to announce the opening of another online exhibit called the "Scandinavian American Bank."

The exhibit uses information and content from NDSL's Political Prairie Fire digital collection, which focuses on the political battle between the Nonpartisan League (NPL) and the Independent Voters Association (IVA).

This exhibit tells the story of the scandals surrounding the Scandinavian American Bank of Fargo from the late 1910s to well into the 1920s. This seemingly normal bank in downtown Fargo was at the epicenter of the political battle between the NPL and IVA. The scandals would impact more than just this bank. The State Banking Board, the State Examiner's office, the Attorney General's office, NPL enterprises, the Bank of North Dakota, a bank in Valley City, the State Auditor, the courts (including the North Dakota Supreme Court), and several prominent individuals would also be pulled in (many of which, at different times, would be labeled "bank wreckers" for their varied involvement). The arrests, trials, and fanfare lasted for years.

Today, the Scandinavian American Bank has become a mere footnote in the history of the NPL, overshadowed by some of the enduring legacies of that time (like the Bank of North Dakota and the Industrial Commission). However, the bank played a pivotal role in the NPL-IVA era of North Dakota history.

The primary way to navigate the exhibit is to start on the homepage and then progress through each sub-page under "The Story" in sequential order (using the "Next" and "Previous" buttons at the bottom of each page). The "Timeline" page/ tab is a supplement to the main story, and it provides another way to experience the story (in a chronological and slightly condensed way).

I stumbled across a state document that can inspire road trip adventures across the state and another couple documents that aid in creating a welcoming garden environment for our pollinating insect

First up, A traveler's companion to North Dakota state historic sites. This is the third edition of a truly excellent resource for exploring North Dakota. I honestly can't believe I've never picked it up before. This edition won the Notable Documents Award from the North Dakota Library Association in 2015. I highly recommend this super-informative document for anyone looking for a history-focused trip to notable sites across North Dakota!

If puttering around the garden is more your speed, I offer a combo of documents that deliver helpful insight into a subject we may not think about often: pollinating insects.

Meet the rare, threatened and endangered insect pollinators of North Dakota is a single page document from the NDSU Extension Service that provides detailed information on endangered bee and butterfly species in the Upper Midwest region.

Additionally, Bee-utiful landscapes: building a pollinator garden is a very informative and attractive publication, also from NDSU Extension Service. This multi-page document is chockfull of useful information regarding bees and how to get started designing a pollinator-friendly garden. I found it fun to flip through even though I would struggle to keep a cactus alive, let alone a haven for honeybees!


